





What's Time to a Hog?

proved production programs and protein supple-ments that contain the right kinds a considerable saving in feed costs because early gains take less feed than when the hog is older.

In addition, getting hogs to mar-ket two weeks earlier often means the difference between hitting peak prices and a sagging market. For example, on September 15, 1949, the top price for hogs was \$22.50. Just two weeks later, the prices was down to \$20.50-a drop of exactly \$2.00. On just one litter of nine hogs, this difference could be as much as \$35 to \$40.

Research has shown that pigs need more protein until they weigh 100 to 125 pounds, so don't follow the accepted practice of changing when the pigs are weaned. After pigs weigh 100 to 125 pounds, a on with a lower protein content can be used.

Beat 2 egg whites until stiff. Then gradually beat in ½ cup sugar and ½ tsp. vanilla. Blend in 1 package spice cake mix (the prepared justadd-water kind) with 1 cup lukewarm water. Grease a 7x11-inch pan with unsalted shortening, line with greased waxed paper. Pour batter into pan and spread meringue on top with spatula. Sprinkle with ½ cup chopped walnuts or blanched almonds and bake in preheated gas oven (350°F.) for 35-40 mins. Cool in pan for 10 mins. before turning out. When cold, cut down center lengthwise and across in 1-inch bars. Yield: 22 cookies.

Bacteria Set Barns on Fire

Add bacteria to the list of little known causes of fire.

As explained by the National
Fire Protection Association, bacteria are believed to be the agent which produces the heat that leads to spontaneous ignition of hay and grain in barns. Fires of this kind cause an annual loss of millions of dollars, the NFPA

Spontaneous ignition place in hay or grain with a high moisture content, either because hay has been improperly cured or because water leaks into the barn. The moisture stimulates bacterial growth, and the theory is that heat is generated by oxidation of unstable bacterial com-

Heat accumulates until it reaches the flash point, which for hay is between 525 and 575 degrees Fahrenheit. At the flash point, the hay bursts into flame.

To prevent spontaneous igni-tion of hay, the NFPA recommends two precautions:

1-Cure hay thoroughly. At the time hay is stored in a barn mow, its moisture content should not be higher than 20 percent. 2-Make sure barn roofs will not leak. Weathertight asphalt


shingles can be placed on top of most old roof coverings. Another advantage of this kind of roofing is that it will not be kindled into flame by windblown sparks. The NFPA also suggests ventilating hay and grains as soon as they are put in storage. Of the

common grains, oats, corn and wheat are considered the most vulnerable to spontaneous igni-Besides the high financial loss attributed to spontaneous ignition

fires, "many more millions of dollars" are lost to simple spontaneous heating, the NFPA says. Heat can spoil farm products even when fire does not occur, the association explains.






