## Mobeetie To Play Wheeler For Title

Championship of the Tri-County Baseball League is at stake in a series of three games to be played by Wheeler and Mobeetie, starting at Wheeler next Sunday, and continuing at Mobeetie the following Sunday.

Site of the third game, if it is necessary, will be determined by the flip of a coin.

Game time on the championship series open at Wheeler next Sunday is 3 o'clock, and a record crowd is expected to be on hand to witness the hotly contested exhibition. The game will be broadcast direct from the playing field over KEVA, with Dr. Harold Nicholson expected to handle most of the play-by-play.

The Wheeler Legionnaires won the right to participate in the championship series by trouncing the Briscoe nine, 13 to 10, last Sunday. It was the third and deciding game of the Wheeler-Briscoe play-off. Briscoe had won the first game and Wheeler the second.

Mobeetie cleared the last hurdle for a place in the final go-round by taking Shamrock to a 12 to 6 cleaning Sunday. The two teams had split honors in the first two games played.

Wheeler started off Sunday by getting two runs in the first inning but the lead was short lived. Briscoe came back in the second for two runs to tie the game up. Briscoe picked up another run in the 6th to go out ahead but Wheeler came back in the seventh with one run to tie the game.

Wheeler picked up on run in the top of the eighth, but in the last of the eighth Briscoe bunched 4 hits and one error together, to get 6 runs and go ahead 9 to 4. In the top of the ninth was where the roof fell in on Briscoe. Wheeler sent 12 men to bat in that inning, seven men went to bat after that were out, to collect 7 hits and two errors to account for 9 runs.

Mrs. Howell will continue as society editor and bookkeeper. Richard Bradley will be in charge of the mechanical department, assisted by Maurice Pettit.

## County Chest X-ray Drive Opens at Mobeetie Sept. 8

With the start of the Wheeler County Free Chest X-ray campaign only two weeks away, W. R. (Tex) Ritter, county sanitarian, is working on final plans for the annual health-guarding campaign.

Once each year these chest x-rays are made available to every person over 15 years of age, free of charge by the State Health Department working in cooperation with County Sanitarian Ritter and all medical doctors of the county. This will be the third year the x-rays have been available to Wheeler county residents.

Mobeetie will be the first county stop of the mobile x-ray unit of the State Health Department this year. The unit will be stationed at the old American Legion building

on Friday and Saturday, September 8 and 9. Jim Hathaway is chairman of the drive in Mobeetie which will again be sponsored by the Mobeetie Lions club.

After a 2-day stand at Mobeetie, the mobile x-ray unit will move to the high school gymnasium at Wheeler for 3 days, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, September 11-12-13.

On Thursday the unit goes to Shamrock for a 3 day stand, winding up there on Saturday evening, September 16. The unit will be located in the Community Building at Shamrock and the dates of the free x-rays will coincide with the State-Line Free Fair. County Sanitarian Ritter has been assured the cooperation of all

county schools in the campaign, and it is hoped that the figure of 3,744 persons x-rayed last year will be passed. One extra day has been added at both Mobeetie and Wheeler this year and he thinks this will permit more people to take advantage of the free health check-up.

Ritter pointed out that taking of a chest x-ray picture requires less than two minutes time, is absolutely painless, and does not require disrobing. The health officer pointed out that a chest checkup often locates some physical disorder, either TB or otherwise, which a person could have corrected and perhaps add years of normal healthy living to their lives.

### VOTERS URGED CAST BALLOTS EARLY AS CAN

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. in next Saturday's Democratic run-off primary.

There are 15 voting boxes in the county, and in each instance, the voting will be held at the accustomed place. There are public buildings in which the election is held in all communities except Mobeetie in which box voting will be conducted at the Leonard Rathjen home. A. B. Crump, county democratic chairman pointed out.

Chairman Crump urges that everyone vote as early in the day Saturday as they possibly can so that election judges can keep up with the tallying and be through as soon after the polls close at 7:00 o'clock as possible. All judges are asked to please report to the Chairman at the courthouse in Wheeler as soon as they have their results tabulated.

## SCHOOL BELLS TO RING SOON

The office of Jesse J. Dyer, county superintendent of schools, is a busy place this week as many Wheeler county districts are readying plans for the opening of school for the fall term.

Many superintendents, principals and teachers are returning from summer school and vacations in time to make final preparations for the opening of school.

Formal announcements of opening dates will have been made by most county school districts by the end of this week, County Superintendent Dyer said. Teaching staffs have been completed in most cases and superintendents and principals will soon be ready to announce their complete teaching personnel and opening plans.

