THE TAXPAYERS' STAKE

Texas taxpayers have more interest than Supreme Court doubtless will be asked to recent or more of the highways, sewers and | other public improvements that otherwise would be built.

The case is little known but vitally important. El Paso building trades labor unions brought an injunction suit against the Texas Sunday School Highway Commission, seeking to force the Morning Worship Highway Department to spend 20 per cent more money on an El Paso road project than the normal cost. The unions would compel the department to raise its pay scale on the road project to meet the scale being paid downtown building trade crafts.

For years there has been a traditional difference between scales for building construction and scales for construction of roads, sewers, dams and bridges. This is based on the fact that work on a downtown office building requires more skill than work on a highway bridge. For several years, however, the AFL building trades have been trying to erase this differential and fix a "union scale" for all heavy construction work. The added cost will be tremendous if the campaign is successful. The public will get about 20 per cent fewer highways for the get about 20 per cent fewer highways for the same money, according to the Highway Com

The department then stipulates that the successful contractor shall not pay wages less than those itemized on the bid proposal. It is upon these scales that the contractor bases his bid.

But, certainly there is no similarity between the road work which the State sought to do in El Paso and the construction of a downtown El Paso commercial building-or between the degrees of skill required to build roads and to build skyscrapers.

In spite of all this, the Third Court of Civil Appeals at Austin has ordered the low er court to rehear the case and award the union its injunction if no different evidence is submitted. Granting the injunction, of course, would set the precedent for raising the wage scale 20 per cent or more on all such public construction work in Texas.

It is to be hoped that the Texas Supreme Court will accept the case for review. Even to a layman, the law appears plainly written. -From Houston Post




