### Editorial

#### VETERANS PROVE TO BE GOOD STUDENTS

The deadline for starting educational training under the G. I. Bill has passed but, since it began, seven years ago, 8,000,000 veterans have attended school or college under government subsidy at a cost to the nation of \$14,000,000,000.

The Education Bill, which was adopted in 1944, when millions of Americans were involved in fighting for the defense of their

country, was designed to provide financial assistance for veterans who decided to go to school or college upon returning to civilian status. The original law was amended a number of times to liberalize its provisions. Depending upon length of service, the veterans were given up to four years of free schooling with the government paying the expense of their education.

It should be remembered by Americans at this time that when the bill was passed, it was feared that there would be another repetition of the apple-selling veteran on the streets of our cities. The prospect at that time was that, when the war ended, peacetime industry could not assimilate the released labor force and, consequently, something should be done to encourage the veterans to improve their educational status. Much the same thought was behind the unemployment compensation payments plan.

While there have been some abuses of the privileges extended to the veterans, both on the part of the veterans and on the part of some institutions of learning, the main result of the program has been excellent. The minor inefficiency and the fact that some of the veterans have not applied themselves to learning as much as to drawing the subsistence allotment, do not change the fact that, in the main, the veterans behaved themselves in a manner to justify the government's expense.

From many college campuses have come favorable comments on the industry and behavior of the G. I. students. In fact, the men went back to school with the serious intention of taking advantage of their opportunity. Their behavior and scholarship compared favorably with that of regular students in our colleges and universities.

The deadline of July 25th applied to most of the veterans of World War II—those discharged before July 25th, 1947. Veterans discharged after that date could begin their training within four years from the time they left the service. The probability is that a similar provision will be made in behalf of the veterans of the fighting in Korea.

At the peak of the program, in 1947, more than one million veterans were on the campuses of the nation, getting free tuition and subsistence grants. At this time, close to 500,000 service men are still at work in colleges and universities, although the number is dwindling very rapidly.