The Wheeler school will begin class room work on Monday, September 4, Allison and Briscoe are expected to open at the same time, although formal announcements have not been made by all of them.

Activities will actually get underway at the Wheeler school on Friday night, Sept. 1, with a meeting of patrons and teachers at the Wheeler school cafeteria, beginning at 8 o'clock. Purpose of the meeting is to give parents and teachers a chance to get acquainted, and to permit the public to inspect the school plant which has undergone considerable repair the past summer.

Supt. W. O. Carrick said there will be a meeting of all teachers at 8 o'clock Saturday morning, Sept. 2, in the high school building.

Other schools expected to start up the first week in September are Shemrock, Kellerville, Lela and Bethel.

The sale will be located one mile south from New Mobeetie and then turn west three miles south and 1/2 west.

Roper's dairy cattle have been TB and Bangs tested. They are also free from Mastitis. He has been selling milk to the Borden's company.

Shelby Pettit will be the auctioneer and Henry Flanagan, Mobeetie will be clerk.

Democratic party heads joined candidates this week in appealing to voters to turn out en masse for the Democratic run-off Primary next Saturday.

There are important offices carrying tremendous responsibilities at stake, and Democratic chieftans over Texas this week are reminding citizens it is their patriotic duty to inform themselves of the qualifications of all candidates and to go to the polls and vote Saturday.

Too many citizens are inclined to stay away from the polls in a run-off election unless there are exciting county races, local election officials observed.

Will Wheeler county—where there are only three county commissioner offices at stake, get out a representative vote?

A. B. Crump, county Democratic chairman, hopes so, and is doing all he can to drum up interest in precinct, district and state races. County Clerk Harry Wofford said Wednesday a record total of 114 absentee votes had been cast when absentee voting ended Tuesday.

An estimated 2,990 votes were cast in the July Democratic primary in Wheeler county. A goodly number were mutilated but there were a total of 2,909 votes cast in the county tax assessor-collector's race. Will there be two-thirds of this vote cast next Saturday?

Three county commissioner jobs, in precincts 1, 3 and 4, are creating the most local interest, of course. And the district congressional contest between Walter Rogers of Pampa, and Altavene Clark of Amarillo, is causing some excitement.

Candidates in precinct 1 are Clifford Walser and W. L. Erwin; in precinct 3, C. W. Wells and Sam McMurry, and in precinct 4, John O'Gorman and Loren L. Sec.

All three races are expected to be close, with only a handful of votes separating the two high men in each race in the July primary. State offices to be voted on Saturday and the candidates are as follows: lieutenant governor, Ben Ramsey of San Augustine county and Pierce P. Brooks of Dallas county; associate justice of supreme court, place 1, Will Wilson of Dallas county and Fagan Dickson of Bexar county; associate justice of supreme court, place 3, George W. Harwood of Dallas county and Meade F. Griffin of Hale county; judge of criminal court appeals, W. A. Morrison of Milam county and Robert L. (Bob) Lattimore of Dallas county; commissioner of Agriculture John C. White of Wichita county and J. E. McDonald of Travis county.

## Election Party At Wheeler Saturday

There will be an election party at the Wheeler County Court House Saturday night beginning as soon after 7 o'clock as the first results are received. Results from various boxes will be posted on a large board on the west steps of the court house as quickly as received.

A. B. Crump, county Democratic chairman, urges precinct election officials to call in their returns to him at Wheeler as soon as the count is completed.

**Editorial**

**COMMITTEE CLASH**

The division inside the Senate Foreign  
Relations Committee, which has been brewing  
for some weeks, seems to have come to a  
head with the result that our experimental  
bi-partisan foreign policy is at an end. The  
reasons for the failure are many, but in the  
public view the collapse is another evidence  
of the complete confusion prevailing in the

nation's capital. While the long controversy has raged  
inside the foreign policy group for some  
time, the row broke into the open last week-  
end, when the Republican minority members  
made some particularly caustic remarks about  
the way the Democrats were handling the  
Far Eastern crisis. That Republican charge is a blunt one.  
It says that the policies of the Administration  
in the Far East have been so guided by  
Communist pressure that the United States,  
in effect, invited the attack in Korea. The  
charge boils down to this: "That is solely an  
administration policy; it was never a bi-  
partisan policy."

The Democrats came back in rebuttal  
to make an accusation of their own. Sen. Tom  
Connally, chairman of the committee, says  
the attack is "political" and is made solely  
for purposes of campaigning in the Novem-  
ber elections. Senator Pepper, of Florida,  
backed Connally in the charge.

