Millions of poppies will be worn Saturday in memory of America's war dead. Made of crepe paper, replicas of the poppies of "Flanders Field," they will be worn throughout the United States to pay tribute to the hundreds of thousands of young Americans who have given their lives in the nation's defense in three wars—the two World Wars and the present conflict in Korea.

Disabling veterans of both World Wars have been working for months in hospitals and convalescent workrooms making the flowers which will be worn Saturday. Mrs. Lewis estimates that more than 30,000,000 poppies have been produced for the Auxiliary, with more than 10,000 disabled men who are unable to do other work being given employment. The flowers which will be distributed here have been made at the Veterans Administration Hospital at Legation, Texas.

An army of nearly 150,000 women has been mobilized by the Auxiliary to carry out the nationwide distribution of the poppies, Mrs. Lewis said. All will serve as unpaid volunteers and all of the contributions they receive in exchange for the flowers will go into the rehabilitation and child welfare funds of the American Legion and Auxiliary. The money will be used to support the vast work of these organizations for the welfare of disabled veterans' families during the coming year.

The Mobettie Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary will sell poppies at Mobettie all day Saturday it was announced this week by members of the organization.

Rev. E. F. CO. SCHOLASTIC COUNT IS DOWN SOME 42 PUPILS

The 1951-52 Wheeler County scholastic census shows a decrease of 42 as compared with 1950-51, according to Jesse J. Dyer, Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The scholastic count for the nine schools is 2,435, compared with 2,477 a year ago, Mr. Dyer reported.

In spite of the county-wide decrease, the Wheeler scholastics have increased approximately six, Supt. W. O. Carrick said.

The number of school-age students in four districts, Shamrock, Wheeler, Eriscoe and Lela, are greater than last year. Kellerville, Bethel, Kelton and Allison Districts showed decreases.

The scholastic census for each school is as follows: Independent districts—Mobettie, 227; Shamrock, 937; Wheeler, 442; total, 1,606.

Common districts—Briscoe, 190; Kellerville, 83; Bethel, 83; Kelton, 164; Allison, 145; Lela, 164; total, 829.

"There will probably be some deductions in the 1951-52 census by the Census Department," Mr. Dyer said.

D. BROTHERTON RECEIVES AWARD

Doris Brotherton, valedictorian of the graduating class at Briscoe High School, has been given the Annual Award of The Reader's Digest Association for students who by their successful school work give promise of attaining leadership in the community. It was announced last week by Harold R. Barnett, Superintendent of Briscoe Schools.

Miss Brotherton will receive an honorary subscription to The Reader's Digest for one year and an engraved certificate from the Editors, "in recognition of past accomplishment and in anticipation of unusual achievement to come."

The Reader's Digest Association has presented these awards yearly in senior high schools throughout the United States and Canada to the highest honor students of the graduating class. The awards are part of the educational program sponsored by the Association and were a logical outgrowth of the wide use of The Reader's Digest in school work. With the collaboration of leading educators supplements to the magazine, containing guides for reading improvement and aids to effective speech and composition, are made available to schools and colleges.

The award to Miss Brotherton, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Brotherton of Briscoe, was made possible through the cooperation of Mr. Barnett and his teaching staff. They selected Miss Brotherton to receive the award, designed to stimulate scholarship, citizenship, and continued contact with good reading after graduation.

Robert L. Elliott, boilerman, third class, USN, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Charles D. Loter of Star Route, Wheeler, Texas, is serving aboard the aviation structural repair ship USS Fabius in the Far East.

The Fabius is a specialized ship converted from a landing ship tank hull. The vessel is attached to the Naval Air Facility, Oppama, Japan, where she handles major repairs for aircraft carriers operating in the Korean theater.

Elliott, who was ordered back into the active military service July 21, 1950, first entered the Naval service February 2, 1945.

