## **OPPORTUNITY-TOOK ADVANTAGE OF IT** WON

In 1946 these boys won the first Opportunity Awards at the A. and M. College of Texas-fouryear scholarships for outstanding Texas high school graduates who would otherwise be unable to attend college. This year they are graduating from Texas A. and M. with college records which prove they took advantage of the opportunity.

Honor graduates of Texas high schools in 1946, the boys were selected for Opportunity Awards by the college Scholarships Committee on the basis of scholarship, leadership, character and need.

Each of them received \$200 to \$300 a year plus a job to pay college expenses. The jobs they have held during school include those of waiter in the mess halls, fry cook in a cafe, stable boy, yard man, laboratory assistant, printer's devil and baby sitter. During summer vacations they have worked on farms and ranches, in offices, on the highways and as roughnecks in the oil fields.

Required to make above-average grades in order to hold their scholarships, they have ranked high in their classes. One has an almost perfect A average for his four years. The average of all grades made by the entire group in four years is above B.

They have won their share of honors in other campus activities. One was president of their Freshman class, another outstanding in intramural athletics, while another won a summer fellowship for leadership in campus religious activities. Five were elected to the top military honor organization, the Ross Volunteers, and six to top scholarship honor societies. Nine will graduate as Honor Military Students.

Since this "pilot" group entered school in 1946, the Opportunity Awards program has grown. There are now 148 boys enrolled at Texas A. and M. College on these scholarships, with sixty or more expected to be granted opportunities next September.







## **On Loose In Texas**

The more than 2,000 cases of syphilis and 3,000 cases of gonorrhea reported throughout the state since the first of the year signifies the pressing need for continuing public education in matters of venereal disease, State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox believes.

Cox appealed for state-wide participation in making "Better Health for Texans" a year long program. A "Better Health For Texans Week" was officially desingnated by Governor Allan Shivers last December.

Cox said the response of the public, the press, radio, motion picture theaters, television, and other agencies and individuals during the campaign was excellent."

"But," he said, "the continued success in reducing the incidence of VD requires the full support of all the public."

The veteran of more than 13 years as State Health Officer said his department was continuing an "intensified" campaign against venereal infections through "all media of mass education-newspapers, radio, feature releases, and talks to luncheon clubs and civic organizations."

"We've even gone into television to carry our VD warning to the people," Cox asserted. He said his division of public health education had recently produced a color film and a motion picture trailer which were available for loan to television stations through local agencies.

He said any organization desiring informational pamphlets, posters, and prepared speeches on the subject of venereal diseases could get them by writing to the State Department of Health at Austin.





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