It is, of course, true the Republicans have  
made no bones about saying they intend to  
use the administration's blundering on fore-  
ign issues as campaign ammunition, but  
that is going to be of little benefit to the  
nation as a whole in the present situation.  
There are other issues at stake in the Novem-  
ber elections, many of them local, and De-  
mocratic defeats or victories may and may  
not mean public repudiation of the adminis-  
tration's policies.

Because this split in foreign policy has  
come at a time when the country is facing  
the threat of all-out war, the conduct of  
members on both party sides is subject to  
censure. There is nothing the Kremlin likes  
better than division among its enemies, and  
it looks like the boys in Washington are go-  
ing all-out to make Stalin and Company  
happy.—Amarillo Daily News.

### Mother Does the Homework

More than one cookie will go to college this year. When your son or daughter is safe at the college dorm and you have met the roommate's parents, you may start thinking of that vacant place at the dinner table.

Don't throw away those recipes. Your good cooking is about to be recognized, not taken for granted.

#### College Cake

As dormitory life goes into full swing, a box from home will be as welcome as an "A" in chemistry. After the last cheers of "Oh, boy, for Friday" have subsided, you'll find a group headed for the nearest cookie outlet—or the room with the highest grocery rating.

A radio provides jazz in the background while underclassmen discuss parents, problems, and the star player on the football team. Whether it's quiet conversation or a jam session, your cooking is the feature attraction.

Cookies, chocolate nut squares, home made breads and rolls are favorites for the box from home. When you're cooking for Sue or Bob, remember that you'll get more than a single cheer when the gang discovers you. And you'll have an easier job if you can count on your range and refrigerator for even performance and constant convenience.

Refrigerator cookies are popular any time. On busy days, you whip up the mixture, mold it into rolls, wrap in moisture-vapor-proof material and place in the regular or moist-cold compartment of a two-temperature refrigerator. Or, if you don't get around to baking for several weeks, place the wrapped roll in the freezing compartment where the sub-zero temperature will keep the dough as fresh as the day it was mixed.

## FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

1. In our rabbit litters we occasionally have a long-haired or woolly individual. Is this the same as an Angora?

No. The Angora rabbit has been purposely developed through careful selection and breeding for fancy points. The occurrence of woolly or long-haired rabbits is a throw-back, and this characteristic is an undesirable trait. To eliminate the woolly from the rabbitry, avoid breeding from carriers of the gene.

2. How wide should cow stalls be?

They should be at least 3'8" wide for Guernseys and 4 ft. for larger cows. Most stalls are too narrow. Construction men say that wider stalls demand a wider barn to house the same number of cows, but the height of the hay mow can be less, so that the barn will cost about the same.

3. What can I do to prevent feather picking among my turkey poultts?

One of the major causes of feather picking is that turkey poultts have a tendency to clean their beaks on the feathers of other birds, which results in particles of wet feed sticking to the feathers. Other birds pick at these feed particles, sooner or later causing injury. At the Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm this has been reduced by stringing a piece of wire across the top of the feeder grills or just over the feeder at a convenient height so the poultts, while eating, can grab the wire in their beaks and clean them over the trough. This also helps prevent feed wastage, because the birds clean their beaks above the trough and the feed falls back into the feeder.

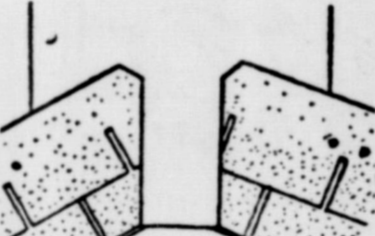

**MARINE CORPS WILL CALL MEN IN LOWER RANKS**

Colonel E. L. Hutchinson, Director of the Eighth Marine Corps Reserve District, New Orleans, has been directed by the Commandant of the Marine Corps Washington, D. C. to order to extended active duty in excess of thirty days all male enlisted members of the Volunteer Reserve in the rank of Sergeant and below, it was announced by the local Marine Corps Headquarters today.

"It is impossible to determine now the number of men to be called up per day" Colonel Hutchinson said, "and instructions relative to the calling to active duty of staff non-commissioned officers, warrant officers and commissioned officers of the Marine Corps Reserve will be published at a later date."

Enlisted reservists ordered to initial duty stations as follows: Those reservists with no prior active service, or those who did not complete recruit training will be ordered to a Marine Corps Recruit Depot for training. Those residing east of the Mississippi River will go to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, S. C.

and those residing west of the Mississippi River will be ordered to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, Calif. Reservists with former active duty other than aviation will be ordered to Marine Barracks, Camp Lejeune, N. C. and Marine Barracks, Camp Joseph H. Pendleton, Oceanside, California based on the above geographic considerations. Aviation reservists with former active service will be ordered to Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point, N. C. and Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, Calif., also based on the foregoing geographic considerations.

