Get a better buy in butter you'll look for the U. S. product," Myrtle Murray, home marketing specialist, Texas A. and M. College said.

The packaged butter canned for quality, as grand as to do before buying rock or in the bulk. The homemaker, however, has more reliable guide to and that is the U. S. letters U. S. in front of the carton or label mean

that the butter has been graded by an authorized grader, under the continuous inspection of the U. S. Department of Agriculture," Miss Murray explains. "These graders are highly trained experts, with special training for the job and keen senses of taste and smell."

The highest grade under U. S. standard is U. S. Grade AA or 93 score butter, which is tops in quality and has a fine, highly pleasing flavor. Ranking next is U. S. Grade A or 92 score, which is good quality with a pleasing flavor. U. S. Grade B or 90 score is satisfactory table butter but lacks some of the finer characteristics of the two top grades.

"U. S. graders also carefully examine butter for body, color and salt before giving it an official

grade," Miss Murray concludes. "If the homemaker buys either of the two top grades, she can be sure that the butter will be delicious, warm or cold, served as a sauce, melted on waffles, or spread on a slice of bread."

be submitted for sampling, sent in cloth bags or securely packed to prevent loss or breakage.

It takes at least three weeks to get a report on the sample of vetch, Reynolds says. Fourteen days are required to make the germination tests and about a week for shipment to and from the laboratory.

Send the vetch samples to Vetch Seed Testing Laboratory, Department of Agronomy, TAES, College Station, Texas. Name and address of the sender and any identification should appear on the tag or label on the outside of the package, says Reynolds.

When the grower receives his information, results of the tests may be used by him in securing official tested seed labels. Such labels must be applied for directly to the Seed Laboratory Division, State Department of Agriculture, in Austin.

Since this laboratory was established especially to make germination and purity tests of vetch seed produced by Texas growers, they are urged to use these services if they need them, Reynolds says.

FARMERS FIND VETCH IS GOOD

Texas farmers have a way of finding out just how good their vetch is.

If they will send it to the Vetch Seed Testing Laboratory at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in College Station, this laboratory will make germination and purity tests of the vetch free of charge.

E. B. Reynolds, experiment station agronomist in charge of the laboratory, says the vetch sent in to the testing laboratory should be a representative sample of the vetch the farmer has on hand. At least two pounds of vetch should

Short Courses For Poultry Raisers To Be Held Late In May

Two field poultry short courses will be held in this area during May, according to an announcement from the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

The first will be held in Lubbock, May 24 and 25, with County Agricultural Agent D. W. Sherrill as general chairman. The second will be in Abilene May 26 and 27, with Taylor County Agricultural Agent H. C. Stanley, Jr., as general chairman.

The first day's program of each course has been designed for anyone interested in learning the latest practical information dealing with poultry production in Texas. W. J. Moore, associate extension poultry husbandman of Texas A. and M. College, says, while the second day will be for flock selectors and pollorum testers.

Experts who will appear on the programs include T. A. Hensarling, executive secretary, Texas Poultry Improvement Association; Bernie B. Bailey, and James R. Grubbs, poultry supervisors, National Poultry Improvement Plan; F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist; Dr. W.

C. Banks, extension veterinarian; W. L. Braddy, assistant poultry marketing specialist; J. C. Williams, assistant poultry husbandman, and Mr. Moore.

Texas A. and M. College sponsored, in 1948, the first poultry short course ever held off a college campus. It was held in Tyler and was such a success that similar short courses will be held wherever and whenever the need arises, Mr. Moore says.

During the official cherry blossom festival in Washington this spring, the famous Oriental cherry trees were sprayed with a hormone spray that caused the petals to "stick tight" on the trees. Blossoms usually stay on about five to seven days. The spray caused petals to stick on about twice as long as usual.

Hornflies and the Lone Star tick are showing up on cattle in a number of places in Texas. Such livestock pests as these can be controlled with a combination of DDT and BHC in 100 gallons of water. See your county agent for spraying instructions.

There were 4523 cotton strippers operating in 61 West Texas counties last year. And commercial implement dealers sold 10 thousand rotary hoe attachments for the control of weeds and grass in cotton acreage.

"There won't be a new tax measure coming out of the legislature this session."

That is the general consensus of opinion around the capital now. But the legislators have been doing some serious work on a measure calculated to help them vote a tax measure if they have to raise more money to finance state functions.

This measure is a constitutional amendment to be voted on in September by the people. The amendment would have the legislature meet annually and give the members an annual salary.

