Thursday and Friday nights will be graduation nights for area schools.

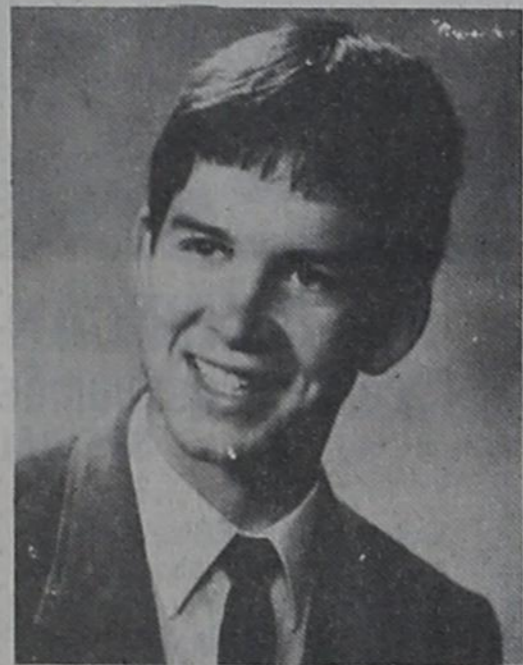

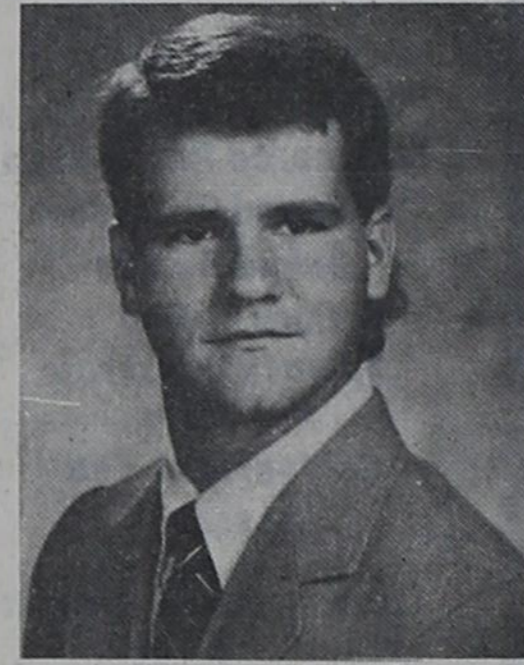

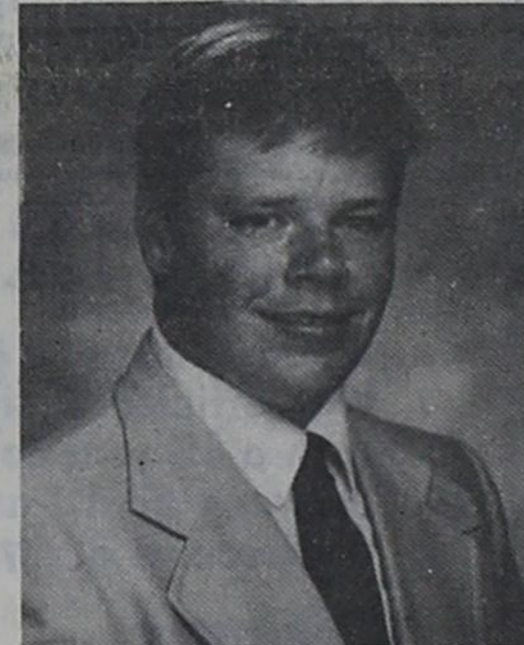

eliminate meat, you're removing the best source of protein and available iron from your diet. Instead, eat leaner cuts of meat and trim fat before cooking.
A cholesterol-lowering diet shouldn't cut out any class of foods entirely. Even some fat, mostly in a polyunsaturated form, is necessary for good health.
TRASH BAGS NOT FOR USE WITH FOOD
When working with food, it's wise to use only containers, cooking utensils and dishes designed for use with food.
For example, now that they come in so many sizes, plastic trash bags may seem to be convenient containers for any number of foods -- quarts of popcorn for a party, a disposable container for marinating meat, or handy wrapping for picnic foods.
Before you put food into plastic trash bag, however, check the package label. Very often there will be a statement indicating whether the bag is approved for use with food. If there is no statement, assume that the product is not approved for food use.
Materials used in the production of trash bags do not have to be tested for eating safety if the product is not considered to be generally used with food. The chemical process for manufacturing plastic bags may not permanently bind harmful components in the bag material. So it's possible, for instance, that an acid in meat marinade could allow chemicals in the plastic bag to get into your food. Also, a deodorant product is sometimes used in trash bags and that could affect the taste of the food.

