Mustangs Beat Turkey, Play Vega Here Friday Night

The Wheeler Mustangs started off the 1950 football season with a bang last Friday night by taking an impressive 32 to 8 victory from a Turkey aggregation which outweighed them by exactly 20 pounds per man. The contest was the first home game of the season for the Mustangs as well as their first game of the year.

Things started happening early in the first quarter of the contest when Joe Bob Barnhill of the Turks intercepted one of Dick Pendleton's passes near the 15-yard line in the Turkey end of the field and returned it approximately 85 yards for the first counter of the contest. Ben Wiley's kick for extra point was blocked by the charging Mustang line.

The Mustangs came roaring right back to take the ensuing kick-off which Dick Pendleton returned to the Wheeler 49-yard line from which point they scored.

CO. SANITARIAN OUTLINES PLAN TO IMMUNIZE

A county wide program to immunize school children against small pox, diphtheria and typhoid fever, without cost to parents, was announced this week by W. R. Ritter, county sanitarian.


This will be the second county wide immunization program, the other being in October of 1947 at which time 1485 pupils participated. It was estimated at that time that 94 percent of all school children of Wheeler County were then immunized against the three dreaded diseases of small pox, diphtheria and typhoid fever.

Since it is recommended by the State Health Department and the Medical Association that typhoid be given booster shots every three years, and inasmuch as so many sources of drinking water in this area are dependent on rainfall for their cisterns, it is deemed advisable to gain offer this program as a preventative measure and keep our health standards in Wheeler County on as high a plane as is humanly possible.

Let's remember that we all have to live in the community together almost to the point of being one big family. When one or more of us are ill or have a disease, there is going to be an effect on some other person or group of persons.

Wheeler's first observance of National Kids' Day will be held Saturday, September 23 beginning with a free picture show starting at 10:00 o'clock.

Following the picture show which is "Rusty's Birthday" and a 3 Stooges Comedy, all the Kids' will be served Free Hot Dogs and Soda Pop beginning at 12:00 noon at the Wheeler School Cafeteria.

Beginning at 2:00 p.m. there will be a football game between the Wheeler and Grade School Teams and there will be all types of athletic contests for all the children that care to participate in them throughout the afternoon. Games will be supervised by Coach Bernie Smith, Barney Teague, W. O. Carrick and members of the Kiwanis Club.

Wendell Meek, who has been an active leader as scoutmaster, is general chairman in charge of the Kids' Day Celebration and he is due a great deal of credit for the work which he has done.

Meek, Harry Wofford, president of the local Kiwanis Club, and all members of the local organization extend a hearty invitation to all children in this vicinity to be in Wheeler Saturday and take part in the National Kids' Day observance.

A part of the program will include radio interviews of successful farmers and awarding of prizes for outstanding accomplishments with their crops.

MARMALADE-TOPPED COFFEE CAKE

- 1 package yeast, compressed or dry
- 1/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup orange
- 1/4 cup melted shortening
- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract (optional)
- 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
- marmalade

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add 1 cup flour and beat well. Add eggs. Beat well. Add softened yeast. Mix well. Add more flour to make a stiff batter. Add vanilla extract. Beat thoroughly until smooth. Cover and let rise until bubbly (about 1 hour). Prepare 2 8-inch square pans by spreading each with 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine and 1/2 cup orange marmalade. When batter is light, stir down. Spread over marmalade in pans. Let rise until light (about 20 minutes). Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Turn out upside down. Makes 2 8-inch coffee cakes.

 in that big family. Immunization is one way to forestall any such happening—and it is up to each of us as individuals to see that we, and our family, are properly protected by immunization.

Students will be handed slips at school asking written permission of the parents for their children to take the free vaccines against one, two or three of the diseases. The slips will be returned to school and they will enter the program according to their school schedule.

Vaccines are being furnished

without cost to county and city health officers by the Texas State Health Department and this entire program is in cooperation with the Wheeler County Superintendent of Schols, Superintendents of all Wheeler County schools and their respective school boards.

Immunization is not compulsory but it is hoped that parents will take advantage of the program which is aimed to cut out the death rate in the county through the elimination of small pox, typhoid and diptheria.

The following statement is often heard, "I don't like to have needles stuck in the arms of my children or in my own arm either for that matter"—but it is far better to have a little pain for a few seconds, than to have a pain that may cost you your life. None of us want to see our children suffer from anything—and not especially anything that we could have prevented.

Parents are asked to not the time and place their children will be given the vaccination. Absence of a student on the day set for the vaccination in his school district will make him ineligible to participate due to the limited time the practicing physician has for this project.

It is with a great deal of gratitude" states Ritter, "of making this project possible through the wholehearted cooperation of Wheeler County Health Officer Dr. Harold Nicholson, Jr., and City Health Officer Dr. Louis R. Devanney and Dr. Glenn R. Walker of Shamrock and Wheeler respectively, who are donating their time and efforts in this county wide health program.

Following is a listing of dates set for the immunization program:

September 25th—1 p.m. Mobeettie, Allison, Briscoe and Kelton will meet in the Wheeler High School Gymnasium.

September 26th—1 p.m. Students of Wheeler will meet at the Wheeler High School Gymnasium.

September 28th—1 p.m. Students of Shamrock, Lela, Keller, and Bethel schools will meet in the Shamrock High School Gymnasium for their immunizations.

Let's be sure that our children are given every chance to get started on the road of life in fine health. Give them the proper precautions in advance.

By immunization, large numbers of our people have been spared the suffering that might have been theirs—and their life has been prolonged where early death might have resulted. By giving your children immunization, their lives may be made free from suffering in later years—and their lives might be made longer and happier by your thoughtfulness now.

Those students that participated in the 1947 immunization program and had administered to them small pox or diptheria vaccines or who have been immunized by their family physician since that date,

need not participate in this program.
