Editorial

INTELLIGENCE AND FREE ENTERPRISE

The President of the Prudential Insurance Company of America, the second largest concern in the world, Carrol M. Shanks,

warns that the people of the nation must have some form of protection against the "crippling financial effects of long and expensive illness."

Realizing the need, and trying to do something about it besides yelling about "creeping socialism," the insurance company is planning a special policy to provide the American family with real protection against the financial hazards of major illness.

This is a commonsense attempt to meet the demand of those who listen to advocates of government insurance and so-called socialized medicine. Nevertheless, it would be a mistake on the part of insurance people and medical men to assume that the future is nothing but an effort on the part of demagogues to mislead the people.

There is a need in this country for some form of protection against what Mr. Shanks calls the "crippling financial effects" of prolonged illness. There is need, also, for some sound economic plan to enable the people of this country to secure for themselves adequate medical and hospital attention. Because of the need, burned into the minds of millions of people, there is a demand for relief.

Who should work out a safe and sound plan for adequate relief, under the banner of private enterprise, but insurance and medical men? It is their task, under the free enterprise system, and it cannot be avoided by propaganda about a socialistic wolf or in smear campaigns against office-holders who have sense enough to see that something must be done.

We would be delighted to see less bragging about what insurance and medicine have done for the people and more work on the development of a sound program that would meet the medical needs of the people of this country, in all economic brackets. If it can be put into action the country no longer be a demand, on the part of millions, for relief from a condition that will not be long endured by the millions.

WHAT DOES RUSSIA PLAN?

The military experts of Europe are conscious that the United States has told the Russians all about its plans and problems during the senatorial investigation in Washington without knowing what the Russians might be planning in the event of war.

The Western nations do not have the ground forces necessary to defend Europe at this time. What they have are well trained and equipped but cannot be expected to hold the massive Russian army. All that is possible is a slow retirement and eventual retreat across the Rhine.

The Russians, it is believed, might undertake a seizure of the Rhine bridgehead by dropping parachute divisions and sending in airborne troops. If the plan worked, the outnumbered Western Army would not be able to cross the Rhine and, in addition, the Russians would have an opportunity to seize some of the vital industrial areas of Western Europe.

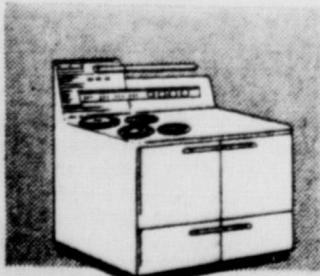

get back to the principles therein voiced. One Washington columnist wrote at length about the statement. In doing so he made especial mention about the "equality of man" and criticized Mr. Rankin, insinuating that Mr. Rankin is a "white supremacy" advocate. The columnist's remarks brought to my mind a transaction that took place on the Floor the other day concerning an all-negro veterans' hospital. The Veterans' Affairs Committee, of which Mr. Rankin is Chairman, has approved a bill creating an all-negro veterans' hospital at a cost of five million dollars to meet the needs of negro veterans that were not being adequately cared for. The hospital was to be staffed by negro doctors and negro nurses. When this bill came to the Floor it was openly attacked by the two negro congressmen on the grounds of racial segregation. These two negro congressmen were joined by a group of ultra-liberal Democrats, ultra-liberal Republicans and a majority of the old line Republicans from the North and East. The bill was supported by a block of Southern and Southwestern Jeffersonian Democrats. The coalition of old line Republicans from the North and East, the ultra-liberal Democrats and the ultra-liberal Democrats and the two negro congressmen was sufficient to defeat the bill. It was openly admitted by all that there was a great need for the hospital and that the negro veterans were in sad circumstances unless adequate facilities could be supplied. 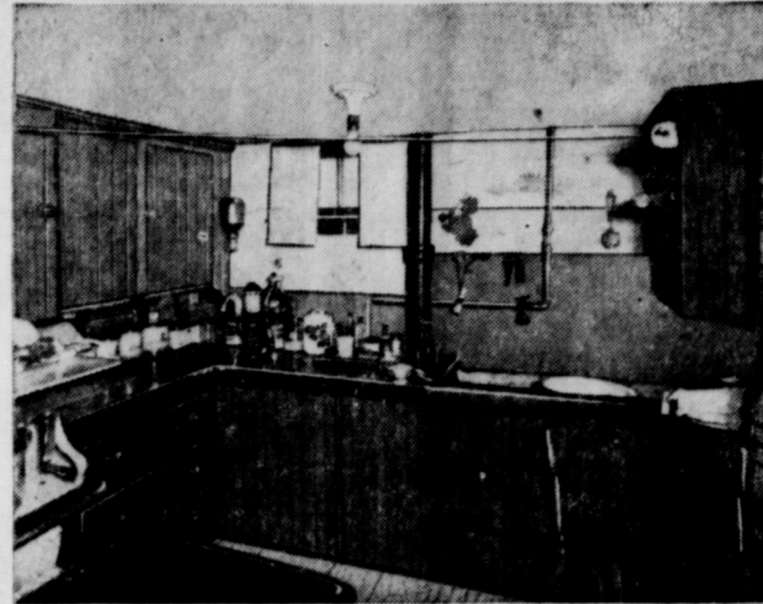
bill was defeated. I tell you people this so that you may have some idea of what could happen if the FEPC and the Civil Rights legislation should ever reach the Floor of the House. Frankly, the Republicans would be afraid to vote against the FEPC and the civil rights legislation for political reasons, and don't let yourself think otherwise. If that type of legislation is to be stopped, it will be stopped by Southern and Southwestern Jeffersonian Democrats.

