Editorial

**FACTS FOR TEXAS
TO THINK ABOUT**

You can not be too critical of Vice-President
Alben Barkley for dodging the FEPC,
tidelands and other vital Texas issues in his
speech at Austin. Most men in public life do
a good deal of careful maneuvering in delicate
situations. Straddling becomes an art. It
would be better for the people they are supposed
to serve if they would hew to the line.

It would help clarify issues in the public
mind. But the turnover in office would be
greater. And officeholders are human.

A certain amount of this political artfulness
is natural in democratic government. Some
give-and-take is necessary. But here in
Texas, and throughout the South, an
extraordinarily paradoxical situation has
developed. The party which keeps Mr. Barkley
in high official position has drifted far from
the political principles in which a majority
of Texans believe. The party is closer to
Harlem than to Hill County. And the party
leaders listen to Harlem, not Hill County,
because Hill County (along with Dallas and
most of the other counties of Texas) has
somehow got into a habit of voting for a
political label rather than a political principle.

They do so partly because of prejudices
dating back to carpetbag days, overlooking
the new carpetbagger that is trying to steal
our tidelands. They do so partly because of
the leadership of many Texas and other
southern congressmen who think one way
and line up another way because of their
vested interest in a party and a party label.

Allen Duckworth, state editor of The
News, outlined the utterly inconsistent situation
in an article on this page May 23, calling
attention to the political maneuvering and
hypocrisy in such matters as the Truman
civil rights program, Taft-Hartley act and
tidelands. He stated that a conscientious
newspaperman feels a sense of futility when
he tries to write the truth about the situation.

This statement is borne out by the fact
that Mr. Barkley, advocate of the civil rights
bill, attended a dinner where Negroes had
been barred but couldn't afford to mention
the issue, nor anyone of several others vital
to Texas. It is an astounding situation. It is
not good for the civic and economic welfare
of Texas. It is not good for democratic
government.—From Dallas Morning News

KITCHEN MEMO

The label of "boardinghouse dish"
has been tagged to *Trifle* too long.
When correctly made, it's a fit de-
sert for the most epicurean com-
pany into a shallow serving dish
pour 1/2 cup sherry. Then put into
dish 1 single layer sponge cake
(two or three days old) cut into
fairly thin slices, spread with
currant jelly, raspberry or straw-
berry jam. While cake soaks up
the wine make a boiled custard:
Scald 3 cups milk in top of double
boiler. Beat 3 eggs with 1/2 cup sugar
and 1/2 tsp. salt. Pour the hot milk
over this stirring constantly. Put
back into top of double boiler, cook
over medium flame. Stir contin-
uously until just barely thick. Re-
move and stir in 1/4 tsp. vanilla.
Let cool with cover on, then pour
over cake in wine. Chill well. Deco-
rate with dots of jelly or jam and
whipped cream if you wish. 4 gen-
erous servings.

Whooping Cough Can Be Avoided Says Dr.

Many people do you know who are suffering from whooping cough, for example, it is ridiculous for children to suffer when it may be avoided by simple vaccination.

th and tears at the chest and throat walls. Pertussis is prevalent among children everywhere. About 15 out of every 100 cases are in children under two. North America, from time to time, seems to have more than its fair share of cases.

Sometimes it's fatal, especially to very small children. About 85 out of every 100 whooping cough deaths are among two-year-olds and less. And, strangely enough, most deaths are among girls. In 1949 Texas had 46 whooping cough deaths. So far in 1950, an average of 323 cases have been reported every week.

Whooping cough is spread through droplet infection—that is,

by breathing air contaminated by a sneeze or cough infected person. You can get it from using the personal things of an infected person, too. It is communicable from about 7 days after exposure until three weeks after the coughing starts.

The important thing about whooping cough is that vaccination may protect against it. It's the only thing that will. If an unvaccinated child gets the disease, he will thereafter have what is called a "definite and prolonged immunity." But the fact of the matter is that second attacks have been known to occur.

Vaccination of all preschool children is the answer to control.

"Booster" shots may be advisable within a year after the initial vaccination. Your family doctor will make that decision.

For thrift with light, either daylight or electric, there is an advantage in light-colored walls, woodwork, and furnishings. This is because the white or light colors reflect light and dark colors absorb it.

Three new grain sorghum varieties, Combine Kafir-60; Redbine-60 and Redbine-66 have been developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. No seed is available at this time, however, multiplications are now being made.

Seed of a new variety of grain sorghum, Hi-Hegari, has been released to certified seed growers for increase by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Some seed for 1951 plantings will be available through regular trade channels. The new variety is a heavy forage yielder and was developed primarily for forage and silage.

Have you zealously saved leftover egg yolks to find they dried out? Well, from now on, cover them with cold water and store in a covered dish in the refrigerator. They'll be as moist and ready for use as the day you bobbed them of their whites.

