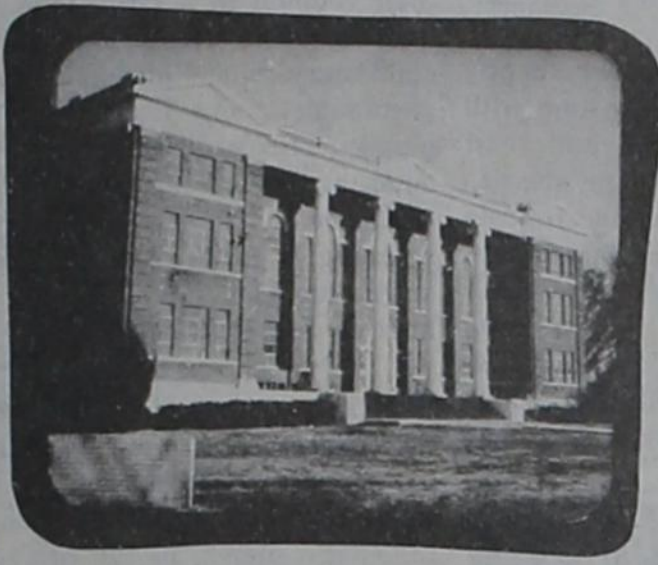


# WHEELER MUSTANG BAND NAMED: CLASS A CHAMPION STATE SOLO & ENSEMBLE BAND

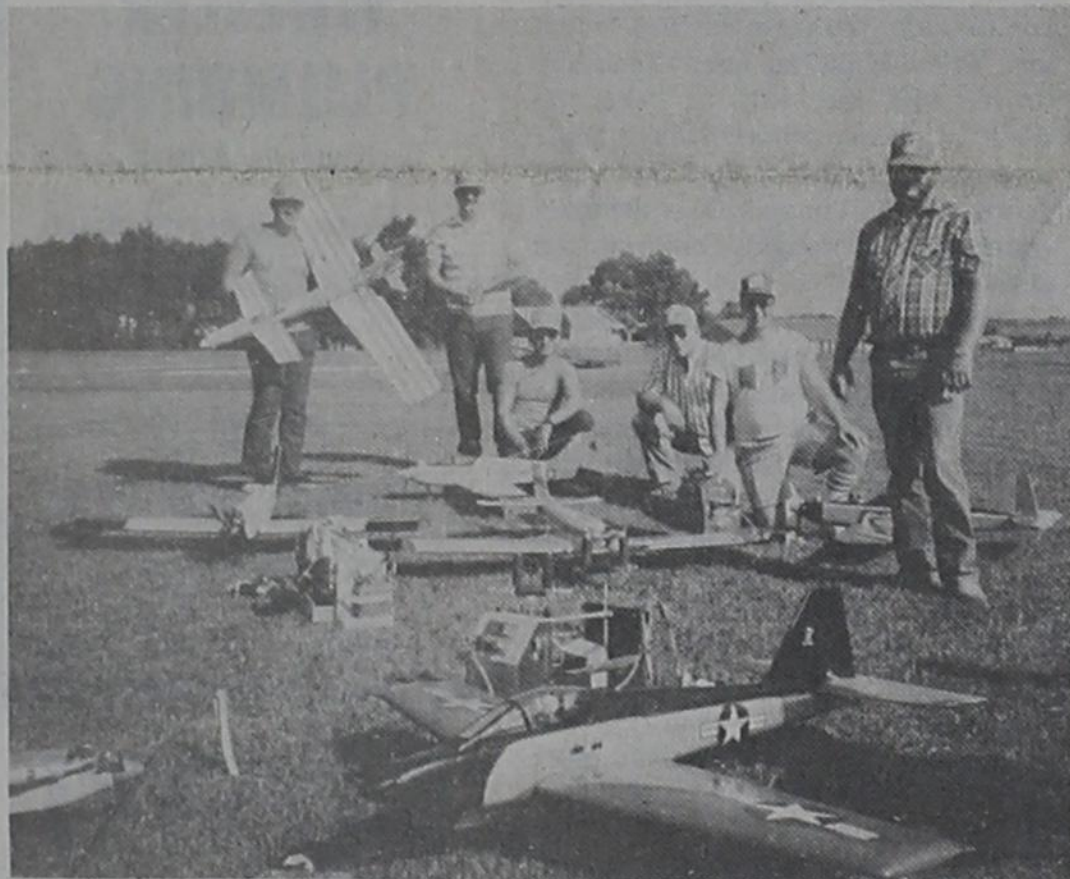

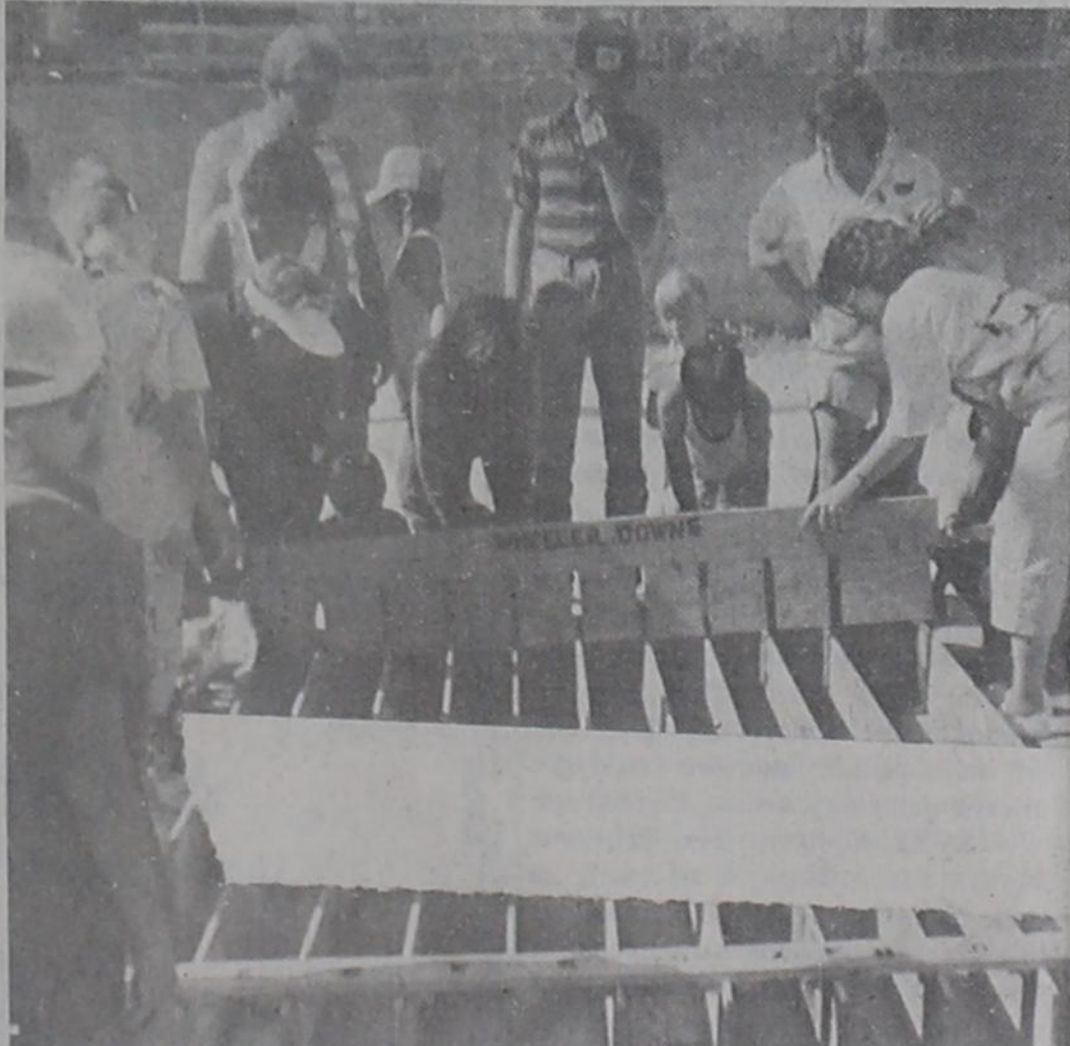

### Pampa Hospital Plans Forum, Open House

A Medicare question and answer session will highlight the Open House for the Extended Care Unit at Coronado Hospital in Pampa set for Sunday, July 10 from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. The Open House, beginning at 2 p.m., will feature tours of the 13-bed unit, which has been open for one year. The unit is a skilled bed facility, providing a level of care for patients who are too sick for home care, but sick enough to be hospitalized, according to Medicare regulations. Jan Genung, RN, director of the unit, will be on hand to answer questions about the unit.

The director of the business office, Georgia McGee, and the director of Utilization Review, Judy Martin, will discuss Medicare benefits and answer questions about rules and regulations in a session which will start at 3 p.m. in the cafeteria of the hospital. Pamphlets with Medicare information will also be available.
