The Truman administration is in the legal position of having jumped the Texas claim with this highhanded act sustained by final court decision in which the labor and tortured language utilized to evade law and justice proclaims the bias of the men that wrote it. The only protection left Texas rights is the refusal of Congress so far to pass an enabling act under which the Federal Government can profit from its outrageous seizure.

Under any sense of federal justice and integrity, Congress should restore title to the tidelands. Senator O'Mahoney's proposal to give the states a percentage of the revenue from tideland oil recovery is tempting bait to expedite oil operations under federal leases, replacing those of the states. Oil companies can undertake no new drilling until the issue is settled. They regard themselves as innocent victims of the argument, as indeed they may be. They approve the O' Mahoney bill because it will restore operation now. But Texas and Texans must consider the good of the state.


GAIN IN HOME OWNERS



For Paying 1950 Taxes Without Penalty

Your 1950 TAXES are now due and must be paid before the first day of February, 1951 to avoid penalty.

Notice in regard to your Poll Tax: as we do not have any poll tax assessed on the 1950 tax rolls, it is impossible for us to know who has paid poll taxes without checking duplicate copies of Poll Tax payments, so if you want to vote, make sure you have your poll tax receipt. Warning: Mid-night January 31st is dead line for issuing Poll Tax Re-

Those who are 60 years of age or more are not required to have an exemption to vote; those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1950, are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1950, or will become of age during 1951 are required to secure an exemption certificate during January, 1951, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year; no charge is made for these exemptions.

1951 automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1st, 1951, but must be paid between February 1st and April 1st, 1951.