In lieu of a gilded electric grill, you can toast sandwiches in a skillet on top of the range. Simply melt 1 tablespoon of vitaminized margarine in the pan and when sizzling hot toast the sandwich in it on both sides until golden brown.

In these times of housing shortages and cramped living quarters, you must decorate with an eye to space. Avoid cat-corner arrangements since they tend to make a room cluttered and disorganized.

The use of a new method of control for the corn earworm may make sweet corn a profitable crop in areas where previously the damage done by the earworm made the crop unprofitable. Spray applications of an emulsion containing DDT, mineral oil and water has proved successful.

The best possible care should be given to peach trees suffering from delayed foliage. The delayed foliage is a result of last

winter's mild weather. There wasn't enough cold weather before February 15 to break the rest period of the trees. This condition has occurred in Texas only four times in the past 50 years.

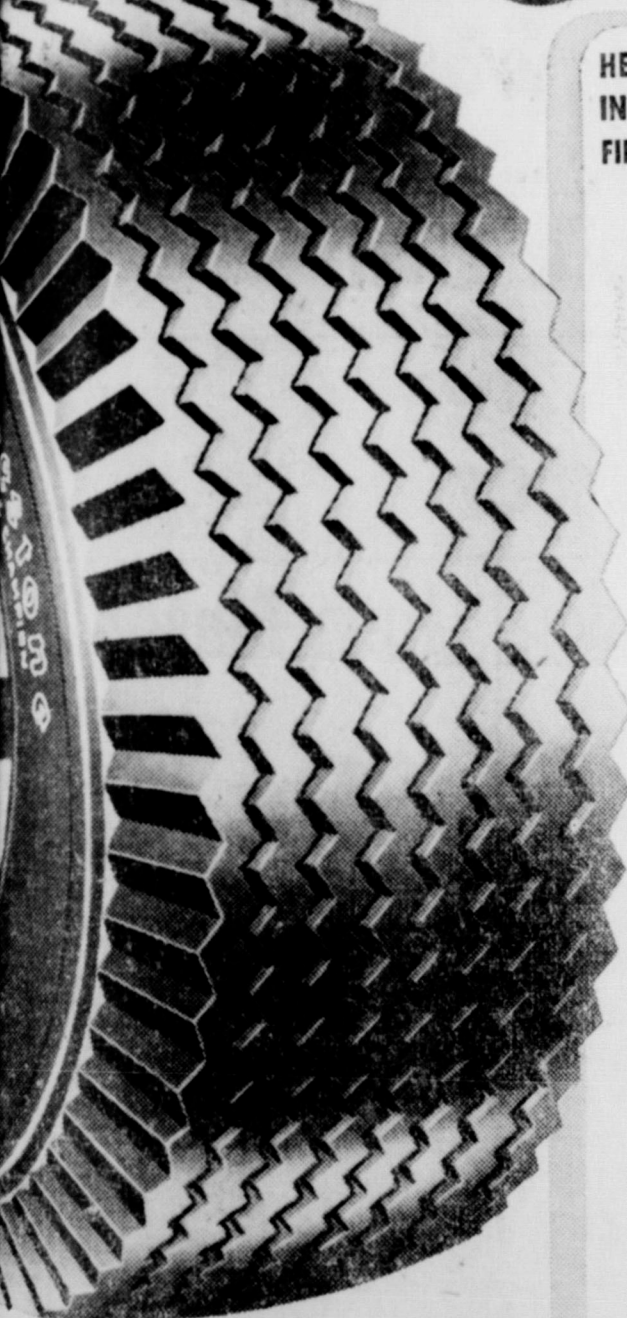
Before the pressure cooker is used, it should be cleaned and checked. Be sure the pressure gauge is registering correctly and safety valve is working properly.

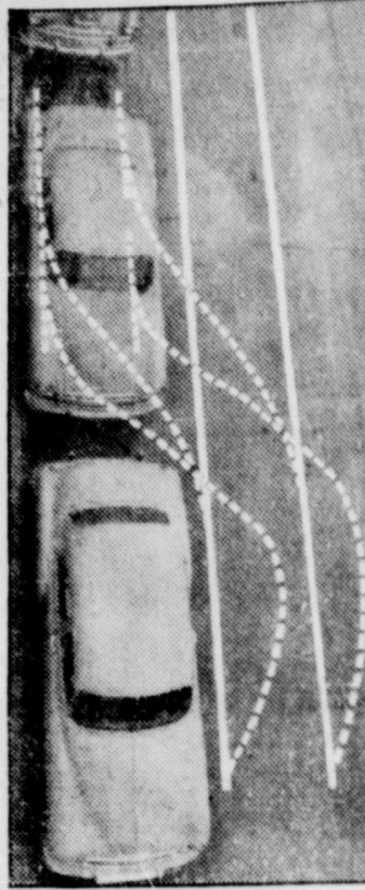

How Much Do You Know About Lights

FIXED-TIME (STOP AND GO) HIGHWAY TRAFFIC SIGNALS

What do you know about highway traffic signals? If your knowledge is limited to the fact that you go when the signal shows green and stop when it shows red, you can make the problem of traffic control an easier one for your public officials by knowing more about traffic signals.