Those who received top priority in being ordered back to active duty are personnel in the following occupational fields: Construction and equipment, fire instruction and control repairmen, operational communications, communication material, electronics, motor transport, machine accounting, aviation electronics and air control.

Orders to reservists will allow a minimum of fifteen days between receipt of orders and assignment to extended active duty.

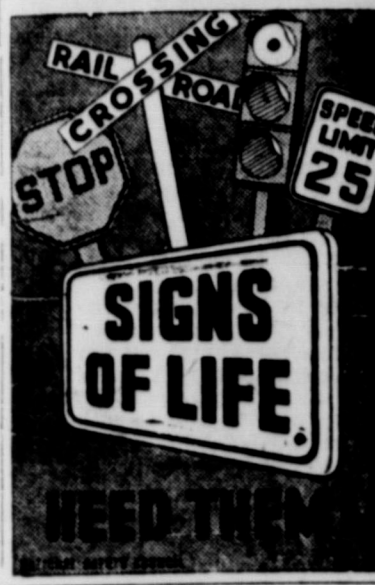
No enlisted reservists who received a waiver of over age for enlistment in the Marine Corps Reserve will be ordered to extended active duty at this time.

Detailed instructions are being mailed to Reservists on their being ordered to extended active duty.

The Director of the Eighth Marine Corps Reserve District is charged with ordering to active duty the enlisted reservists in the states of Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, and New Mexico, and with acting upon requests for delay in the call to active duty. Any appeal from the decisions of the Director will be made in writing to the Commandant of the

Marine Corps, via official channels including the District Director's office. If a request from a Reservist for delay in being ordered to active duty by the District Director is pending, and he is issued orders, he will be required to comply with the orders, awaiting final action on his appeal to the Commandant of the Marine Corps, Washington, D. C.

**TEXAS CITIES ADD FLUORIDE SALT TO WATER**

City fathers in three Texas cities, by artificially adding fluoride salts to their municipal water supplies, are making the dream of fewer tooth cavities come true. Corpus Christi and Marshall have fluoridation systems working now. Austin has one in the installation process.

If things go according to plan, children in these towns will be spared easily half the visits they now make to their family dentists, because they'll have fewer cavities. State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox describes the fluoridation process as a "tremendous step forward in the fight against dental diseases. It's simple and inexpensive, as well as effective."

tooth decay, but it will reduce decay from 23 to 47 percent."

He said that range of reduction percentage had been established in departmental experiments with artificial fluoridation in Marshall.

The addition of the chemical to drinking water in the ratio of 1 to 1.5 parts per million parts of water now has been recommended as a decay control measure by the United States Public Health Service, the American Water Works Association, and the Association of State and Territorial Dental Health Directors.

Recommendations are subject to approval of state and local health departments, which has been granted in the case of the three Texas cities.

Marshall began artificial fluoridation in 1946 in a controlled experiment, and was a leader in the field both nationally and locally. Corpus Christi began the water treatment in October last year.

Austin City Manager Walter Seaholm has indicated that orders for equipment have been placed, and treatment will begin as soon as delivery and installation are complete.

