The team which is composed of James Gaines, Red Crossland, Jamie Clark and J. T. Johnson will leave Thursday evening and journey to Aggie Land in the high hopes of copying the top honors in the state meet.

There will be approximately 65 teams from all over the state of Texas at the meet Saturday and they will represent the cream of the crop of FFA livestock judging teams of the Lone Star State.

The classes to be judged will include beef calves, sheep and hogs. There will also be a class of butcher cattle to grade for market determination and a class of feeder calves to grade for the same purpose.

Barring ill fortune, Instructor Clepper states that he has high hopes of his team finishing well toward the top in this contest.

A committee composed of all the Wheeler High School faculty and representatives of the local American Legion Post has selected James Gaines and Lindon Sanders to attend Lone Star Boys State at Austin June 4 to 11.

The basis for the selection was scholarship, citizenship and leadership. The boys are average American boys who will make good citizens in Lone Star Boys State the committee believes. Both these boys have good grades in school and have demonstrated outstanding citizenship and leadership ability.

James Gaines has been a manager of the football team, a class officer, a FFA officer for 2 years, was a member of the football team last year and is a candidate for Lone Star Farmer in the FFA.

This is the first time the Wheeler American Legion has undertaken to sponsor this enterprise but it will be an annual affair in the future. It will give freshman and sophomore students something to work for and should result in better citizens in Wheeler High School in the future.

## Community Will Improve Building For Meets, Shows

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce has been talking about and working on plans to straighten up and make the old army buildings which stand just east of the water tower in Wheeler useful to the people of this territory.

The local chamber believes that these buildings can be made invaluable to the people of this community and trade territory by fixing them up as a combined meeting place for clubs and farmer groups and a place where various livestock and farm shows can be held.

It has been estimated that the cost of the program which the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce has outlined will run between \$1,200.00 and \$1,500.00 and it is hoped that the greater portion of these funds can be raised by public subscription from the people of this trade territory who will benefit the most from having access to a meeting place of this sort.

Some farmers and ranchers in this area have already made small donations to a fund which will be used on the project.

The building now belongs to the Wheeler County Veteran's Vocational School and is located on city property but neither of the two are using the building in its present state, in fact, it is not usable in its present state. The Vocational School has signed a contract that the building will become the property of the community at the termination of the training program.

The place will be known as the Wheeler Community Building and will be open to farmer and agriculture groups for meetings and shows. It will also have a couple of rooms which can be used as meeting places for such groups as the Wheeler County Home Demonstration Council, the boy and girls scouts and other worthy organizations.

The plans call for a large show and meeting room with a stage, rest rooms for both men and women, a kitchen, and three other rooms. The building is to be set on a solid foundation, and stuccoed and dashed to improve its looks. Between the two wings of the building is a large area which is to be concreted and will be used as a show place for livestock shows when the weather is good.

If you are interested in seeing something like the above in Wheeler, be thinking just what YOU can do to help accomplish this and be ready when you are given a chance to help on the project.

## ROGERS VISITS HERE 4TH TIME

Walter Rogers, Gray County Democratic candidate for Congress visited Wheeler for the 4th time in this fast and furious campaign on Wednesday night about 9:00 p. m. **HIKING POSTAL RATES**

Postmaster General Donaldson, who recently cut mail service to save money, has just appeared before a Senate committee to

say that what the Postoffice Department needs above everything else is a "comprehensive, substantial upward revision in rates and fees." The service cuts ordered by the postmaster general have been accepted with only a nominal outcry. It is doubtful whether the same should be true of this new recommendation.

The House already has passed a measure which would increase postal rates on second class mail matter by an estimated \$130 million a year. Mr. Donaldson properly is critical of some of the provisions of this measure as being discriminatory against certain users of the mails and as being difficult and costly to put into operation. His recommendation is for a hike of 25 percent in all postal rates each year for the next four years.

Mr. Donaldson laudably is concerned with the mounting deficit of the postal system, now amounting to more than half a billion dollars a year. One way to overcome a deficit, of course, is to increase revenues, and that is what the postmaster general proposes. Another avenue is to lower expense of operation through greater efficiency, and it is notable that the postmaster general, in his testimony before the Senate committee, was entirely silent on that point.

In fact, the Postoffice Department has shown an antagonistic attitude toward the recommendations of the Hoover Commission for eliminating waste and inefficiency in the system and introducing modern, business-like methods into its operation. One of the points made by the commission was that the department has no way of ascertaining what the costs of any of its operations are, much less what they should be.