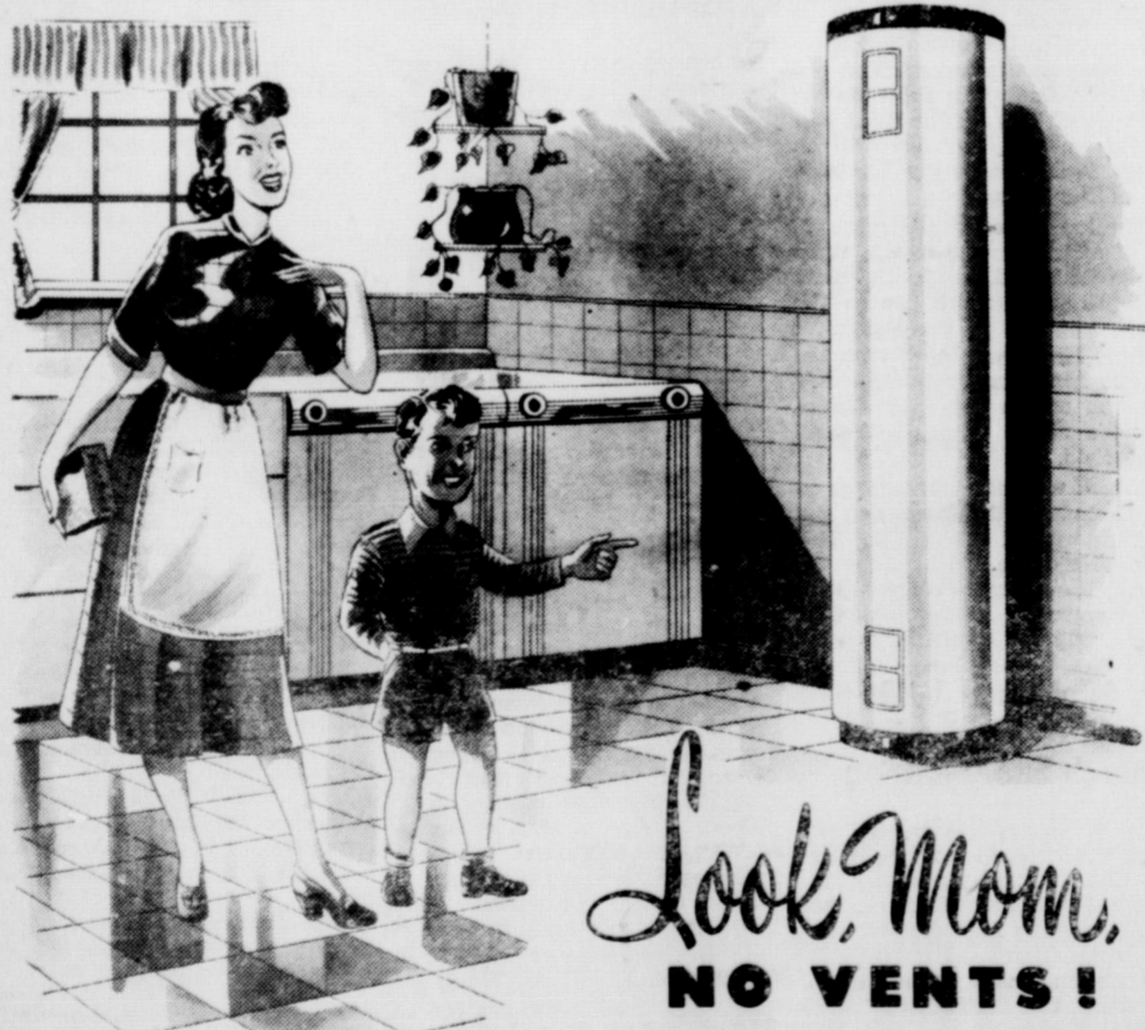

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**Farmers Urged To Take Part In Agricultural Meetings Being Held**

Farmers and others interested in long time improvement of agriculture are urged to take part in the meetings now being held throughout the state for the purpose of reviewing the programs and policies of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

County Agricultural Mobilization Committees are in charge of the meetings and discussions in the counties. Membership on these committees is composed of representatives from state and Federal agencies who work with rural families. Officials of the USDA point out that the population of the nation is growing steadily and by the end of the century is expected to be near 200 million, or approximately double the 1900 total.

Then too, most of the country's arable land already is under cultivation and the extra food and fiber needed to feed and clothe the growing population must come from increased acreage yields and more efficient production.

This increased agricultural production must come from the family farms for they make up almost 98 percent of the Nation's total. These are the farms which are operated by family units and supply the bulk of the family's income with the family providing most of the labor needed on the farm.

It is the family farm operators and their families, therefore, that are now being asked to make suggestions for improving the services and programs of the USDA. The best suggestions for dealing with local farm problems come from local farmers and all are urged to attend and participate in the meetings being called in the communities. The recommendations from these meetings and discussions may form the basis for improved farm programs and assurances to the millions that America's family farms can provide the nation's future needs of food and fiber.

**Age Children  
Be Used For  
Spring Fall Crops**

With the opening of school around the corner, officials of the U. S. Department of Labor are planning to do all they can to prevent employment of children that will interfere with youthful development.

Point out that in enacting the Fair Labor Standards Act, Congress made it unlawful to employ children under 16 in agriculture during school hours if the farm produces interstate or foreign commerce.

Riley, supervisor of the Bureau of Public Contracts

Divisions of the Labor Department here, says that the law applies to local resident children as well as to migratory alien children—but not to the farmer's own children working on their parent's farm.

By "school hours" is meant those hours when school is in session for the district where the child under 16 is currently living, he explained. The penalty for violation of the law is a maximum fine of \$10,000 or as much as six months imprisonment, or both.

Farmers themselves are responsible, he said, if they employ under-age children during school hours. That includes children hired either as individuals or as part of a family group directed by labor contractors, processors, or others.

**PICTURES KEEP VACATION MEMORIES ALIVE**

Even more fun than planning a trip and taking it are the happy memories you bring back with you. There is no better way to keep these memories alive longer than through pictures and a camera should be an important part of everyone's vacation equipment.

On a trip, don't waste time and effort photographing the standard expensive post cards. Concentrate instead on personal pictures that will mean more to you and your friends. How scared Mother looked on the edge of the Grand Canyon is a better shot than trying to duplicate professional scenic views that can be obtained for a few cents.

