The 3rd Annual 4th of July Celebration gets underway Monday morning at 8:00 and continues until 1:00 A.M. Tuesday. The main part of the activities will be at the park, but other location put into use will be the track and the 100 block of East Texas on the square.

A Mini Air Show by the Props Club of Pampa will kick-off the activities at the track. The Punt, Pass and Kick competition will also be held at the track.

Fun at the park begins with the opening of the stands at 10:00 A.M. The food and activity booths will be judged on originality and appearance and a \$25 prize will be awarded the winner.

REMEMBER: Money is not used at the booths at the park. Stop at the Chamber of Commerce booth and exchange your cash for tickets. Each ticket will be worth 25c at each of the booths. The Chamber will also have a

few T-shirts, caps and visors for sale.

The softball field at the city park will be the site of the turtle race, bicycle rodeo, sack race, water relay race other organized children's activities and fireworks display. The turtle race and bicycle rodeo will be at 10:00 A.M. and the fireworks will begin at dusk.

Musical entertainment is scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. in the "Shelter" and continue for the next 12 hours. A number of acts are on the program, but additional individuals, groups or bands will be added through the day. Slated to perform are "Mason Jars", Liz Stiles, "Soprimes", "Kapers of '88", Gina Huckert, the Emmert girls, Ashley Ware, Craig Lovell, "The Odd Bunch", Becky Hardcastle, Ricky Pfeil and "Jazz Band". A number of "fun booths" will be in operation at the park. Added this year will be the WCTA jail. Back again this year will be face painting, Plinko and Bean Bag Toss and the dunking board. Horseshoes and volleyball will also be available for anyone wishing to play.

The Wheeler Municipal Pool will be a welcome relief from the heat for the visitors. The pool will be FREE to the public after the swim meet is completed. The swim meet is scheduled to begin at 11:30 A.M. with competition for everyone from 2 through adult.

The activities at the park will be brought to a close with the annual fireworks display. The display is said to be the best in the panhandle and will last 45 minutes. A \$2000 assortment of "Class C" fireworks will be shot. Remember, you donation make the display possible; these donations are being accepted by any Chamber member.

Construction costs will be paid with private funds and the building will be leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 10 years with renewal options for 20 additional years.

The building is expected to be completed in May 1989.

Canadian Observes 100th Anniversary

Canadian's Fourth of July Rodeo and Parade will be one hundred years old next Monday, and the Rodeo lays strong claim to being the oldest rodeo in the world.

Pecos, Texas, lays claim to having the first rodeo on the Fourth of July in 1883 or 1884 when cowboys from the Hashknife and the Lazy Ys, the NAs and the 101s, got together to settle an argument about who was the fastest with the rope or who had the fastest cutting horse.

Old timers in the rodeo game argued, however, that the Pecos event was an informal contest between a few cowboys and the Canadian Fourth of July Rodeo in '88 was the first organized and advertised rodeo event.

This year's celebration will begin on Saturday, July 2 at 6 p.m. with a hamburger feed at the Rodeo Grounds followed by the first rodeo performance at 7 p.m. At 9 p.m., the Rodeo Dance will begin at the City Auditorium featuring the band "Asleep at the Wheel." The hamburger feed will be free with the purchase of a rodeo ticket at \$3.00 for adults and \$1.50 for children. The price of admission to the dance will be \$10.00 per person.

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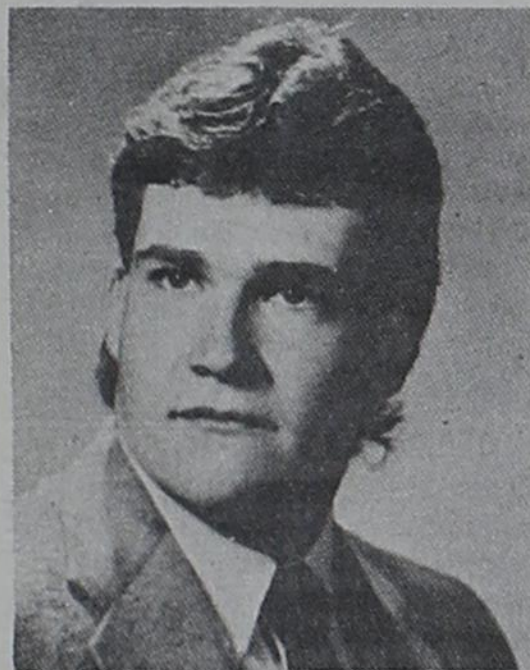

FmHA Issues Proposed New Lending Rules

Temple, May 23, 1988 -- Proposed rules, which could assist hundreds of farmers who are behind on their Farmers Home Administration loans, were issued today, according to FmHA Texas State Director J. Lynn Futch.

The new regulations will carry out portions of the Agricultural Credit Act passed by Congress last December. "There will be a 30 day comment period and additional time for any appropriate changes before the regulations become effective," Futch said.

One of the changes would allow FmHA to reduce the delinquent debt of certain borrowers to help them stay in business. There are approximately 5,000 delinquent borrowers in Texas, many of whom should be assisted with this Program once implemented.

In related actions, the Agency also issued proposed regulations to:

- *Make it easier for farmers or their families to lease or buy back homesteads that have been lost through foreclosure or conveyance;

- *Set up a program to help members of minority and socially disadvantaged groups to purchase farmland and develop an outreach program to carry it out;

- *Establish a new administrative appeals unit distinct from the rest of the Agency to handle borrower grievances;

- *Certify and participate in state mediation programs.

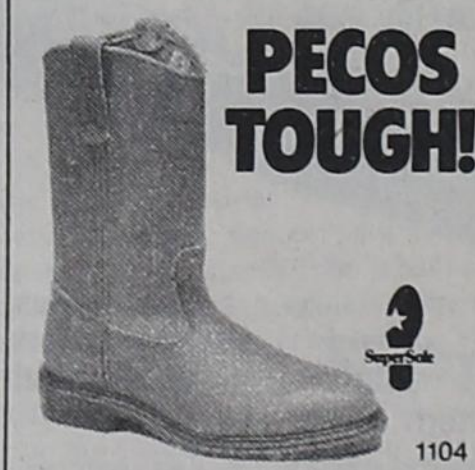

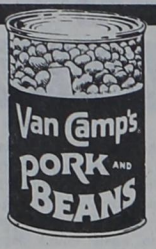

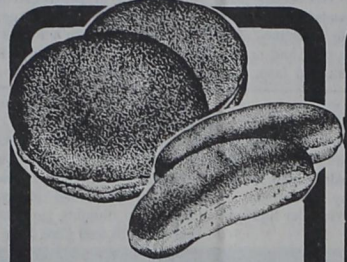
