Editorial

PRIMING THE BOOM

Forecasts of sustained, even greater,
well-being in 1950 are reassuring with one
exception which struck a sour note. It was
the prediction of the Department of Com-
merce that increasingly heavy federal out-

lays in the first half of the new year would
bolster business activity.

The department analysis overstrained
its optimism in stating that \$5 billion in def-
icit spending next year would add to the in-
come of individuals and corporations and
thus stimulate them to respond. This wind-
fall will be in the form of more depreciated
dollars, which are the monumental fraud
perpetrated upon the overtaxed American
people since the war. The stimulus to re-
spond is a false one, not arising from in-
creased productivity but from more borrowing.
A more apt diagnosis would be that govern-
ment is setting a demoralizing precedent for
debt making and credit overextension. Per-
haps a new economic theory of priming a
boom has matured.

More reasonable is the analysis of former
Undersecretary Will Clayton, a hard-
headed business man who served government
in the war years. In advocating economic
union of the Western democracies, Mr. Clay-
ton warns that these countries under Ameri-
can leadership are spending themselves into
defeat in a cold war with Russia.

Mr. Clayton holds that the democracies
can not win this way but must find a less
costly road to world peace such as his eco-
nomic union proposal. His argument brings
to mind the well-established strategy of the
Kremlin to force the United States to spend
itself into depression.

What America evidently needs is more
than 24-hour-range business vision. Hidden
inflation, disguised as prosperity and financ-
ed by deficit financing, can be more vicious
in the long run than a temporarily painful
readjustment to sound business operations
beginning with government.

actionary forces to dominate education in
Texas; the power and the guile of the Texas
Regulars; the poll tax and the pay-raise a-
mendment, and oil, and sulphur, and cattle;
lobbyists and erosion and tidelands and hill-
billy music.

How much of this material the comedy
uses, we don't know. But we can imagine
some amazing and interesting possibilities
for satire; and some un-amazing ones.

More than six out of every 10 who receive monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits are persons other than the worker. The worker's social security card represents a family insurance policy that, under certain conditions, can pay insurance benefits to his wife, widow, children, or parents. Every worker who has ever had a social security card owes it to his family to let them know that they may be eligible for Federal insurance benefits in case he should die. Lack of this knowledge and failure to get in touch with a social security office at the death of a worker may cost his survivors hundreds of dollars in insurance benefits. Tell your family now that they should get in touch with the nearest social security office in the event of your death.

For further information about your family's rights and responsibilities under the law write to the Amarillo social security field office located in the Post Office Building.

DRIVE SAFELY THIS CHRISTMAS

"Don't Let Death Take Your Holiday!"

That is the slogan of a nationwide campaign by the National Safety Council to hold down the Christmas-New Year holiday accident toll this year.

Council figures show the year-end holiday season is the most dangerous period of the year, and that accidents annually mar the holiday celebration in thousands of homes throughout the nation.

In a united effort to focus public attention on the extra holiday hazards and the extra caution needed to meet them, city and state officials, civic groups, local safety councils and 160 national organizations are joining with the Council in the Christmas safety campaign.

The Council pointed out that traffic accident deaths on both Christmas Eve and Christmas Day run about twice as many as the annual daily average. Heavier

travel and the festive spirit of the holiday season add to the normal winter hazards of bad weather, slippery roads and added hours of darkness.

"Every family in America should put one extra gift under its Christmas tree this year," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council.

"That gift is life. It could be the life of some member of the household, or of a stranger. But it will be saved because someone has used just a little extra caution, common sense and courtesy to meet holiday hazards.

"Unless everyone is willing to go to a little trouble by taking extra care during the Christmas holiday season, America is likely to celebrate the holiday by repeating the record-breaking carnage of the recent Labor Day holiday disaster, when more than 550 persons were killed by needless accidents.

"Remember—a safe Christmas celebration, free from accidents that mar family happiness at this joyous time of the year, is the very best present anybody can give or receive. Don't let death take your holiday!"

1/2 cup soft butter
1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1/2 cup Pet Milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup finely cut nuts
6 tablespoons powdered sugar

Turn on oven; set at moderate (375° F.). Sift together flour, 1/2 cup powdered sugar and the salt. Mix milk and vanilla; beat into butter, about a tablespoon at a time. Mix in 1/4 cup flour mixture at a time. Mix in nuts. Pinch off a teaspoon of dough; roll into 2 1/2-in. strip. Turn to form a half-moon. Put on ungreased baking sheet. Bake on top oven shelf 12 min., or until light brown. Roll, while warm, in remaining powdered sugar. Makes 3 dozen.