Try to tell as much story in your picture as possible. Instead of having to tell your friends how cold Sister was when she swam in this lake, make a shot of the event showing her shivering on the edge. Much better than your description of the romantic atmosphere of the garden cafe at night is a picture that captures

the mood of the place as you enjoyed it.

If occasionally you don't have the time to work out a picture carefully, then settle for a quick snapshot. But usually you can easily make time to put the little bit of thought into a picture that will lift it out of the so-so snapshot class and make it an interesting story-telling photograph.

Naturally, you will take care to focus and expose your pictures properly. If you cannot learn to judge exposure, invest in a good photo-electric exposure meter. You will pay for it quickly in film savings and more enjoyable pictures. If your camera is not equipped with a range finder, try to shoot most pictures with as small a diaphragm opening as possible so you will have the benefit of maximum depth of field.

A few hours spent making photographs of any trip or vacation will be repaid many times over in years to come when your memories would otherwise grow dim.

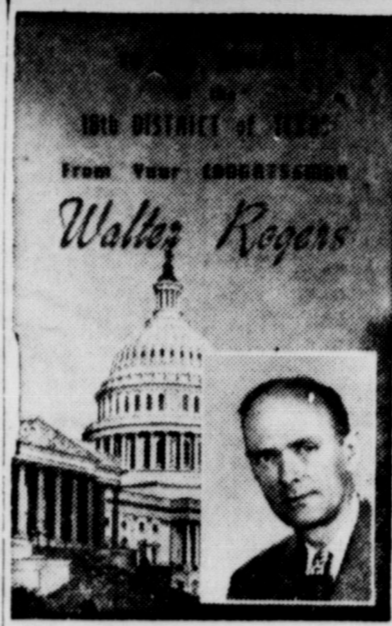
If a local school is closed for several days during peak harvest season, it would not be considered as being in session at that time. Furthermore, he said, the Federal law sets a minimum age for the employment of children in agriculture before or after school hours on any school day, or at

any time on school holidays, or during school vacations.

But when the school bell rings on a regular school day, children of school age are expected to be in school, he said.

**DEFENSE APPROPRIATIONS:**

The House of Representatives served notice on Stalin that the United States of America is ready, able and willing to spend whatever is necessary to meet the threats of Communism. It passed a record \$6 billion dollar appropriation for defense purposes. This bill was steered through the House under the able leadership of Congressman Gorge Mahon, of the Lubbock District, who is Chairman of the subcommittee on Military Appropriations. This subcommittee made an extended study of the defense needs and their findings were ably presented to the House by Congressman Mahon. One amendment to the bill will be of particular interest to inactive reservists. This amendment barred the use of funds to pay certain inactive or volunteer reservists after November 30th who have served twelve months.

**EXPANSION OF AIR FORCE:** Stalin was given further notice of our intentions by the bill introduced by Representative Carl Vinson of Georgia, Chairman of the Armed Services Committee. This bill calls for an expansion of the Air Force to 163 groups. Sen. Lodge of Massachusetts has advocated an expansion to 150 groups. It seems to be the consensus of opinion that the Air Force should be expanded but that we will probably stop it at somewhere around 130 groups. I have continually advocated this expansion and have consulted with high Air Force officials on numerous occasions concerning it. There are a number of unused fields in our section that could be utilized for this program with a relatively small overall cost to the Govern-

ment. The Panhandle furnishes excellent weather for this purpose and is looked upon favorably by the Air Force. The one great fear of Stalin is a strong Air Force in Western Europe. We can never hope to match the Russians and their satellites man for man in ground forces. Our superiority must rest in our superior weapons and our ability to use them. These superior weapons have been developed by constant and vigilant research, and in this field we are ahead of the Communist-dominated countries and we must stay ahead of them.

**ROCKET TESTS:** The recent tests at White Sands, New Mexico, resulted in a major step in the research program. The Viking No. 7 Rocket soared 135 miles and came down about 41 miles north of where it was launched. I was furnished with a dramatic story of this incident by a close friend of mine who is high in the Army official family. The flight of the rocket was traced by radar and the rocket was under control of ground forces at all times. Had it veered from its course or gotten out of control, it could have been exploded in the atmosphere. This flight carried our researchers 21 miles higher than the previous single stage rocket record. It attained a speed of 4100 miles an hour, more than a mile a second—a speed that would carry you to the moon in less than 60 hours. This was the seventh in a series of ten rockets scheduled to be fired. No. 8 is under construction now.

