LOOK OUT FOR SNAKES

During the summer months, the people of Wheeler County go on picnics and engage in other out-of-door activities. Consequently, it is well to remember that one is more apt ans.

to encounter venomous snakes in this season | than later in the year.

While the bites of a few snakes are poisonous, fatalities are generally rare. However, with more people making more use of the outdoors, one should realize that poisonous snakes are part of the natural fauna. Sunday School Accordingly, caution and commonsense suggested that one working in areas inhabited by reptiles should procure a snake-bite cure color and pattern of poisonous snakes.

Generally, the experts advise that if one buried risen, and coming again. must go where poisonous snakes abound, certain precautions should be taken. These include:

- (1) The wearing of high leather boots. (2) Maintaining a careful watch on where one puts hands and feet.
- (3) Care in killing a poisonous snake, especially on rough terrain where one might lose footing and fall.
- (4) Walking on country roads and paths at night without a flashlight because poisonous snakes are apt to be in motion at

The victim of a poisonous snake bite is advised not to attempt to open his wound by cutting if close enough to receive the treatment of a physician. Very often serious injury results from indiscriminate treatment of snake bite. If a physician or hospital is not available, however, certain procedures are recommended:

(1) Be as quiet as possible, and avoid alcoholic beverages.

(2) Apply tourniquet above the bite with a belt, necktie or handkerchief. Do not shut off circulation completely and release tourniquet every fifteen minutes.

(3) After sterilizing the bitten area Young People's Service, 7:00 p. m. and a cutting instrument, make cuts parallel with the veins, only one-fourth inch deep across the fang marks. Do not cut blood vessels or tendons, or bones.

(4) If available, use suction cup for fifteen minutes to draw out the venom. This may be done by the mouth, if no cuts or sores are present. Incidentally, venom accidentally swallowed will not harm a healthy

(5) Additional cuts and the use of the suction cup at swollen areas of the wound should be effective. The wound should be covered with wet compresses and the advice of parapraph four should be repeated.

(6) As soon as possible, get a physician, who will administer anti-venom.



Instead, the board says, the trade-in value of my washer must be subtracted from the new model's selling price, and then I must pay

selling price, and then I must pay down 25% of the balance remaining. If it were handled the same way as automobiles, the \$50 I got for my old washer would take care of the down payment required for a \$200 new one. The way it is now, I not only trade in my old machine, but I have to pay an additional \$37.50 in cash before I can get de-livery on the new model. This would mean in effect a down payment of

\$87.50-or nearly 44% Second-why does the Federal Reserve board say that you have to make a 25% cash down payment on an installment purchase of a washing machine, or another appliance, while only 15% is necessary for a Louis XIV sofa?







America Depends on Family Car



Most car rides-68 per cent-are taken for essential or important reasons.

DETROIT-On an average day, at least one out of every three adults in the United States uses a passenger automobile for some essential purpose such as riding to work, conducting business or going shopping.

This and some 20,000 other facts about how the American family car is used were revealed in a nation-wide survey recently conducted by the Alfred Politz Research organization.

It was learned that 59 million people over the age of 14 ride in automobiles on an average day. This represents more than half of the U.S. adult population. Nearly half of these individuals use a car in connection with earning a liv-ing during a typical day, while almost one-fourth of them go

About 40 per cent of all rides taken in motor cars, and nearly one-half of the total passenger miles traveled, are for livelihood purposes, the survey showed. Shopping accounts for another 17 per cent of the rides and 11 per

cent of the passenger mileage. These indications of America's growing dependence upon the family car for essential transportation are borne out by automo-bile and population statistics of the past 10 years. While our population has grown 15 per cent since 1940, car ownership has increased

about 50 per cent. Passenger car registrations for 1950 totaled 40,-167,000 compared with 27,372,397

This growth in the automobile population has taken place despite the fact that motor vehicle production between 1940 and 1950 was less than in either of the two preceding decades. Consequently there are more older cars on the road today. The average passenger car is about eight years old, comcar is about eight years old, com-pared with the prewar average of 5½ years. Likewise, there is a lack of middle age cars as a result of the wartime halt in automobile production.

In addition to the need for motor cars as essential transport tools, the nation relies on them as a major source of business activity, employment, and tax revenues. The automotive industry directly creates business for at least half a million separate enterprises, or one out of every six firms in the country. One out of every seven jobs, for a total of more than nine

million, are automotive.

The average automobile buyer pays about \$95 in Federal excise tax on his new car. Last year, total automotive excise payments contributed nearly two-billion dollars to Federal tax coffers. In addition, highway users paid some \$2.5 billion in special state motor vehicle taxes and fees for an average of nearly \$55 per vehicle.


