X-RAY RESULTS SHOW 60 CASES TB IN COUNTY

Wheeler County's recent X-ray clinic held at Shamrock, Wheeler and Mobeetie, revealed 60 cases of tuberculosis; almost twice as many as the 32 cases shown in the program conducted here last year by the State Health Department. In addition to the 60 positive cases, the films showed three suspicious cases and 15 non-tuberculosis disease involving the chest. Last year there were 43 suspicious cases and 39 other diseases.

Eighty-seven more persons were X-rayed this year than last, the totals being 3,742 and 3,655.

Reports showing the results of all X-rays are being mailed to individuals who took advantage of the free service. In cases where the reports show other than negative, physicians as well as the individuals are being notified.

Sanitarian W. R. Ritter, chairman of the Wheeler County Xray program, pointed out that the TB this year over last year is ave his chest X-rayed in all future clinics held here. Tuberculosis can develop in less than 12 months, he reminded.

Ritter was notified of the results of the Wheeler County survey by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Dr. Cox's letter

BRANNAN WOULD HAVE GOOSE-STEP FARMING

In reversing itself for the second time in four days, the Senate returned to some degree of common sense on farm price props. The Anderson plan, now in favor in the Senate, is more complicated and less sound than the Aiken law already on the books and not in need of change. But at least it would be

better than either the Brandsn plan being william being pushed by the Truman administration or the Anderson plan as emasculated by an earlier Senate vote. That vote had taken the flexibility out of the Anderson plan by making the price supports on major crops 90 percent instead of the now restored 75 to 90 percent

· As long as we must have federal price supports, they should be the flexible ones favored in the last Democratic platform. I is dubious economics to try to keep farm orices artifically high by law; but when that is done, the price levels should be able to rise and fall with the cost of living.

Meanwhile, the administration appears to be still trying to ram the crackpot Brannan plan down the throat of Congress. This plan has been turned down by Congress once, Bible Classes and three of the four big farm organizations Worship and Sermon 11:00 a. m. 7:30 p. m. are opposing it. The Brannan plan would fix the prices of farm products by federal manipulation and would make every farmer dependent of government checks. It would give bureaucrats in Washington absolute control over farm operations. It would lay on the taxpayer an additional burden so heavy that even its author, Charles F. Brannan, refuses to estimate it.

With most of the farmers on record as opposed to the Brannan plan, the only reason for the administration's continued insistence upon it seems to be the desire to obtain a firmer grip on the nation's economy for the purpose of remaining in power indefinitely. -From The Dallas Morning News