If the amendment is approved, the members would meet the second Tuesday of next January.

Appropriations are now based over a two year period and the members feel they could work more efficiently and calculate better how much money would be needed from year to year.

In this manner the members hope to get by without levying an additional tax this session. If more revenue is essential by next January, then they can take action on the matter if the people approve the amendment.

INTESTINAL DISEASES BAD IN SUMMER

The summer season always brings an increase in the incidence of dysentery, diarrhea and enteritis, all of which are major menaces to the lives of small children, annually causing the deaths of hundreds of Texas youngsters.

The State Health Officer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, declares that the chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk, water or food; allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the infant's formula, and foods that have been improperly refrigerated.

"All foods should be clean and fresh, and all left-overs should be

refrigerated so as to avoid spoilage. The utmost care should be used in preparing the infant's formula which should, of course, be prescribed by a physician, and his recommendations as to sanitation precautions and correct refrigeration should be implicitly followed."

The State Health Officer warns parents especially of the danger of disease transmission by flies. Children in any home that is not free from flies, are in danger of contracting dysentery or other intestinal diseases which may be fatal.

"If dysentery or diarrhea symptoms appear in your child, call your doctor immediately," Dr. Cox advises. "His treatment of the disease is your best insurance against fatal results, since such diseases are really a very serious threat to the child's life. Don't depend on home remedies for diarrhea or dysentery; consult a competent physician and let him

institute the safest and best treatment which medical science has available, for combating wasting diseases."

Watch late-hatched chrysalis for symptoms of coodition; the disease is suspected, late treatment is necessary.

RED PAINT IS EYE-CATCHER

A can of red paint can be put to good use around the house, regardless of the color scheme, points out Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A and M College.

In the first place, she says, it's an eye-catching color.

In the second place, red means danger and serves as a warning.

As an eye-catcher, try painting the outdoor faucets and handles of small garden tools red. The color shows up clearly against ground, grass or foliage.

Far a warning, use the red paint to band the containers of such poisonous materials as lye preparations for cleaning drains or for insecticides.

The high shelf in the bathroom cabinet where medicines are kept out of sight and reach of curious children may be painted red as a flag to other members of the family. Anything on that shelf should be carefully handled.

The pail of sand and the fire extinguisher which many wise families keep on hand for fire control will be easier to locate if painted red. An emergency or first-aid kit in bright red can be easily found.

"In fact, a can of red paint may save lives as well as time and trouble," Mrs. Claytor concludes.

Meringues baked on hot fillings cook more evenly and are less likely to "weep" than those baked on a cold pie, according to recent tests made by the New York State Experiment Station.

DIOSIS SITE NOT TO SPOT

Parasite causing coccidiosis is hard to see, but the symptoms are easy to spot. Disease affects the intestines of many animals as well as birds, says Dr. W. C. Banks, veterinarian of Texas A. & M. College. The passage of spores sometimes mixed with feces is one of the first symptoms in coccidiosis. The animals are listless and eat very little, becoming lean and weak in appearance. The disease is common to most Texas, and it is commonly found in unsanitary lots. However, it may be found in animals on pasture, especially, a contaminated pasture is responsible for such

Sometimes called red disentery, this disease is best handled through prevention, Dr. Banks says. When large herds of cattle are fed outdoors, muddy wet ground around haystacks, feed troughs and watering places becomes a problem. Fill in the low spots and provide sufficient drainage so the ground will dry out from time to time. Remove barnyard fertilizer to the fields. This helps prevent coccidiosis and builds crop and pasture yields at the same time. A change in the feeding place sometimes is a good idea. Since this disease hits younger animals—from four months to two years of age—it is advisable to separate this age group from the older animals. This is especially true for the calves under four months of age. Infected animals should be penned off to themselves and left alone as much as possible. Treatment of diseased animals is best accomplished with drugs, mainly sulfaguanidine, says Dr. Banks. This drug is more effective if given four times a day. One grain of the drug per pound of animal is the recommended dose.

For example, a 500 pound calf might need 500 grains a day, or roughly one ounce. The treatment should be divided into four doses, so one-quarter ounce at a time is recommended. It isn't difficult to treat coccidiosis in animals, Dr. Banks concludes.

