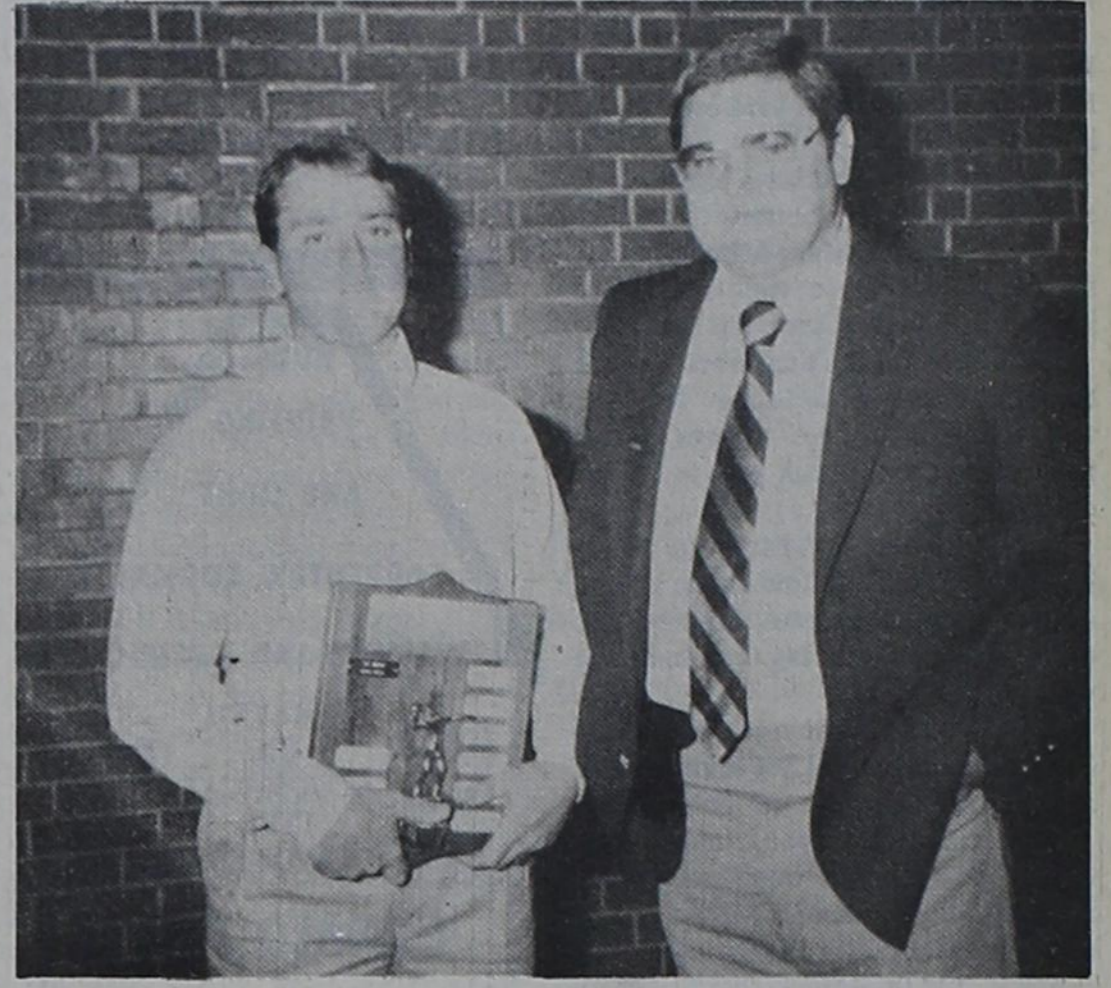

In the middle of the week, Jim Shelton became an employee of Beef Cattle Co. and moved his wife and family into temporary quarters with his brother and family north of Wheeler. Elizabeth Shelton was 6½ months along with their fourth child; she had just been to the doctor and all was "going well". At 6:00 a.m. Friday morning, a 2½ lb. boy made his entry into the world. The ambulance crew, including yours truly, arrived on the scene 17 minutes later; help was summoned from a phone a few miles away.

The father was holding the little man when we arrived. I was handed 2½ lbs wrapped in a full-size sheet. The baby was taken to Parkview Hospital and later we met Northwest Texas Neo-Natal Unit at the Pan Tex plant.

