## Rain Falls, Water Rises, Clouds Hang

### 2 1/4" Received In Short Time Period

The rains did fall, the water did run and the clouds hung low. Tuesday afternoon the clouds built on both sides of Wheeler, then suddenly the rain was here. In a very short time 2.25 inches of rain fell, flooding streets and highways. The fire departments in Wheeler, Briscoe and Allison were called into action with the report of "low hanging clouds" at Beef Cattle Company. Wheeler was not put under tornado watch at any time; we were under a flood and thunderstorm watch.

Jimmy Adams, Jennifer and I went down to check on the "shelter". Water had gone across the floor, but the fill around the structure and next to the creek was still in good shape. The creek was up, but just barely out of its banks.

I am told Wheeler was mentioned on an Amarillo TV station. Normally on the maps we are only an area between "Shamrock and Canadian". A rainfall measurement of 2.30" was reported.

The immediate Wheeler area received 2.25" of rain Tuesday evening. This moisture was accompanied with some wind and a little hail. The Wheeler, Briscoe and Allison Volunteer Fire Departments were called for storm watch around 6:00 in the evening.

The Wheeler Fire Department was also called into service to guard flood areas. The water covered the roadways on three directions from Wheeler. The worst was south of Wheeler near Maxey's Restaurant on Highway 83. Wheeler's streets drain to the north of Wheeler and with heavy rains, Highway 83 is covered for a time at the north edge of the city limits. Highway 152 was covered with water in the 500 block.

The 2.25" was measured on both sides of Wheeler with Tommie Puryear reporting only 0.8" at the ranch 8 miles east of Wheeler.

Tuesday morning, 0.2" was measured for the official amount of moisture received during the previous night.

Wind damage was visible at Lee Hardware and Furniture. The aluminum front on the business has been in place for a number of years. The complete facing was loosened by the wind and a portion in the middle was pulled completely free of its anchor. An estimate of the damage was not available.

**County Taxpayers Protests To Be Heard**

Taxpayers in the Wheeler County Appraisal District will have an opportunity later this month to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests on June 24, 1988.

After the ARB concludes its hearings and approves final property values, local governments will use these values to assess property taxes to property owners for 1988.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the district's directors. Their responsibilities are outlined by the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and uniformly and that exemptions and productive valuation are properly granted.

Property owners appear before the ARB and may protest any of these seven specific actions of the appraisal office:

- the appraised or agricultural value of the property;
- unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to other property in the district;
- inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
- denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;
- denial of agricultural-use, open-space or timber productivity valuation;
- identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;
- determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property; and
- any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects them.

Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser for the district, outlined the steps for a property owner to file a protest on mineral and industrial property. First, the property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB. This must be filed by June 1 or within 30 days after the taxpayer receives a notice of appraised value from the chief appraiser, whichever is later.

However, if the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records, the property owner has only 10 days to file a protest.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal district office. "A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable," Copeland said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property which is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office."

Each protesting taxpayer may offer evidence or argument either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Taxpayers should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear protests of those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the schedule appearance date. Copeland said that protest hearings will be held for one day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on June 24, 1988. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities," available at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office, which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. 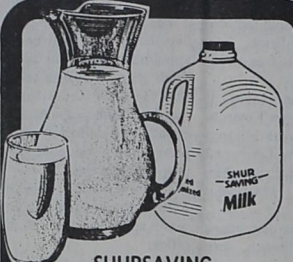