Proclamation

WHEREAS, Memorial Day was originally proclaimed as a day upon which to honor the war dead during the conflict between the States, and

WHEREAS, the order issued in 1868 stated in part—"For the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country"—and

WHEREAS, the day has been adopted as a holiday by most of the States and Territories of the United States of America, and

WHEREAS, our liberties, privileges, and comforts have been effected by the grace of Almighty God and by the dead of past wars, and

WHEREAS, the perpetuation of these blessings depends upon the continued grace of Almighty God and upon the sacrifices of the dead of future wars, and

WHEREAS, the blood of millions of United States soldiers, throughout the span of American history, from Concord Bridge to the Yalu River, has been spilled on a thousand battlefields in order that the present day citizen may enjoy happiness, liberty, and even life,

NOW THEREFORE, by the authority vested in me as mayor of the City of Wheeler, I hereby proclaim Wednesday, May 30th, 1951, as Memorial Day for the City of Wheeler. I strongly advise each citizen to take time on that day to thank the one true and living God for the benefits he enjoys and to remember those fellow citizens of his who have throughout the history of our country paid the supreme sacrifice for the perpetuation of liberty and happiness as we know it, and I strongly advise every citizen to search out the graves of those who have died for their country and observe Memorial Day as it was originally proclaimed, that is as a day upon which to decorate the graves of dead comrades who died in the defense of their country.

Witness my hand at Wheeler, Texas, this 24th day of May, 1951.

Editorial

U. S. SENDS AID TO YUGOSLAVIA

The Yugoslav Government, according to press dispatches, has made an informal request to the leading Western powers for substantial quantities of modern weapons and other military equipment.

The request is said to indicate that the Yugoslav Government has come to the conclusion that isolated war is no longer practical and that, if a general war begins the Yugoslavian army will have to enter the conflict.

Previously, it was assumed that the defense of Yugoslavia would involve a somewhat precipitated retreat into the mountainous areas, with subsequent sorties against the invaders. Now, it is said, there is doubt about the feasibility of retreating into the mountains and resorting to a guerrilla war. Consequently, it is deemed advisable to seek tanks, artillery and aircraft from the United States, Great Britain and France.

The United States has already appropriated \$38,000,000 for food to Yugoslavians, designed to relieve the shortages that were due to a serious drought last year. In addition, the President has notified Congress that he has allotted \$29,000,000 to provide raw materials and other supplies, but no military equipment, to that country. The new request, which finds the British and French unable to meet their own needs, seems to resolve itself into a proposal to the United States.

Earlier, it was understood, the American representative in Belgrade, discussing the question of supplying modern weapons, brought up the North Atlantic Treaty organization, with the apparent idea of binding the Yugoslavian Government to support the Western nations in the event of war. Marshal Tito, it is said, declined to discuss the issue, saying that his government has made it clear that it will find that there is no necessity to enter into a pact which might be detrimental in the political struggle with the Soviet Union.

The situation in the Balkans revolves around Yugoslavia, Greece and Turkey. Efforts have already been made to draw the three nations into something of an alliance but, from what we read, the effort has been ineffective because the Greeks and the Turks desire assurances that they will be included in the North Atlantic Pact if they bind themselves to render assistance to Yugoslavia.

The Greeks are more directly affected than the Turks because a retreat of the Yugoslavian army would lay their country open to attack, but the Turks, it is said, may consider the advisability of an armed neutrality, such as that maintained during the second World War, if they are excluded from the benefits of joint defense agreements.

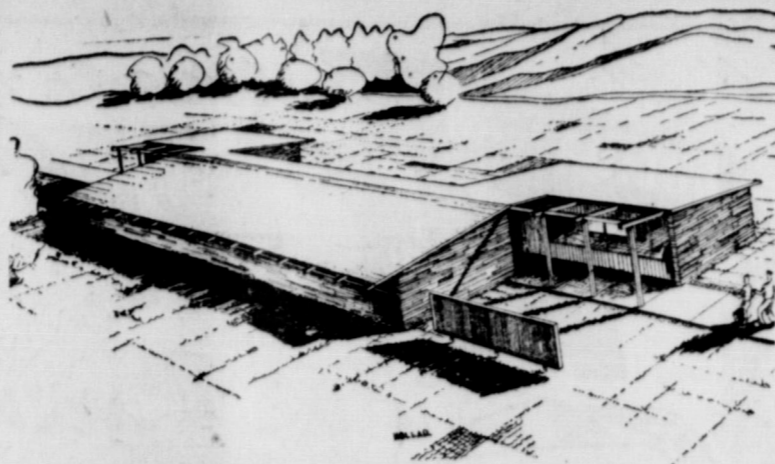

BOYS RANCH NEW UNIT

New Units At Boys' Ranch To House Twenty-Four Lads

This drawing of Boys' Ranch's first permanent unit in the new expansion program was chosen from a group of 20 plans submitted by members of the Fifth Year Architectural Class at Texas A. & M.

The unit will house 24 boys, 4 to a room, and has a large living and recreation room. Also, there are quarters for a man and his wife, who will supervise the group of boys living in the building, thus providing closer contact and opportunity for better guidance and individual attention.

