





NO TIME FOR GOVERNMENT WASTE-AS-USUAL

Suppose the price of paper drinking cups were to skyrocket from \$2.45 to \$19.80. Suppose the price of a popular 50-cent magazine

the type which made money worthless, where a wheelbarrow load of currency is required for the simplest transaction.

Yet, a congressional investigating committee finds, those are the actual costs of those articles when purchased by the Interior Department of the federal government. It is not all purchase price. The sellers of paper cups and magazines charge the government no more for their merchandise than they do other purchasers. The cost lies in the complicated and red tape-bound system of processing purchase orders issued by the department. This makes the true purchase price the first figure enumerated in each case, the total cost to the taxpayer the frighteningly high second figure.

"Badly organized and poorly supervised," the committee calls the purchasing system used by the department. The 108 employes of the purchasing division, the committee reports, produce purchase orders at the rate of only 1.4 per day per employe. That, of course, is one of the reasons for the high rate of expense for each purchase order issued.

The findings of the committee add detail to the more general report of the Hoover Commission last year that any purchase order issued by the federal government, even for a typewriter ribbon or a box of paper clips, costs the taxpayers \$10. The Hoover Commission found that several million dol-Tars a day is wasted through poor government management.

The commission blueprinted a thorough-5c going revision of the executive department of the government to increase efficiency and lower costs. Part of the recommendations have been adopted; part of them have not. Among other things, a General Services Administration has been set up to co-ordinate and supervise the purchase, use and disposal of government property. The success of this new agency depends upon the cooperation it gets from all other government agencies. Heavy loads should not be carried to or from the loft of the barn by way of a ladder. A well built stairway that is handrailed and kept clean should be ised. Feed chutes and elevated platforms should be constructed with guard rails. Ulich says that all

should remember that their barns and other outbuildings will be safe and convenient only if they are constructed with these items in mind, and then only if they are properly maintained and cared for.

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
