Editorial

WE NEED LOYAL AMERICANS

It is a favorite pastime of most Americans to discuss what the country needs. Just now, however, in a period as critical as any

out that the nation needs most the loyal support of patriotic men and women and the confidence of those who believe in the demo-

cratic way of life. There is no substitute for loyalty. Flagwaving, public demonstrations and community-wide expressions of solidarity do not replace the faithful individual, upon whom successful government depends. As a citizen, it is essential for you to make your contribution to the United States of America.

We do not know, and we would hesitate to suggest, what any man, woman or child do in the present emergency. We do not have the intelligence to outline a program for all to follow. We would modestly recommend, however, that loyal Americans consider their present condition and the plight of their country and then make some positive contribution to the common good.

Do not mislead yourself. You cannot make a positive contribution to the cause of civilization in the face of great danger without some personal sacrifice. If you have any plan in mind which enables you to escape the pressure of world conditions, you can put it aside because it will not work. You cannot contribute at a profit.

CARE MAY PREVENT DROWNING

Vacation time is in full swing and, judging from the experience of other years. 3.500 lives will be lost by accidental drowning during these next few months. This represents only about half of the total number of people drowned each year but they are crowded into the three summer months.

The annual death toll in the United States from drowning grows larger each year. More than one-half of those dying in Young People's Service, 7 this manner are young persons under twentyfour years of age. The largest single age group of persons drowned is the group of youths between fifteen and nineteen years.

Every vacationist should be careful this summer. A period of rest and relaxation from work is fine and necessary, but carelessness should not rob it of its pleasure. To venture too far in the surf or to take chances in a swift current means running the risk of drowning. Swimmers should be extremely

HOUSE AND SENATE DIFFER

An interesting difference of opinion has arisen between the House of Representatives and the Senate in regard to legislation for a public housing program.

The House of Representatives voted to limit the program to 5,000 houses, but the Senate favored the start of 50,000 low-rent. public housing units in the next year. The issue, in the words of Housing Administrator Raymond M. Foley,, is whether there should be a 'public housing program.

WHEREAS a careless or imprudent act is a factor in almost every accident on the farm; and