Members of the A. & M. class spent three days, last December at the Ranch, and went back to A. & M. to complete the best unit design. Then the best portions of each design were consolidated to make the final plan, which is tailored to the type of boys living at the Ranch, and the life they lead. The students have also worked together on all the other proposed buildings and a 25-year site plan as a class project.

Boys' Ranch expansion has been made necessary by an increasing number of requests to help homeless and unwanted boys and boys who are in trouble. Besides housing, a vocational school, larger grade and high school, and increased recreational facilities are planned.

The Ranch boys will do much of the work under qualified supervision and various labor unions have volunteered their help. Construction blueprints for the new unit were drawn by O. L. Johnson, architectural engineer, of Amarillo. Part of the funds for building have been allocated, and it is hoped that additional funds can be obtained to complete the first unit by September.

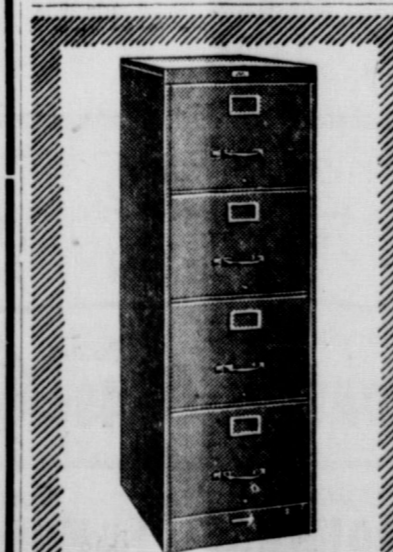

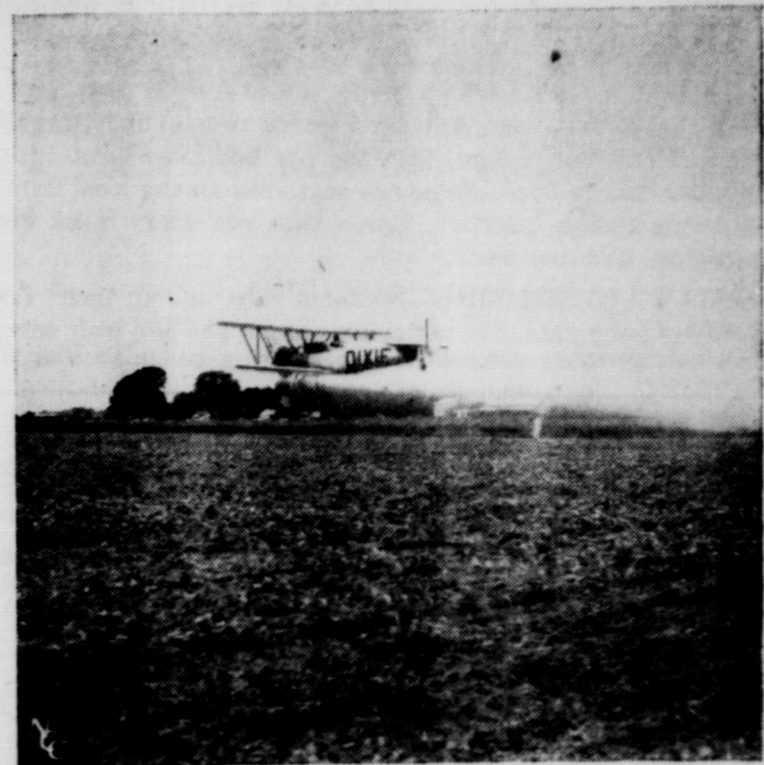

Airplanes play an important part in cotton insect control. Skilled pilots fly low over the cotton rows while special attachments on the planes emit a stream of poisonous chemical dusts or sprays to kill the boll weevil and other cotton-attacking pests. Intensive control programs are being carried out by the cotton industry to combat the tremendous damage done by insects.

chief source of trouble and third that substantial savings can be made on the purchases of recommended fertilizer as compared to former usage.

Thornton says tests are made for easily organized organic matter, from which nitrogen is estimated; readily soluble phosphoric acid, potash and lime. The laboratory also determines soluble salts as a matter of routine although relatively few salty soils are found. This is a test not made by most laboratories. When certain amounts of salt are found, chlorides and sulfates are determined. This gives the answer as to whether salt is influencing crop yields.

