Editorial

EGGS UNSCRAMBLED

That 94,000,000-pound hoard of dried eggs in the hands of the government may grow no larger. In fact, there are signs that it may be diminished or even eliminated.

The outlook comes as a result of a Department of Agriculture decision to suspend its much-criticized dried egg buying program on Dec. 1. Department officials are hopeful that they can get rid of their ac-

cumulation of dried eggs next year through the various foreign aid programs. To do so, authorities foresee that they may have to sell at reduced prices, which will mean a yet undetermined loss on the egg buying operation. The only consolation is that it now seems probable that this loss will not be as great as it might have been.

More comforting is the prospect that a halt now is going to be called, so that one loss will not be piled upon another. The government will confine its support operation next year to the buying of limited quantities of shell (not dried) eggs in individual market areas where there is a threatened collapse of egg prices. It is probable the shell eggs can be disposed of through the federal school lunch program.

This change, to our mind, marks a return to the legitimate function of farm price supports—the protection of farmers against ruinous price collapse without guaranteeing them a high price for their products. It is a change which might well be extended to other areas of farm price support.

High demand for agricultural products, as a result of the higher consumer income which will accompany the defense program, should be guaranty enough of high prices for what the farmer raises. Government price supports should be needed only to a minimum degree, and heavy appropriations for this purpose therefore should be unnecessary.

One of the pressing needs in this inflationary period is for drastic reduction of nondefense government spending. Here is a place where it seems easily possible to make a substantial saving without hurt to anyone.—From Fort Worth Star-Telegram

A MOMENT OF TIME

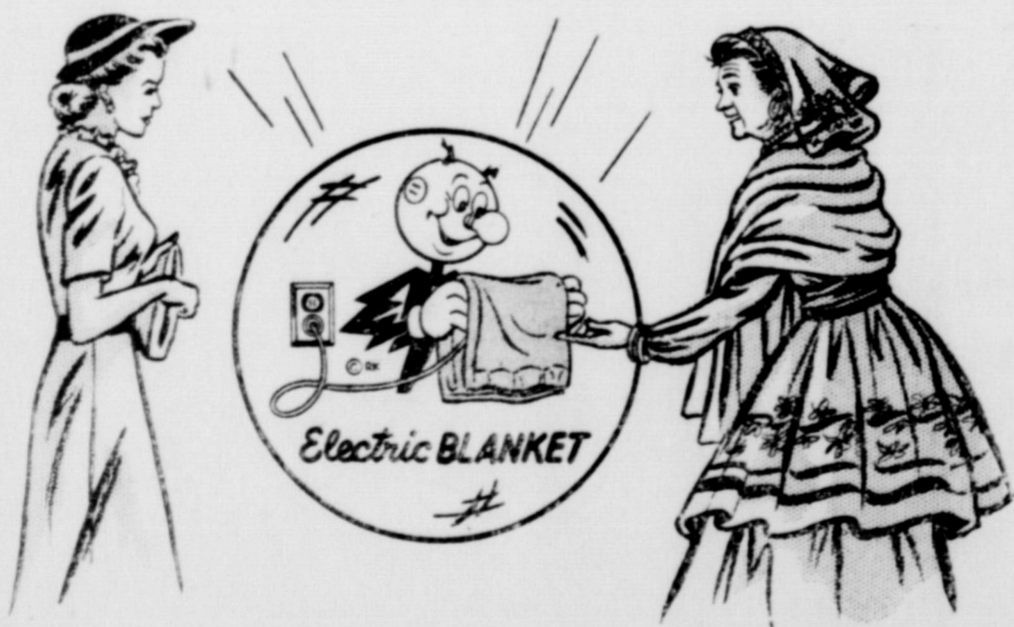