CHANGE TO LOWER-CHOLESTEROL DIET GRADUALLY
You'll have more success in moving toward a lower-cholesterol diet if you make changes gradually. Try changing the way you eat one meal at a time. For example, change all of your dinner foods to low fat items. Or try changing one type of food at a time, such as switching to low fat dairy products.
As you make diet changes, be sure your meals are balanced with all the nutrients you need. If you eliminate all dairy products, for instance, you're eliminating calcium and other important nutrients you need. If you

To The Editor:
 Recently published statistics of the cost of smoking to the taxpayers of Texas are staggering and unacceptable.

According to the November issue of "Texas Preventable Disease News," smoking costs Texas about \$2.9 billion per year in prevention, diagnosis and treatment of disease, and associated loss of economic productivity. This contrasts with the annual income to Texas from cigarette taxes of \$354 million. Thus, the net annual deficit attributable to smoking is about \$2.5 billion.

On this basis, it costs Texas an estimated 63 cents per pack of cigarettes for direct health care costs and 92 cents per pack for lost income from premature death of disability, for a total cost of \$1.55 per pack sold. The cost to each Texan, whether they smoke or not, is about \$170 yearly.

On behalf of the Executive Committee for the Department of Preventive Medicine and Community Health, I am bringing these statistics to your attention because they illustrate the severe drain smoking causes to our economy.

The consequences of smoking on health are well known, but the economic costs are perhaps less well appreciated. The 10-fold increased risk for lung cancer, two-fold increase in risk for myocardial infarction, and 10-fold increased risk of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease are not only substantial risks to the well-being of smokers, these diseases and other disabilities that affect smokers result in a substantial expenditure of resources that we, as a community, can ill afford.

What practical solutions might society use to solve this problem?

Increased anti-smoking education, establishment of smoke-free areas in public buildings and public conveniences, and regulation of advertising all help to some extent. However, none of these measures directly addresses the economic burden of smoking.

An approach that would restore resources to Texas is a cigarette tax that is proportional to the estimated cost of smoking to our economy. By implementing such a tax, we can overcome the drastic economic burden of smoking.

June 1st Deadline For Planting Grass On CRP

By Myron L. Merz

Since the June 1st deadline for planting grass on CRP this year is fast approaching, most of the new CRP contracts should have been seeded or be in the process of being seeded. Some of the problems which we will be facing now are dry and windy conditions and controlling competition on the acreage.

If grass has been seeded into living wheat, the wheat needs to be shredded or controlled so that the grass seedlings will not be choked out by the wheat.

Another worry is on lovegrass that has been sown on a clean seedbed. With the dry and windy conditions we have had lately, some of these CRP's are prime targets to blow. Hopefully we will get the rain needed to germinate the grass and put on some cover.

On CRP's that were seeded last year and have a broadleaf weed problem, now is the time to spray with contact herbicides such as 2, 4-D or Banvel while the weeds are actively growing.

On newly seeded CRP's, Ally can be applied when the weeds are small (less than 2") and actively growing. Glean can be used on lovegrass or native grass, but there is a 90 day waiting period before or after seeding Plains or WW Spar Bluestem. Weeds can be sprayed with 2, 4-D after the grass seedlings have reached the 3 to 4 leaf stage.

Record Number Of Cattle Fed

A record number of cattle moved last year through feedlots in the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles and nearby regions, according to a just-released study by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

SPS annually prepares a Fed Cattle Survey covering feedlots in its service area. The electric utility serves a 52,000 square-mile area comprising the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, the Texas South Plains, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, and southwestern Kansas.

Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,406,975 head of cattle last year, a 2.9 percent increase over 1986, according to the survey. The previous record was 5,259,779 head of cattle fed in 1984.

"These latest statistics demonstrate the cattle-feeding business is prospering in this part of the country," said Seth Thomason, manager of agricultural and industrial power. "The growth of this business shows how important cattle feeding is to our area's economy."

Total one-time capacity of the feedlots surveyed in 1987 was 2,728,255 head, up from the total capacity of 2,594,975 head in 1986.

Additionally, the survey found that 4,758,886 cattle were slaughtered last year at packing plants in the SPS service territory, down 312,991 from 1986. Fourteen beef-packing plants are in the SPS service area, Thomason said, noting the facilities have an annual slaughter capacity of 5,107,153 head.

"We get requests for Southwestern's Fed Cattle Survey from all across the nation," Thomason said. "By providing this information, we hope to help stimulate further development in the agricultural sector. The area's feedlots and packing plants were extremely cooperative and helpful during this survey. We commend them for their assistance."

The survey lists each feedlot in the SPS area, and the lot capacities and number of cattle fed, by counties. Thirty-one counties in the SPS service area have feedlots.

The report includes charts of the number of feedlots surveyed, number of feedlots with 1,000 head capacity or above, growth of the feedlot industry and one-time feedlot capacity.

Lake Meredith Walleye Tournament

Entry fee for the open tournament is \$10. and the first 700 entrants will receive a special commemorative cap. All of the action takes place on rugged Lake Meredith, which is the only lake in Texas where the elusive walleye is known to spawn naturally.

Lake Meredith is the largest lake in the Panhandle of Texas and located some 10 miles North of Borger, Texas and just North of Fritch. Headquarters and weighing station for the tournament will be located at the Lake Meredith Marina located near the Sanford-Yake recreation area.

