

There is talk of a syndicate which boasts millions and millions of dollars annually, with operations around race tracks and bookmaking, as well as with slot machines and other forms of vice. Most of the large cities are involved in preliminary reports, which also tell of criminal activity in New Orleans and California.

The investigation will demonstrate, once Teacher's Meet, Tues. _ 8:00 p. m. again, that the Federal Government is alone able to cope with criminals who cross state lines whenever law enforcement officials get hot on their trail. No California or Louisiana inquiry, for example, can follow the trail of the criminal syndicates into Florida, Illinois or New York. This is a job that a Federal investigation alone can accomplish.

While we are somewhat tolerant of the minor vices of men and women, including Wed. Eve. Classes -limited betting and minor gambling, no person should confuse these habits with the operations of a well-organized and well-protected criminal syndicate. Professional gamblers, like bootleggers in prohibition days, amass Church School . considerable wealth and pass it around to corrupt susceptible individuals. They constitute a menace and the sooner they are uncovered and punished, the better for the nation as a whole.

There are some Congressmen, who would like to investigate some of the investigations that are going on.

The child who attempts to reform father and mother ought to be between the shafts pulling the family load.

The trouble with many American homes is that they have no "head of the house" and no "wife of the house."

Democracy is not assisted by careless criticism of officials, whether they serve local, state or federal governments.

in calves down, watch all these Feed limited amounts of milk

for 30 days rather than overfeeding on milk. Feed proper balanced dry calf feed, block salt, and plenty of

fresh water.
3. Thoroughly wash all utensils after each use.

4. Keep calves dry and free from

Question: Why should dairy cows be fed a special ration during the dry period?

Answer: It is especially important that the dry cow be fed a special grain ration high in minerals and vitamins, since a high producing cow is unable to consume enough feed nutrients to nourish the unborn calf, produce a heavy flow of milk, and keep up her body. Records at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company show that each pound of condi-tion during the 60 day dry period will give the following amounts of extra milk during the next