Thornton says the facilities have not yet been used to full capacity and urges farmers to submit soil samples for testing, that is, if they have soil problems. He suggests contacting your local county agent for detailed information on how to take a soil sample and how to mail it.

Scouts To Go To Camp Ki-O-Wah June 17 Through 23

The Wheeler American Legion's Boy Scout Troop 72 will attend the Adobe Walls Council's Camp Ki-O-Wah for one week, June 17-23, 1951. To date, reservations for three Scouts have been sent to the Council Office. Scoutmaster Barney Teague said this week. Some parents of Scouts in Wheeler have expressed reluctance in allowing their sons to at-

tend Camp, and the following information is offered as an attempt to answer some of the questions which may have caused doubt in the minds of these parents.

FOOD—The unwritten thirteenth Scout Law is: "A Scout is Hungry". The meals at Camp Ki-O-Wah are prepared under the most modern and clean conditions by Mr. Scofield, who has been cook at Camp for the past seven seasons. Perishable foods are stored under electric refrigeration, and menus are prepared with the highest nutritional values, and the appetites of young Scouts, in mind.

SHELTER—The Scouts camp by Troop, in 8 x 10 wall tents which are pitched on wooden platforms. Three boys are quartered in each tent. The floors make it possible for the Scouts to keep off the ground when it is wet. In case of very bad weather the Scouts are kept in the Dining Lodge until the skies clear off sufficiently to allow them to return to their tents.

ACTIVITIES—Outdoors all of the time possible. Archery range, rifle range, activities yard (for Scouting advancement), and the waterfront area are under constant, qualified, adult guidance and leadership. All rules of safety are strictly adhered to.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox Warns Of Poison Ivy This Time

Poison ivy infection varies according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Sometimes there is only a slight redness of the skin, at other times there will be aggravated swelling and blisters covering large areas of your skin. In mild cases the skin is covered with numerous small blisters.

Poison ivy flourishes in the woods or in the open, in dry or moist locations, and it is particularly abundant along fence rows, paths, and roadways, often climbing posts and trees to considerable heights. While there are a great many plants which may irritate the skin of susceptible persons, most of the cases of plant dermatitis in Texas are caused by poison ivy.

It is impossible for the average person to learn to recognize all the plants which are known to be skin irritants but, many cases of plant poisoning could be prevented if the public would learn to recognize and avoid contact with poison ivy. Dr. Cox gives these points to Scout, it is tops. In the teaching of the skills of living with others, citizenship, and all the things that good Scouting stands for, it is the ideal.

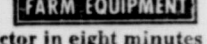

Bacteria counts are always a problem with the dairyman, but the problem becomes more difficult during warm weather.

Prompt cooling is absolutely necessary in producing milk with a low bacteria count. Bacteria multiply rapidly, and only through proper cooling of milk can their growth be retarded or stopped.

Milk held at 40 degrees Fahrenheit for 16 hours will show little or no bacterial growth, while the bacteria will increase 3,000 times in milk held at 80 degrees Fahrenheit for the same length of time.

Other factors, such as health of cows, cleanliness of equipment and milking practices, also affect the bacteria count, points out A. M. Meekma, associate dairy specialist for the Texas Extension Service.

Milk only clean, healthy cows. One cow with a flare-up of mastitis may give a lot of trouble in the bacteria count.

Follow clean milking practices. This includes cleaning the cow's udder to prevent any contamination.

Handle the milk in clean, sterilized equipment. Remove all milk solids from equipment immediately, sterilize and store properly. All utensils should be stored in an inverted position so they will have an opportunity to dry.

And protect milk from any outside contamination... such as dust, feed, manure, contaminated water and flies.

light hogs. Also, it costs more to put on the last 100 pounds than it does the first few 100 pounds of weight. To fatten hogs with a well balanced ration in a dry lot requires 304 pounds of feed to put on the first 100 pounds from birth; 359 pounds to put on the second 100 pounds; 415 pounds of feed to increase the weight from 200 to 300 pounds; 470 pounds to increase the weight from 300 to 400 pounds; and 510 pounds to increase the weight from 400 to 500 pounds.

A hog weighing 225 pounds will produce 28 pounds of lard and 133 pounds of meat. A hog weighing 300 pounds will produce 48 pounds of lard and 178 pounds of meat. The return from a hog weighing more than 225 pounds will be less in proportion to the cost of feed than those received from the lighter type hogs. The heavy hog produces larger portion of the cuts; and he produces which sell at a higher price. The cost of producing a hog should be cut below the level of alfalfa or other products.