STATE DEPARTMENT: The fight for a complete cleaning of the State Department is continuing and is getting results, but it is not proceeding fast enough to suit me. Over a year ago I told the people that I thought Mr. Acheson should resign. I have not changed that position nor my opinion. We hope that within the next several weeks Congress will have an opportunity to speed up this cleansing process when the bills on appropriations and other matters concerning the State Department are brought to the Floor.

DEFENSE PRODUCTION ACT: We have received much mail concerning controls and inflation. The big question is "What is the proper procedure to curtail inflation?" If economic controls are the answer, my position is that these should be on a temporary basis, should be fair and equitable to all, and should remain under the constant control and vigilance of Congress. The controls themselves are not the great danger if they are handled in the above manner. The great danger in controls is the administration of the controls, and I am not willing to place the economy of this country in the hands of a

NO SMALLPOX REPORTED IN '51

Not a single case of smallpox has occurred in Texas this year, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Unfortunately, the fact that we have had no smallpox does not mean we are immune for all time.

"Smallpox can strike again. For example, in 1947, an infected individual from Mexico innocently carried the disease to New York City. The result was 13 cases and three deaths, the first deaths in 35 years. Service men returning from the Orient caused an epidemic of 68 cases and 20 deaths in Seattle in 1946.

"In spite of Texas apparent freedom from smallpox, vaccination of every child before he is a year old and re-vaccinating every three to five years is imperative. This is the only sure way to prevent the disease.

"With the speed of present day travel a person harboring smallpox could alight in our midst at any time. If the public becomes lax concerning vaccination that single case could spread as happened in New York and Seattle.

Dr. Cox asks, "When were you and your family last vaccinated against smallpox? Would you and your children be safe if exposed to this disease?"

few egotistical bureaucrats with the power to discriminate and to indulge in decisions based upon bias and prejudice. We are at present in general debate on the Defense Production Act and will begin the discussion of amendments next week. It is my opinion that if a defense production act is passed, it will retain in the Congress the powers that have heretofore been delegated to bureaucrats. Unless this is done, we would be better off without controls.

TAXES: The increase in Federal taxes was for defense purposes. Had this not been the case, the tax bill could not have passed. If this country is going to sustain a standing army and provide proper equipment, supplies and materials, it is going to cost money. I have a large number of letters in my office from men who are in the service. They are complaining about the pay situation with which they are faced. Their allotments are not sufficient to take care of their wives and children and many of these boys are sending home the small amount that they are able to retain out of their pay. These boys do not get paid on an hourly basis and they don't get paid time and a half for overtime. They are rendering a great service to mankind and humanity and it would be unfair

THE HOUSE FLOOR: I had my first experience at changing a vote last week. The vote was being taken on whether or not the House should consider a resolution concerning the continued payment of Government expenses between July 1st and July 31st. While the various appropriations bills are being debated and voted upon. A move was started on the House Floor to cut out the funds necessary for General Dwight Eisenhower to continue to operate. Had such a move been successful, General Eisenhower's hands would have been tied and all of the work he has done so far would have been lost. I openly opposed such a move. At the time the procedural matter was being voted upon I was called to the long-distance telephone and when I returned to the Floor, it was my understanding that the move had been successful and that General Eisenhower had been tied hand and foot. Therefore when my name was called, I voted against the motion to consider the resolution. Immediately thereafter I was approached by several of the Texas congressmen, as well as several other Southern Democrats, and advised that such was not the case. I obtained a copy of the resolution and satisfied myself that such move had not been successful. I then changed my vote from "na" to "yea." This is the only vote that I have changed