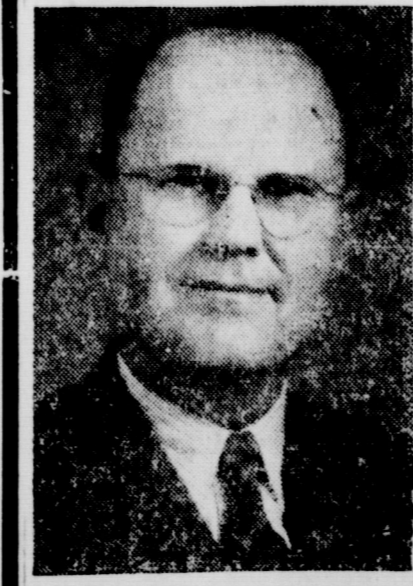

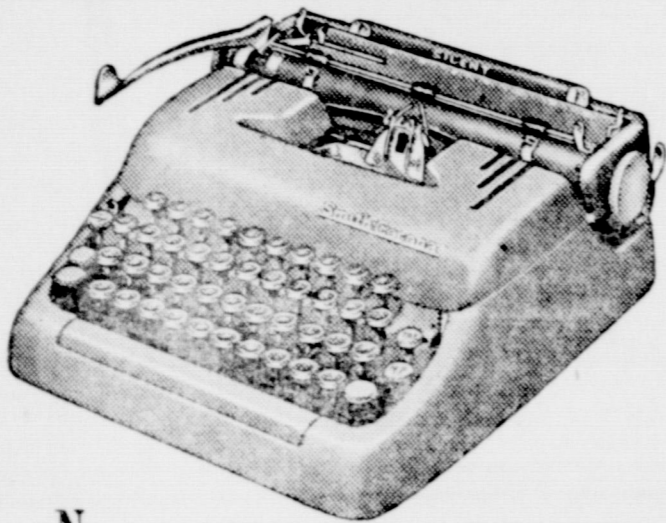

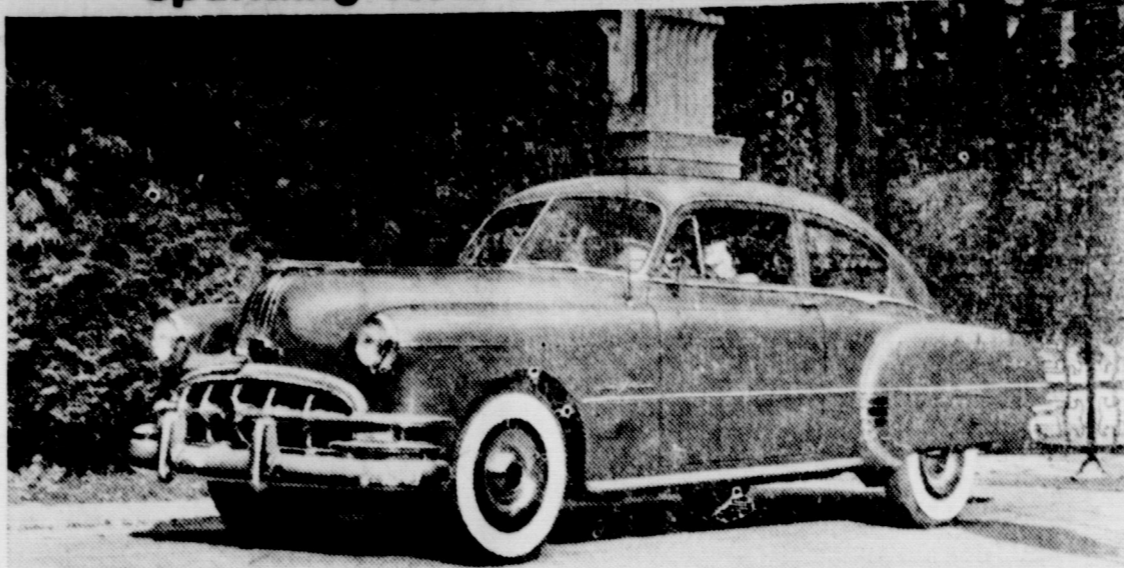

Mary Black, program chairman, appointed three girls to help her plan the Christmas party.

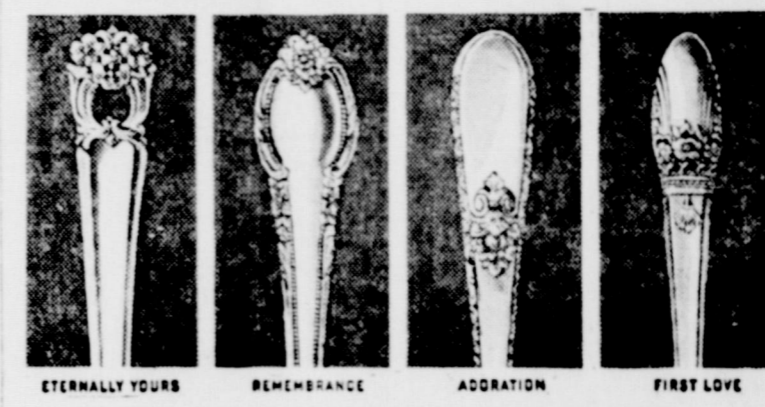