There are some indications that present rates would not be sufficient to meet the department's costs even if it were operating on an efficient basis. But until waste and inefficiency are erased, until the department has some means of determining just where its loss is, there is no way to ascertain just where or how much postal rates should be increased.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram

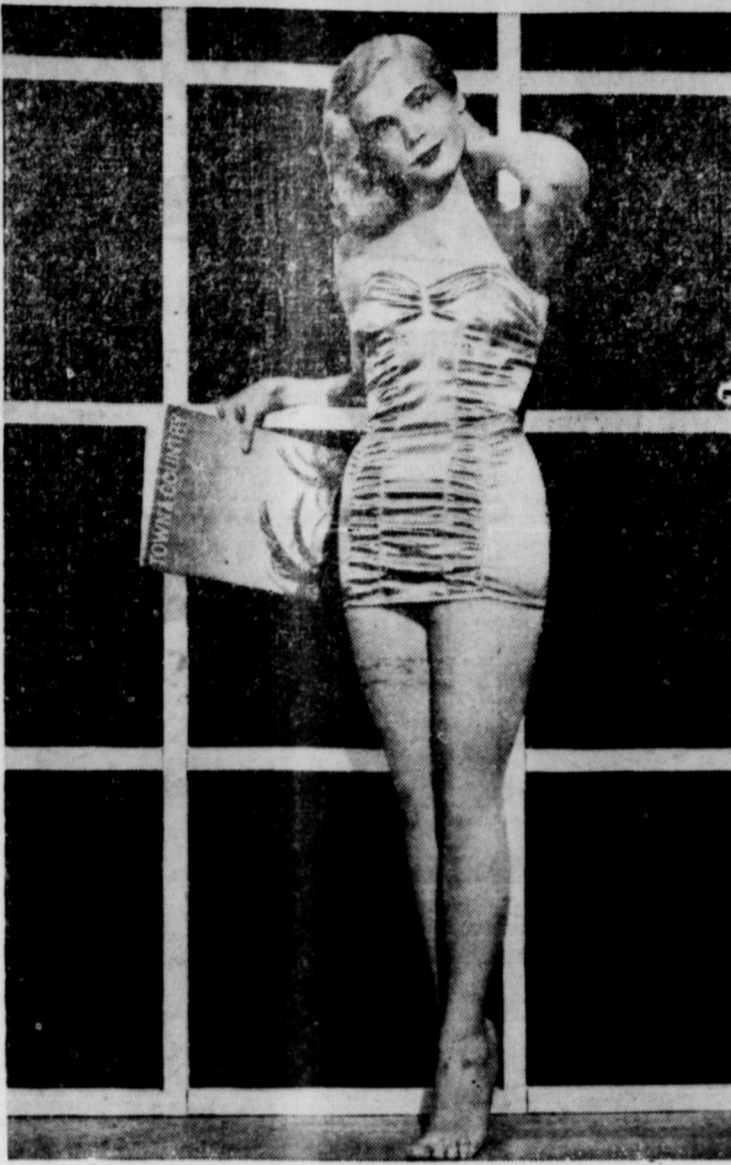

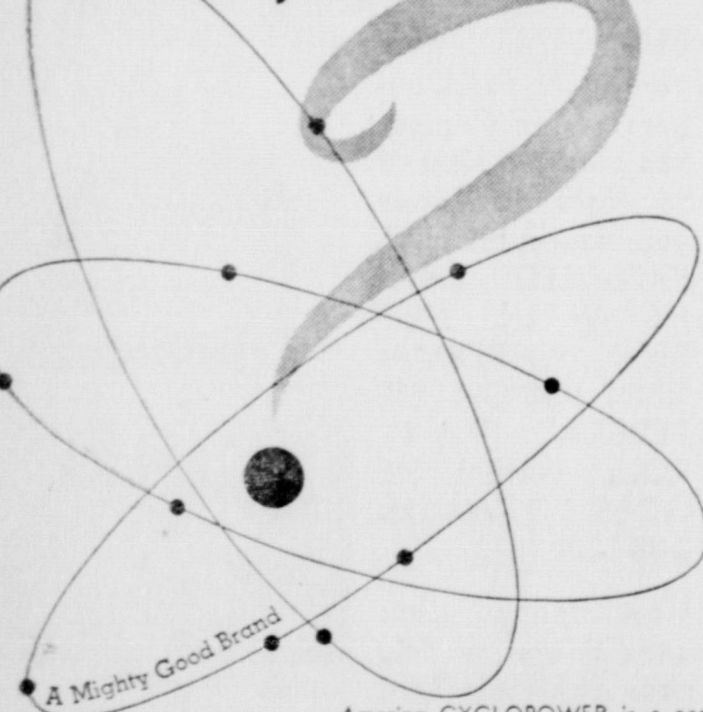

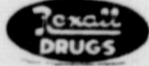