You can help bring about uniformity of traffic signals by learning to identify the standard traffic signal and then encouraging your officials to use only standard types when they install new signals or replace existing non-standard signals. Wouldn't it be much easier for you to understand the indications given by traffic signals if they were all of the same design in every town and state? In fact, standardization of traffic control signals is considered so desirable and important that the Fiftieth Texas Legislature specified that all highway traffic signals installed in Texas after 1947 shall conform to National Stand-

ards. The sketch will help you identify the most common type of a standard fixed-time (stop and go) signal for suspension over the center of the highway. To be standard each face must have at least three lenses, with red at the top, yellow below the red, and green below the yellow. Additional lenses, showing arrows and walk-wait, may be added at complicated intersections to provide for special movements of traffic. The standard position of the lenses is not only helpful to every motorist, but it is especially helpful to the color blind who can tell whether to stop or go by the difference in brightness of the lenses when they cannot distinguish colors.

The yellow signal, which follows green only, plays a very important role. It warns traffic in motion that the signal indication will change; it provides a clearance time for traffic already in the intersection and for traffic approaching so closely that to stop would be hazardous; and it permits operation of yellow as a flashing caution signal when the

signal is not being operated as a stop and go signal.

There are a large number of traffic signals in use today that were installed before the present standards were adopted, and they do not conform to present standards. Unfortunately there are some local units of government who still buy non-standard signals without the yellow lenses. Some of these two-section signals show both red and green at the time they are changing color, which is not only confusing but also hazardous.

You can also help with the problem of traffic control by understanding the functions of traffic signals and their limitations.

A well designed and operated traffic signal installed on the basis of factual studies of the number of vehicles and pedestrians, accidents, speers, delays, and physical conditions of the location can render invaluable service in the smooth and safe flow of traffic. On the other hand, an unjustified, ill designed, inefficiently placed, improperly operated, poorly maintained signal is not only a waste of public funds, but it causes unnecessary delays to traffic, disobedience of signal indications, use of alternate routes, and often, an increase in accidents.

After years of study and experience, National authorities have set out the conditions that will justify the installation of a traffic signal. Unfortunately, too many traffic signals have been installed on the basis of opinion rather than facts, and upon the mistaken idea that they are a cure-all for all traffic problems. The result has been a hindrance to traffic rather than a help. How many times have

you, as a law abiding citizen, been forced to stop at some insignificant cross street and wait for a signal to change to green when there was a car or pedestrian in sight? Did this unnecessary delay improve your disposition and your respect for traffic signals? Another common fallacy is that a single stop and go signal can control speed, and this belief has resulted in a number of unjustified signals. The signal may slow down the speed demon or even stop him while the signal is red, but while the signal is showing green, it only offers a challenge for the speed demon to go faster to get by it before it does turn red. Traffic signals cannot write traffic tickets for traffic violations—you still need traffic officers to enforce traffic rules and regulations. Remember these things about traffic control by insisting that your local officials install only standard signals in the future and that they be installed only after a factual study has been made by a competent engineer to determine whether or not they will be a help or a hindrance to traffic.

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

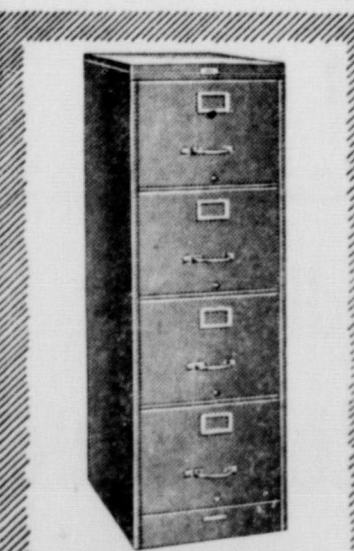
1. What is the average weight of fleece from a range ewe? How many fleeces are packed into each bag of wool at shearing time?

The average weight of fleece from a single ewe varies between 7 and 10 pounds. Weights also vary between flocks, localities, and regions, influenced by breeding as well as environmental factors. When packed, fleeces are arranged in symmetrical layers in the sacks and are compressed by tramping. Each bag contains from 27 to 35 fleeces, depending on size.

2. How often should horses be treated for worms and bots, and what is the best method?

Most horses become infested with worms and should be wormed at least once a year. The proper agent to use in worming varies with the type of worm. A veterinarian can determine the kind of worm by a microscopic examination of the manure. For safety, the administration of the expellent should be left in his hands. Colts and developing young horses should be watched very closely for infestation, such as loss of flesh, shaggy coat, and generally run down condition.