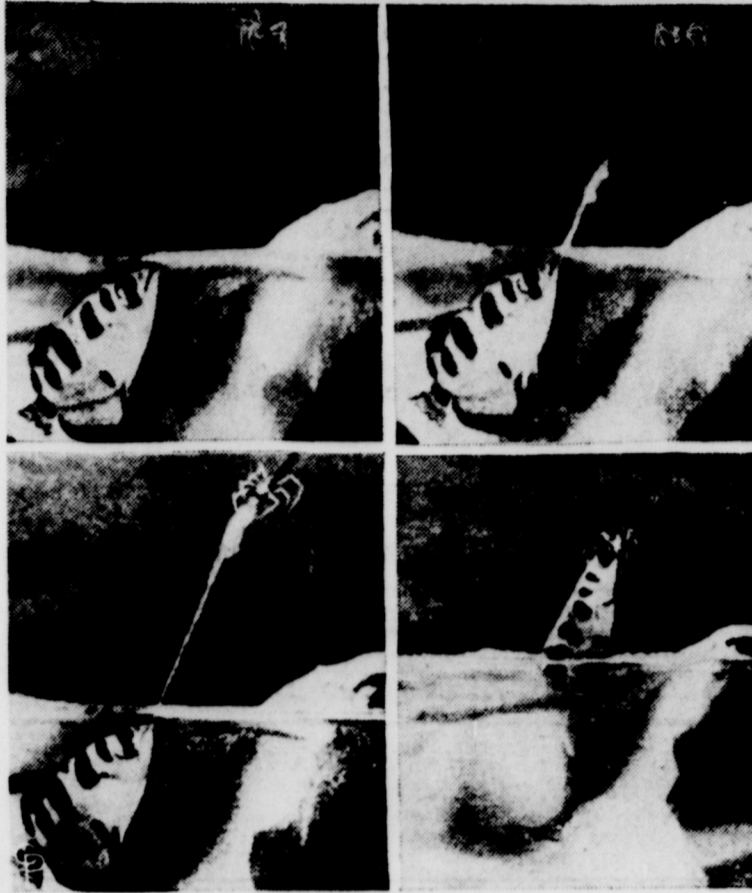

But whether you're chasing away the hornflies or getting rid of ticks, Deer reminds the cattle owners not to use DDT on dairy cows nor beef cattle that will be slaughtered within 30 days. Livestock will be better producers if they don't have to fight off flies and ticks.

CATLEMEN NEED LOOKOUT FOR HORNFLIES

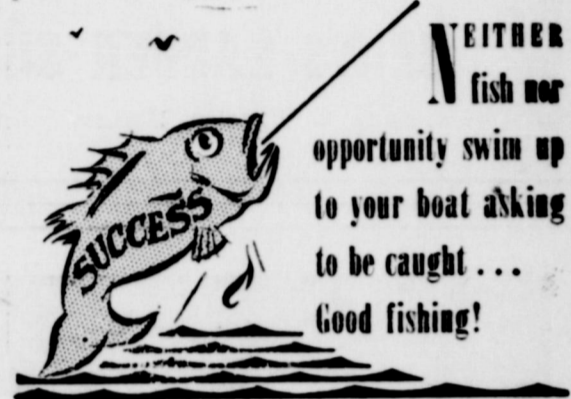
Hornflies and Lone Star ticks are a couple of pests Texas stockmen ought to be on the lookout for, warns James A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. and M. College.

Both are showing up on the cattle along about this time of the year, Deer says, and both of them should be controlled in order to keep up beef and milk production. Insects keep cattle in a nervous condition and often cause wounds that come infested with screw worms.

The most effective control for hornflies is DDT. Animals spray-

ed or dipped with eight pounds of 50 percent DDT wettable powder in 100 gallons of water will be protected from hornflies for at least 10 to 15 days. Two or three treatments of DDT in the spring and early summer and one more in the fall usually kills the hornflies for a year.

Dipping or spraying at two week intervals will put a stop to the Lone Star tick. Control should be started in the spring as soon as the ticks are found and continued until no more are seen, Deer says. A combination of BHC and DDT is recommended for tick control. The same amount of DDT is used here as in the hornfly remedy. Mix this with four pounds of 6 percent wettable BHC in 100 gallons of water. Mix the chemicals first in a small amount of water, then add this mixture to the spray tank or dipping vat.

Many who come on in the first act with enthusiasm and high hopes have wearied out of the struggle and left the cast in search of positions offering speedy remuneration and less brain fag. We miss them, but realize they may be entirely justified in their withdrawal. Our junior play, banquet, and another football queen gave everyone courage and high hopes for the future. Our junior trip to Oklahoma proved

a great success to everyone.