The mother was taken to Parkview, where she remained until her release on Sunday.

After writing the above information, I made contact with Jim Shelton and found that the baby, Jacky Lee, remains in intensive care at Northwest Texas Hospital. He is doing, fine, but tipped the scales upon arrival at NWTX at 1 lb., 14 ozs. and before being released from the

SHOOTING PAINS

If you're a victim of sciatica, you know what "shooting pains" are all about. The sometimes excruciating pain of sciatica frequently affects the hip, thigh and back of the leg. The ankle and foot are sometimes affected, too. But that's not where the problem is.

The sciatic nerve, the largest nerve in the body, extends from the lower spine to the back of the thigh and knee. Then it divides. One nerve goes down the front of the lower leg, and other goes down the back of the leg.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Dear Water Supply Customers:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform consumers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) set drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.50 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

1. if your home or water system has lead pipes, or
2. if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and

-if the home is less than five years old, or

-if you have soft or acidic water, or

-if water sits in the pipes for several hours

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

The water of the Wheeler Water System falls below the lead content required by the EPA.

As new lines are laid and old ones repaired any lead that is found it is removed.

The City of Wheeler, Texas owns the Wheeler Water System. Frank Clymer is the water superintendent for the City of Wheeler. You may call the City office at 806 826 3222 for additional information.

Grandchildren Melinda and Tim, from Canadian spent Saturday night and Sunday with us. They attended church with me on Sunday morning.

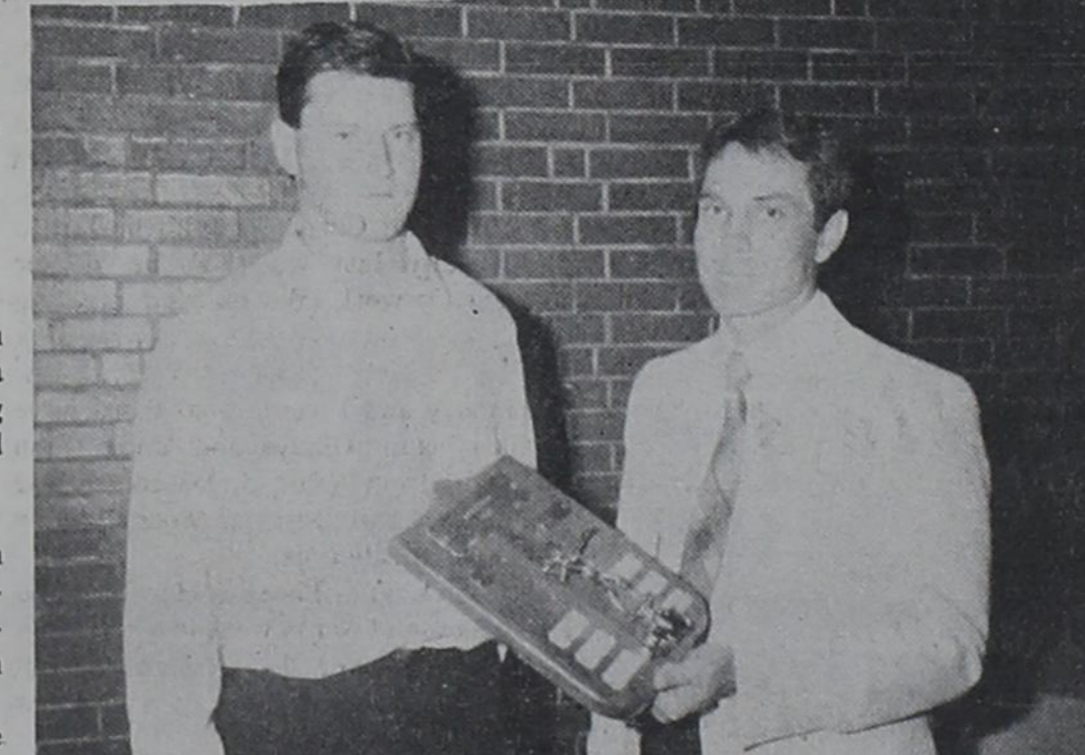

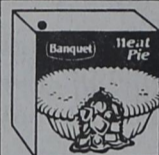

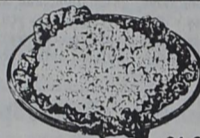
