

They are worried lest the current cancer publicity create fear and anxiety among the public that may cause

more harm than good. Although we can not speak from the standpoint of psychiatric knowledge, we would be loath to see the campaign for, early diagnosis and detection of cancer abandoned without definite proof that its harm outweighs its benefits. Cancer is on the increase in the United States, with the death rate from the disease rising from 40,000 in 1900 to 158,000 in 1940 and 180,000 a year at present. Yet authorities say that with techniques now available for detection and treat- E ment the present rate of cancer cures could

The tragic cause of many of the deaths from the disease is that its presence is not discovered until it has reached the inoperable state or has become too widespread in the body for complete removal. On the other hand, many patients can be cured if cancer is discovered in time. But it can not be discovered unless patients present themselves for checkup. The number who do this has greatly increased as a result of recent campaigns of education.

Harmful fears may be aroused in the minds of some by continuation of the campaign. But its abandonment might cause a far greater number to lose their fighting chance for cure or control of the disease through early diagnosis and treatment.







A STATEMENT BY CO. JUDGE HEFLEY

We have recently lost one of our Commissioners. Wheeler County never produced a finer citizen or a better commissioner than Don Rives. His untimely death was a great loss to this community.

The Statutes provide that in case of a vacancy in the Commissioner's Court that such vacancy must be filled by appointment made by the County Judge. In conformity with that duty I offered the appointment to the widow of Mr. Rives. She said that she did not wish to assume that responsibility.

It is almost time for announcement by candidates for the office in the summer primary, and I am sure that any candidate the people of precinct 4 will elect will be well qualified for the position.

I gave this matter all my study and consideration of which I was capable and trust that my appointment will meet with your approval.