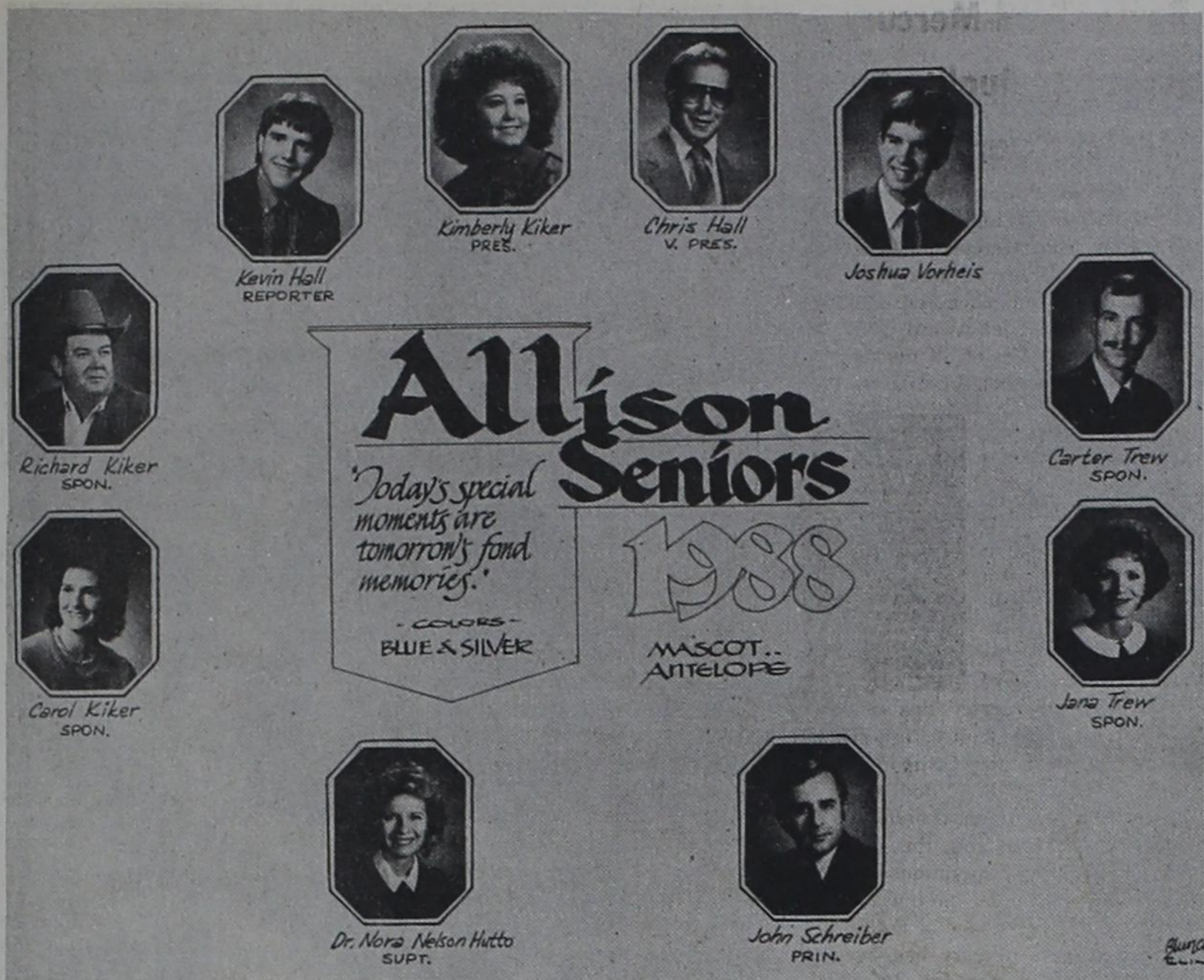

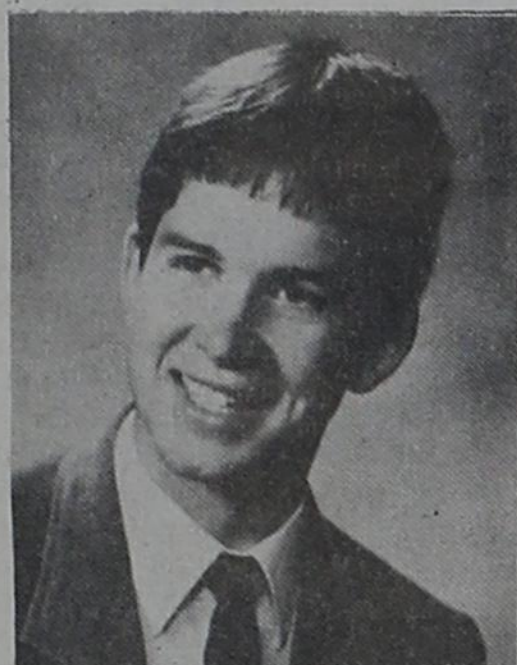

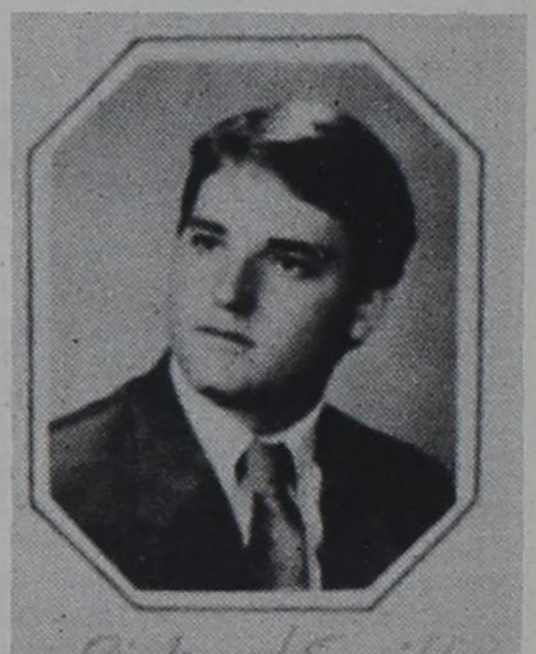
The state's top high school seniors in basketball and football have been selected to compete in the Whataburger All Star Basketball and Football Games this summer in Houston.

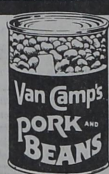