Act IV arrives at last and is warmly received. By this time the actors are so matured, so at ease, so changed for the better that they are difficult to recognize. Even that arch-villain, Study, seems more familiar.

This act passes fairly fast, as so many activities and social events are taking place such as the senior play, junior and Senior banquet, and various parties. Again, the high school boys chose one of the senior girls to be their football queen. Every senior is eagerly awaiting their trip to Colorado, which will soon be taking place.

All of these activities and various events have made the four years more enjoyable for each and every senior. At this point, the actors are beginning to realize that their high school days are soon to end. As the act nears its close, white faces and brows drawn with worry are noticed. For this is the final struggle. Victory now means freedom from the dreaded Study and his Examinations.

At last the fatal hour arrives, and the Final Examination raises his sinister head. The attack of the seniors is brave and well organized. The result of concentration is apparent. It means VICTORY!

They have finished Study. And then the symbolic touch, without which no play worthy the name is complete—the ironic twist of the new school of dramatists; Study, met face to face, is found to be, not an enemy, but a friend, and an invaluable ally to possess throughout life. The strenuous preparation for battle which made our cast more and more familiar with study, was a blessing in disguise and everybody is happy.

The play ends in a burst of glory, with flowers, music, and congratulations—in short, graduation exercises; and we have the well-known and ever popular happy ending.

ART. NO. 117 PROVIDE FUNDS

Public schools will be guaranteed enough money to finance their activities during the school year under the Gilmer Aiken Bill.

Under the bill a Foundation School Fund is to be set up. The amount to go into the fund is to be determined by the Foundation School Fund Budget Committee. This committee shall be composed of the State Commissioner of Education, State Auditor and State Comptroller of Public Accounts. The committee will meet and certify the amount to be paid into

the school fund before the first day of November before a regular meeting of the legislature. All appropriations are to be paid into the School Fund in monthly installments during the first nine months of each fiscal year. Total amount paid into the fund is to be completed by the first of May of each fiscal year. The committee can make rec-

ommendations to increase, diminish or suspend payments from the Clearance Fund to the Foundation School Fund. This bill is far shorter than any of the others and simply is a guarantee that the new school program will have adequate funds guaranteed for operation. Newspaper Advertising Pays!

FARMERS GET MOST COTTON CLASSED FREE

One out of every two bales of cotton ginned in Texas the past season was classed without cost for nearly 97,000 farmers in Smith-Doxey improvement groups. This same service will be available again this year, John L. McCollum, southwest area manager, Production and Marketing Administration's cotton branch, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Dallas, announced. Participation in Texas was higher last year than at any time since the program went into operation 11 years ago and prospects indicate it will be even higher this season, McCollum pointed out.

Latest count shows farmers ginned over one and a half million bales on which they received classification and market news service, both without cost. Total ginnings for the state amounted to more than 3 million bales.

Any organized improvement group which adopts a variety of cotton, files application, arranges for sampling and meets certain other requirements is eligible for this service on the coming crop.

Applications should be filed as soon as members have planted their cotton, but not later than July 1 for all counties lying entirely or for the most part east of the 100th meridian, and July 15 for those lying entirely or for the most part west of the 11th meridian. Latest date which applications may be received is August 1 for the eastern block of counties and August 15 for the western block.

Instructions and application blanks may be obtained from county agricultural agents, offices of Production and Marketing Administration, the area cotton branch office, or cotton classing offices in Austin, Dallas, Galveston, Lubbock and Abilene, McCollum explained.

IT TAKES WORK TO KEEP YARD LOOKING BEST

It takes mowing, watering and fertilizing to keep a yard looking its best.

That's the word from Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. and M. College. Regular mowing with a sharp, properly adjusted mower keeps your lawn looking neat and helps the grass grow and spread.

How high the grass is mowed depends on what grass you have. Bermuda, St. Augustine or centipede grass can be mowed closely if the yard is well fertilized. The

fescues and bluegrass should be mowed at one and a half inches or higher, Miss Hatfield says.

Now about watering the lawn. If you have the water supply to do this during the hot, dry weather, it's best to soak the ground thoroughly now and then—just soak long enough to keep the plants alive.

Here's a point to remember, too. Light sprinkling every day just to cool things off encourages shallow root system and helps crabgrass more than it does the better lawn grasses.

Further information on lawn grasses and fertilizing the yard can be obtained from the local county agent.

Nice green lush lawns in the summertime means taking care of your yard the year around, Miss Hatfield concludes.
