**Editorial**

**FOOD AND PEOPLE**

Warnings that the world is approaching  
a state of overpopulation in which its re-  
sources will be unable to support its people  
may be a little late. Chester I. Barnard,  
president of the Rockefeller Foundation, at  
least, believes that day already has arrived.  
"The world is overpopulated now," he

declares in his annual report to the founda-  
tion, "with respect to our present knowl-  
edge, to the present availability of natural  
resources, to the state of the arts today, to  
the existing social organization, and to some  
of the presently held traditional and reli-  
gious concepts regarding food."

He observes that half the world's popu-  
lation today is close to starvation and that  
another 25 percent is suffering from mal-  
nutrition. In pointing out, however, that it  
would be unwarranted to say the world's  
population has passed the limit of adequate  
support, he holds out the hope that our po-  
litical and social structures will catch up with  
the state of our science and that, by various  
means, population and resources will be  
brought into something resembling balance.

There appears little prospect of such a  
development, however, until the confines of  
narrow nationalism and nationalistic think-  
ing are broken and a world problem treated  
as such. As long as it exists there'll be wars  
and revolutions, and speaking of peace in the  
world we are also speaking, whether we realize  
it or not, of opportunity of all peoples  
to eat.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram

**NOT AN INNOVATION**

The controversy over the Rankin vet-  
erans' pension bill, which has passed the  
House by a big majority but is expected to  
die in the Senate, by no means justifies the  
assumption that elderly former service men  
have been grossly neglected by the national  
government. Actually about 3,250,000 war  
veterans or their survivors are drawing pen-  
sions, the cost of which is estimated at \$1.6  
billion for the current fiscal year. The total  
outlay for pensions since the Revolutionary  
War has been about \$23 billion.

The Rankin bill is a diluted version of  
the initial measure offered by the Mississip-  
pi representative. It would provide \$72 a  
month to low income veterans over 65, and  
the allotment would not be appreciably high-  
er than the old age assistance grants in many  
states. An objection to the House-approved  
bill is that it would impose a lax definition  
of employability for the applicant veteran.  
The test of disability in the existing law  
would be eliminated. An incidental provision  
of the Rankin bill would require the veteran  
to sign a non-Communist affidavit.

Since the measure would cost the federal  
government \$65 billion in the next 50 years  
and provision already is made for the dis-  
abled veterans and veterans' widows, the  
Senate should defer action on the Rankin  
bill. It would add another costly item to an  
already overloaded budget, and either a  
deficit or a tax increase would be punitive  
to veterans as well as all other citizens.

**Communities Should Keep After Sanitation Problem Year-Round**

During the last several summers, considerable enthusiasm was shown by various local organizations such as Chamber of Commerce, many Civic Organizations, and others in the arranging of a fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that for taking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended.

However, without year-around community sanitation the ultimate results, which is so important has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant.

"The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year", Dr. Cox said. "For example, why spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed. Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered. I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overcome B. O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit, preferably with one or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is covered with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray is recommended provided the item of clean-up is still being carried out.

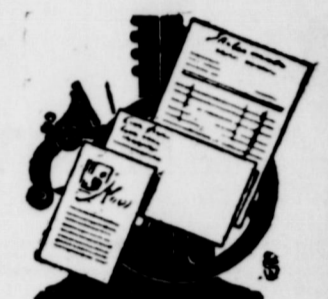

**WHEAT STORAGE FARM STORAGE MUCH NEEDED**

The lack of adequate storage for the bumper grain crop that is now beginning to move in the state is causing much concern. This coupled with the drop in price, has brought the producer face to face with a real problem but fast action may yet save the day. It isn't too late to provide much on-the-farm storage and at the same time qualify for a government loan on the crop says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer-buildings of Texas A. and M. College.

According to Allen, 500-bushel capacity grain storage bins or grainaries can be built for about 50 cents per bushel of storage capacity and 1,000-bushel bins for about 40 cents per bushel capacity. These construction costs can be further reduced through the use of materials that may be available around the farm, adds Allen. Due to the high cost of materials, it may be advisable in some localities to buy prefabricated bins or grainaries. Allen says such structures in some instances are selling from 28 to .31 cents per bushel capacity.

Whether you build or buy prefabricated bins will depend on the local situation, he says. If you need a blueprint for building on-the-farm storage, go see your local county agent. Through him plans are available for many types and sizes of grain storage structures.

When you get the plan, says Allen, get a local estimate on the cost of construction and then compare this figure with a prefabricated building would cost. Then take your choice. It is well to keep in mind, continues Allen, other uses that can be made of such structures after the grain is taken out and plan them for such.

Grain storage structures, con-

cludes Allen, should be well built so they'll last for many years. And, too one of the qualifications for a government loan is that the grain stored in bins or grainaries where it will not be subject to damage from moisture, insects, rodents or from other causes.

**TO LATE NOW**

After recovering slightly from the shock of the budget, one employer called the staff together and explained that there must be further reductions in wages.

**FARM, RANCH PRICE DOWN SIX PERCENT**

Farm and ranch land prices have dropped six percent since last year. But that's only a drop in the bucket when you compare it with land prices during the period between 1935-39.

C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A. and M. College says that today's land prices in Texas are still 96 percent above those of 10 to 14 years ago. After ten years of steady climbing, farm and ranch land prices in the entire nation appear to have passed a good postwar peak.