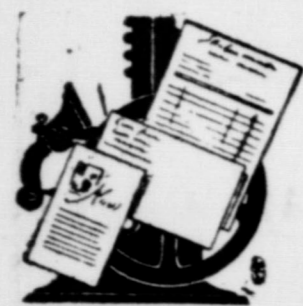

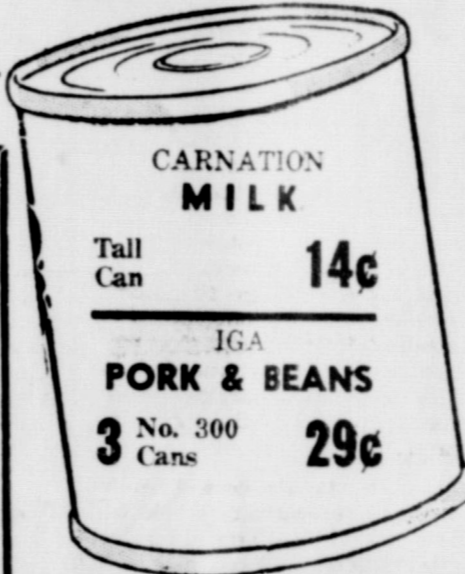

After the family decides what is needed, the insurance should be bought from the best possible source. This will mean studying the different forms of contracts, reading them carefully before

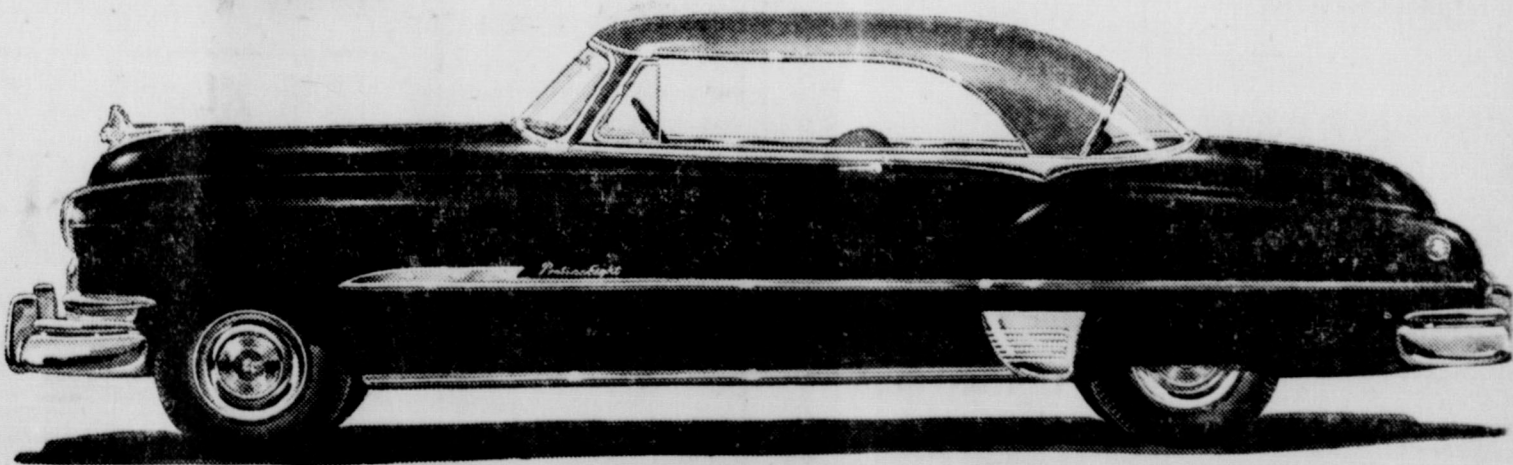

TEXAS LEADS OTHER STATES IN AUCTION SALES

Texas is the leading state in number of livestock auctions and in the number of cattle, sheep and hogs marketed by this method, according to a new bulletin released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The greatest growth in numbers of auctions has occurred in the past 15 years.

Several reasons are given for the increased growth. Farmers and ranchmen like the ease and convenience of selling and buying through auctions. They like the social and educational aspects of the auction. It provides an opportunity to meet friends and discuss the merits of the animals sold in relation to the prices paid.