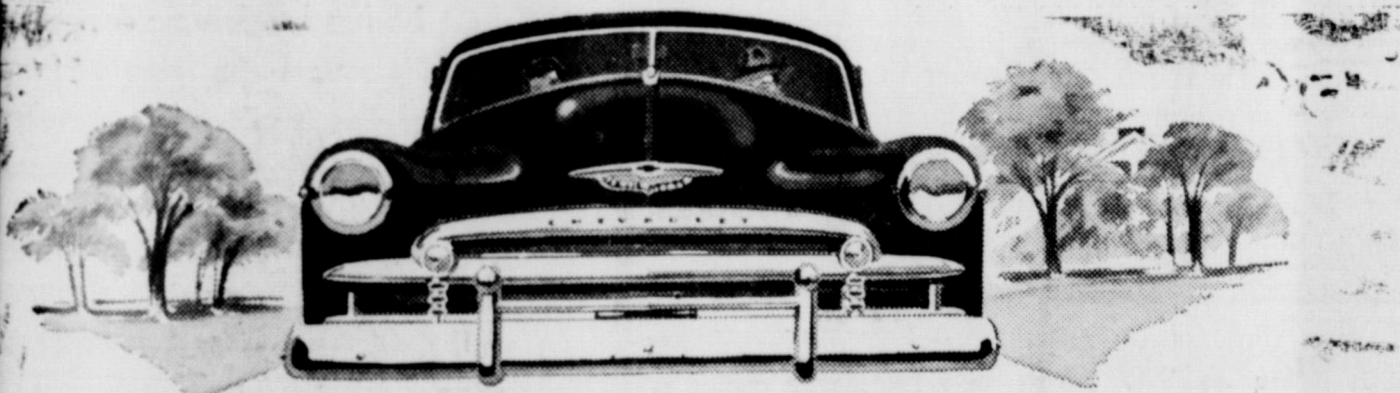

### CHILD LABOR EFFECTS FARMS

Since the opening of the fall term at school is approaching, everyone should know of the fact that Congress amended the Fair Labor Standard Act in 1949, also, that the Child Labor provisions of the Federal law were extended considerably, according to W. J. Rogers, regional director of the U. S. Department of Labor.

It is now illegal to employ children under 16 years of age in agriculture during school hours. In industry, the law prohibits the employment of oppressive child labor, generally boys and girls under 16 years of age, in interstate commerce or in the production of goods for commerce.

The law in reference to child labor in agriculture applies to local resident children as well as to migratory children, but not to the farmer's own children working on their parent's farm.

According to Rogers every farmer should know the facts of the child labor provisions because it is the farmers themselves who are responsible.

### NEWS FROM— County Agent's Office

By Ralph Wheat and Robert Ledbetter

Buck Wheat has been gone all this week taking his annual leave, but will be back Sunday. The reserves have called him back to active duty and if something doesn't happen quick we are going to be without a County Agent.

### MAIZE WORMS

There has been noted over the county some infestations of worms in maize heads. These worms will do considerable damage if the weather stays cool and cloudy, but a few days of hot dry weather would do more good than any mechanical control which could be applied. These worms are much like the cotton leaf worm, and will stop bothering the seed after the seed matures out of the green doughy stage and start ripening.

### PLANT ALFALFA

Now, and until the 15th of September is the time to plant winter legumes, especially alfalfa. This is necessary in order to get some growth before frost.

Particular care should be taken in preparing the alfalfa seed bed. It should be firm and free of weeds prior to planting.

Best results from first year alfalfa may be obtained by fertilizing deep. It may require as much as 200-300 pounds of super phosphate per acre along with a small amount of balanced fertilizer to raise the nitrogen content of the soil. This should serve to give the plants a boost at the early growing stage.

These booths are really an achievement for a community; therefore they should be supported wholeheartedly by all.

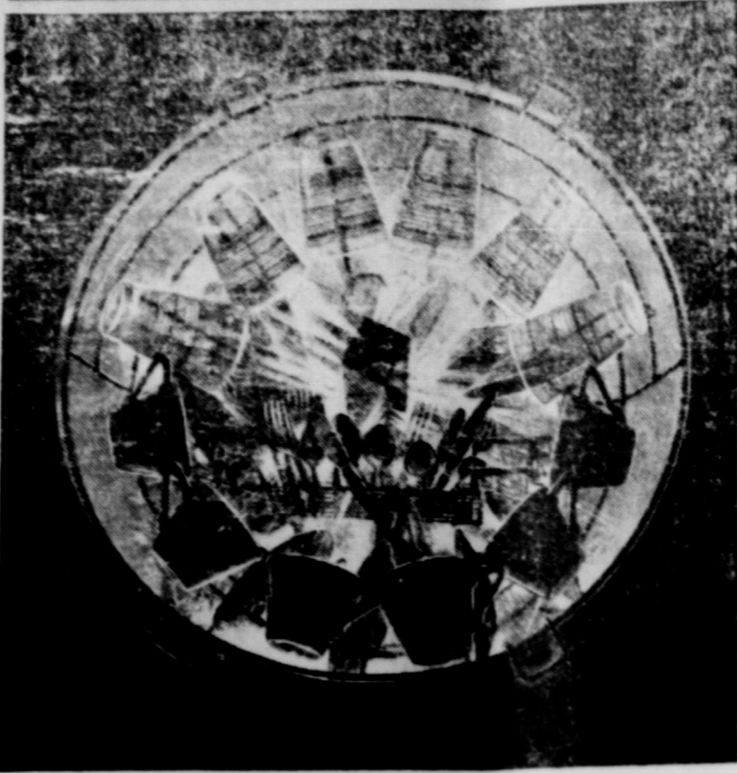

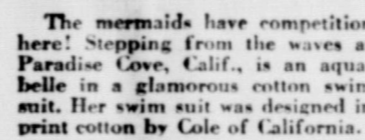