Declines in prices of farm products in recent months was probably the major factor affecting the level of land prices. This downward drift began little less than a year ago in August, and has had quite an influence on prospective land buyers.

Since the land values have risen slower than the net farm income since 1940, there's a good chance that land price declines will lag behind commodity price drops. If farm costs remain extremely high and limits the net return to operators, the land value drop may increase in rate, Bates says.

Even though government price supports are active on many farm products and livestock, the net farm income is expected to continue downward. High fixed costs become more of a burden as the net profits are trimmed.

Therefore, buyers should attempt to keep land payments down to a manageable size to prevent hardship or possible loss of equity in lands recently acquired, Bates concludes.

A welcome hint for the bride's book is this tip on how to wash lace curtains and other delicate pieces. Place them in a pillowcase before washing.



Pack clothes by bunching each piece before placing in the washer. For the best results, mix large and small articles together in making up a load.

"Lovely to look at," is the theme that applies to the June bride's trousseau of linens as well as to the lovely lady herself.

And when the honeymoon is over, it is the bride's job to keep herself and her household goods looking lovely. Modern methods and equipment make it possible for her to do both. She can do her linens quickly and efficiently with the aid of an Automatic washer—and have plenty of time for outside activities to keep herself well informed and attractive.

Properly sorting linens is the first step in doing the laundry. There are so many different washable fabrics that it is important to wash together only those materials which require the same temperature of water, kind of soap and washing time and have the same color fastness.

White and light fast color linens and cottons, including dish towels, bed and table linens and handkerchiefs can be washed together. However, the housewife should not wash all her sheets or tablecloths in one load. A mixed load of large and small pieces assures better washing,

rinsing and drying. For best results, there should be only two sheets in each load.

Bath towels, bath mats, flannel articles and other linting materials should always be washed in a load by themselves.

Linens, white or colored, require only five minutes of washing time and the water should not be too hot if colored linens are in the load. An eight minute rinse and another eight minutes for spin drying complete the process.

Linens are placed in the tub in individual bunches so that they are well packed together, not spread out. In this way, there's no danger of the sheets, pillowcases and towels getting all tangled. Really delicate pieces, such as lace doilies and curtains, are put in a pillowcase, which is then sewed closed and washed for only three minutes.

With this kind of gentle care, the bride's trousseau linens should share with her many happy anniversaries.

And for the bride and bridegroom who don't want to spend their evenings doing the dishes, an easily interchangeable unit will convert this clothes washer into a dishwasher.

**FARMHOUSES SHOULD HAVE FIVE FEATURES**

Housing experts agree on five features that every well-planned farmhouse should have.

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. and M. College, says these features have been named "Farmhouse Specials" by Mrs. Lenore Sater Thye, who is in charge of housing and household equipment research in the USDA's Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics.

Briefly, the five features are:

(1) Entrance to both living and working rooms convenient to the main driveway, which also should be convenient to the farm buildings.

(2) A well-located kitchen, with a view of the drive and farm buildings. "This feature has a number of advantages," Mrs. Thye says. "The housewife can see any visitor arriving, keep in touch with the children outdoors and have a watchful eye on the farmstead when the men are in the fields."

(3) Good traffic lanes, so that all parts of the house may be reached without passing through the kitchen work areas and other centers of activity.

(4) Adequate work areas for preparing and preserving food.

(5) Adequate dining area in a pleasant place, with enough space to serve and eat regular meals.

"These farmhouse specials are important in any farm and ranch home, whether in Texas or in some other part of the country," Mrs. Claytor points out. "They are also points to be considered in building a home in town."

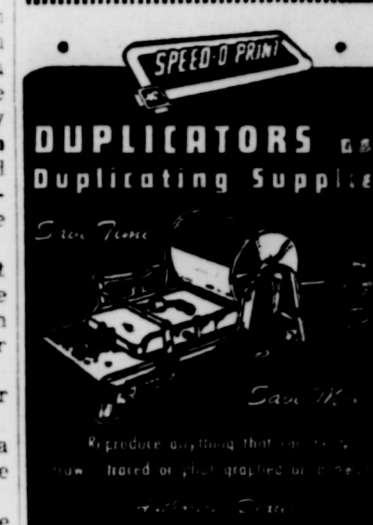

**Here's How To Pack Man's Suit For Trip**

Packing a man's suit in a traveling bag often presents a problem... especially to men. It's a pretty hard job trying to pack a man's suit without winding up at the end of the journey with more creases than there should be.

Mary Routh, extension clothing specialist of Texas A. and M. College, has a few tips on how to get where you're going with the least number of wrinkles. Such practice lengthens the life of the suit and saves pressing bills as well.

Don't spare the tissue paper in suit packing, Miss Routh advises. Use it generously. It helps keep the wrinkles out of suits. Now, for the average suitcase—wider than the gladstone—lay the coat flat on a table or bed, with the collar and lapels turned up. Lap the right front over the left front, bringing both sides over as far as possible without wrinkling the suit.

Sleeves should lie smoothly along the coat. Turn them a little above the elbow and fold up. Then pick up the lower edge of the suit and fold toward suit's top.

With a gladstone bag, the only difference is making one more fold in the body of the coat...

up and back. The coat sleeves are not folded separately as for the suitcase.

Trousers are no problem, Miss Routh says. Just make sure the creases are straight and the pockets smooth inside. Fold them over once or twice, depending on the size of the bag.

Suits aren't hard to pack if the job is done right.