According to the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas, 168 auctions were operating in Texas on October 20, 1950. Thirty-seven of these auctions in various parts of the state were included in a study made recently by Dr. John G. McNeely, Charles B. Brotherton and Travis M. McKenzie, research agricultural economists.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

The march of events is proving that the most dangerous game men can engage in is altering basic truths and principles.

America was founded in the principle that by encouraging free enterprise, this nation would lead the world toward ever increasing improvement by setting an example. Today, the nation is being led toward a world of disaster because so many officials and bureaucrats see nothing wrong in allowing just a little Socialism; just a little monopoly.

It is akin to a home owner feeling a few termites can't do much harm. But there is a distinct clear division between truth and untruth.

A government, playing fast and loose with basic truths, sponsors moral decadence whereby everybody comes to feel a little truth twisting is OK.

The ruinous price wars launched by killing a part of the Fair Trade laws paints in sharp relief how even businessmen succumb to the decadence.

Max Hess Jr., head of Hess Bros. Department Store in Allentown, Pa., summed the matter up in a statement in which he said that manufacturers, who also face ruin with a continued price war, have brought it on themselves by selling fair-trade items to price discount houses and other "sharpies" through the backdoor, thus sabotaging responsible dealers.

Right now, as demanded by Rep. Donald O'Toole, (D. N.Y.) the Federal Trade Commission @National Federation of Independent Business

could minimize damage, but FTC apparently refuses to act for fear of political unpopularity.

This is similar to the situation that would result if America's military men refused to fight.

With a fanfare, Marshall Plan announced the end of gifts to Britain as of January 1, 1951.

But now, Marshall Plan announces British have been given another \$7,700,000 to exploit African and Asian colonies. So not only are reserves needed by American business for expansion confiscated by taxes to help British business expand, but at the same time American taxpayers money is used to encourage further British exploitation of cooile labor.

While RFC battles Britain over gouging tin prices, Marshall Plan gives away almost a million dollars of tin plate to Portugal, a half million dollars worth to Yugoslavia.

This last points up another slant on the times. Americans are dying to fight communism. Taxes are boosted to fight communism. Tito's Yugoslavian government is communist despite supposed friction with Moscow.

So the Marshall Plan now takes American dollars to pour into Communist Yugoslavia.

Besides tinplate, ECA Bulletin 2294 announces gifts to communist Yugoslavia of \$2,200,000 worth of steel needed at home, \$1,450,000 worth of coke, \$1 million in ocean transportation, plus pig iron, pulp and paper.

This all goes on while orators talk about a "fight to the death" with communism.

The death will be that of the American middle class being taxed and bled to death to promote world Socialization schemes.

(Continued from Page 1) alfalfa fields as this is where most of them are coming from. To control army web worms and cut worms in cotton use 1 pint of 60 percent toxaphene per acre as needed. Use 1 quart of 60 percent toxaphene to control them in alfalfa. Don't cut alfalfa for hay for 14 to 21 days after spraying unless a good rain falls. If you want to dust for cutworms and army worms you can get excellent control with 5 percent DDT, or 10 percent toxaphene, or 5 percent chloradane at the rate of 20 pounds per acre.

To control flea hoppers, thrips, and boll weevils, use the following sprays: Toxaphene 1/2 to 1 1/2 pounds or 1 pint, to 1 quart, per acre; aldrin 1-8 to 1/4 pound per acre; or dieldrin 1-10 to 1-5 pound per acre as a spray. Spray every 7 to 10 days and three sprays should give complete control.

To control flea hoppers, thrips and boll weevils by dusting, use 20 percent toxaphene—40 percent sulfur, or 3-5-40 mixture, or 2 1/2 aldrin—40 percent sulphur, or 2 1/2 percent dieldrin—40 percent sulphur at the rate of 7-10 pounds per acre at 7-10 day intervals.

To control plant lice or aphids use 1/2 pint of 40 percent T.E.P.P. or 1 1/2 pounds of 3-5 mixture per acre. As a dust, use 3-5-40 mixture at rate of 10 pounds per acre, or 1 percent parathion applied when air is calm. So far plant lice are not bad enough to use control methods and hot weather may eliminate them completely.

Many farmers have decided to follow a three spray schedule—that is, spray three times at ten day intervals and thus do a complete job of insect control. Three sprays will always pay dividends and in some cases cotton has been sprayed 10 times and still paid big returns. It can be looked at like this. You have already been out many dollars per acre on your cotton crop. Actually you cannot afford not to invest another two to four dollars per acre to almost guarantee you a cotton crop. But you can lose everything by not controlling these cotton insects. Now is the time to control these insects too.
