SNOW IS WONDERFUL PICTURE MATERIAL

Snow makes every cameraman an artist. Whatever type of pic-ture interests you: panoramas, pattern shots, winter sports, or even pictorial pictures during a snowstorm, you will find that snow is a very photogenic subject.

You will find that snow scenes

You will find that snow scenes are very brilliant, even on a grayish day. Keep your exposures as short as you would at the sea-shore. With a medium speed film, 1/100 sec. at f/16 or f/22 is about right for snow in sunlight. Stay away from the old sun-over-your-shoulder rule. Cross-lighting and even back-lighting are best to bring out all the rich interesting textures. If you are wise, you will, use a lens shade to keep the glare from the lens. A yellow or orange filter is use-A yellow or orange filter is use-ful to bring out shadow detail and give a pleasing amount of correction to light winter skies. In very cold weather, you may find your camera shutter operates rather sluggishly, giving expo-sures longer than the indicated speed. If you keep the camera warm under your coat until you are ready to shoot, this trouble can be minimized. If any controls freeze up or stick, don't try to force them. Let the camera thaw out for awhile indoors, not too

near the heat. If you are planning to do a great deal of photography in extremely cold weather, your cam-era store can "winterize" your shutter, which consists of a complete cleaning and the use of a very small amount of special lubrication or none at all. Under most conditions this will probably







It costs three times as much to build roads that will withstand the loads of big trucks now being operated over them than it does for the smaller trucks and automobiles.

Latest records show \$115,282,344 was spent on Texas highways for the year ending August 31, 1950.

A bill sponsored by the big truck operators is before the Texas Legislature. This bill proposes

(1) to increase the load limit from the present 48,000 pounds to 72,000 pounds, and

[2] to increase the maximum truck length from 45 feet to 50 feet.

Recent official highway tests at La Plata, Md. sponsored by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads. the highway departments of eleven states and the District of Columbia, effectively demonstrated that as trucks increased in size and loads, roads cracked up and "died" more quickly.

We need to safeguard our highways for Civilian and Military use. "Increased heavy loading might seriously disrupt the effectiveness of essential routes in the event of an all-out war," according to T. J. Kauer, director of the Ohio Highway Department and Chairman of the La Plata road test committee.



The inner bin and its tight fitting lid are made of tin to effectively seal off moisture and foreign matter, keeping the flour clean and dry, even if used infrequently.
