The reader can obviously conclude that this would automatically advance wholesale prices by not less than nineteen percent. 



FARMERS ARE

County Agent R. O. Dunkle re-Texas is the land of plenty, with ports that Young county farmers are learning the value of fertilizer. Today they are using four times as much commercial fert-

ilizer as they did five years ago. A demonstration on the F. T. Littlejohn farm in the Red Top community, where an increase of 419 pounds of grain sorghum per acre was obtained last year with 50 pounds of 16-20-0, has been one reason for the increased use fertilizer. An application of 100 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre to Westar wheat on the Jack Nichols farm gave an increase of eight bushels per acre last year.


"Neighbors have seen the extra growth and increased yields and are thoroughly convinced that applying commercial fertilizer to wheat and grain sorghum pays a dividend of over 400 percent,' says Dunkle. "Increased yields per acre, earlier maturity more efficient production and improved soils mean more income for the farmer."

Dunkle reports that Ed Steele of Henry Chapel and Roy Thompson and Barney Flowers of Graham have sent soil samples to the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas A. & M. College. They are planning to fertilize their crops according to recommendations from the laboratory.

Farmers interested in having their soils tested should contact their county agents for information on taking the samples and mailing them to the laboratory. Soil samples are tested for one dollar each.





It provides an immediate stop to inflation and an opportunity to solve the problems within the next. 120 days. This is the most important amendment that has been proposed and I hope it stays in the bill. Cloak Room gossip is that unless this amendment stays in the bill, there may be no defense production act.

RESEARCH ON WHEAT AND OTHER CEREAL INFESTA-TION: I appeared before a Senate appropriations committee a few days ago on behalf of an appropriation for research to fight the wheat and other cereal grain infestations. This is a serious problem, especially in our section of the country, and we must have research to protect our food sup-plies. Here is a portion of a committee report which I think expresses and explains the need for this research:

"Science saves our cereals: Stem rust and other diseases took an enormous toll until varieties developed through cooperative research with State agricultural experiment stations came into general use. When scientists learned that the rust organism spent part of its life on certain varieties of barberries, a large-scale campaign was organized to get rid of these plants. This proved to be a herculean task and is still going on.

Our temporary conquest of stem rust has not come easily. It was one of the earliest diseases to demand attention of cereal breeders. Scientists were puzzled to see a variety that had stood up for several years suddenly succumb. New varieties often met the same fate after a few years of successful resistance. For a while it looked as though we were los-