**ARMY SPENDING:** My office has received a number of communications concerning bulletins and editorials criticizing Army purchases. These matters have been investigated at length by Congressional committees and the Army has been called upon for explanations. Space will not permit me to include the entire statement of the Army officials on this matter, but I will try to include others in subsequent news letters. Here is the Army's answer to one of the charges: Charge: "The Army has purchased 68 million can openers since the start of the Korean campaign one year ago. There are about 1.5 million men in the Army." Army's answer: "Both of these statements are true but placed together without further explanation they give a completely false impression. This figure can be found on Page 113 of the printed testimony where it lies in the middle of a statement of Major General Feldman, The Quarter-

master General, which for some reason the bulletin's editors didn't see fit to mention. His statement reads: 'This is a small expendable can opener for the use of combat soldiers in the field. One such can opener is issued with each ration in combat and is packed with the following combat rations: Assault ration, C-ration and 5-in-one ration. Since the beginning of the Korean incident a total of 68 million such can openers have been purchased at a cost of less than 2 cents each. During the same period directives have been issued by the Quartermaster General for over 73 million C-rations.' Actually, in the whole of Fiscal Year 1951 some 125 million operational rations were purchased by the Army, so even more of these expendable can openers had to be purchased. These can openers are about one inch long and one is provided to open the six cans in each C-ration. More recently, the openers have been issued on the basis of one for every two C-rations. If each can had its own key opener, of the type used on sardine tins, the procurement costs would be greater."

Several of these can openers were displayed in the debate on the \$6 billion dollar defense appropriations bill and were passed out to Members for examination. It was pointed out that the cost of this opener plus the can to be opened is less than the cost of the can that is opened by a key, such as those used for certain processed meats and other foods daily purchased by civilians. In addition, it was argued that by using the new type can and the new opener, a substantial part of the fluid content is saved; whereas in the use of the key type can much of this fluid is lost. Regardless of the outcome of the argument, it proves that a constant sharp eye is being focused on Government expenditures.

**VISIT TO NEARBY ANGUS FARMS:** Last Saturday afternoon C. L. Sloan, Lewis Foxhall and Olton Pate, of Hall County, and Jack Tippen and Walter Bates, of Cottle County, and myself visited the Angus Farms of Colonel Larry McPhail and Mr. Jerome Gebhart. We saw some fine black cattle, some fine horses, some fine grass and some wonderful farm facilities located within a few miles of Washington, D. C., and Baltimore, Maryland. It is certainly a fine thing for everyone to see and appreciate what is going on in other backyards. Too bad there can't be

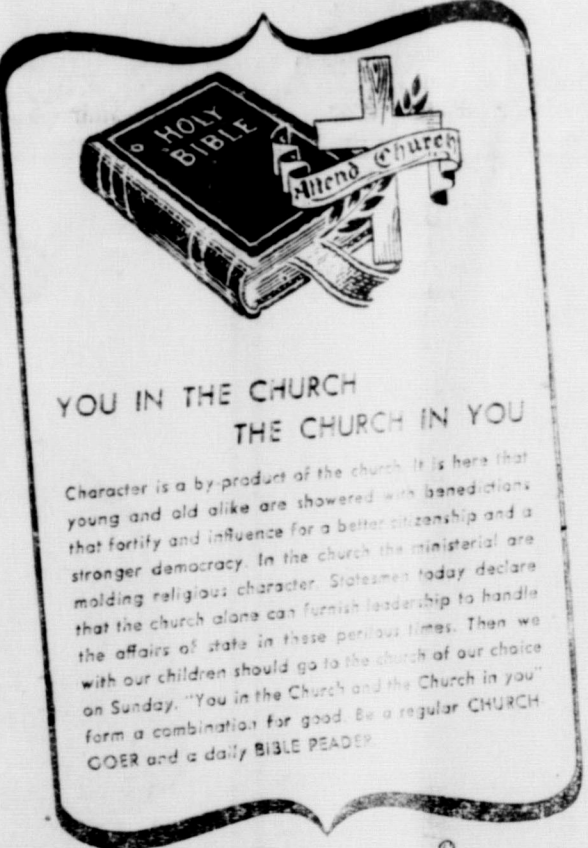
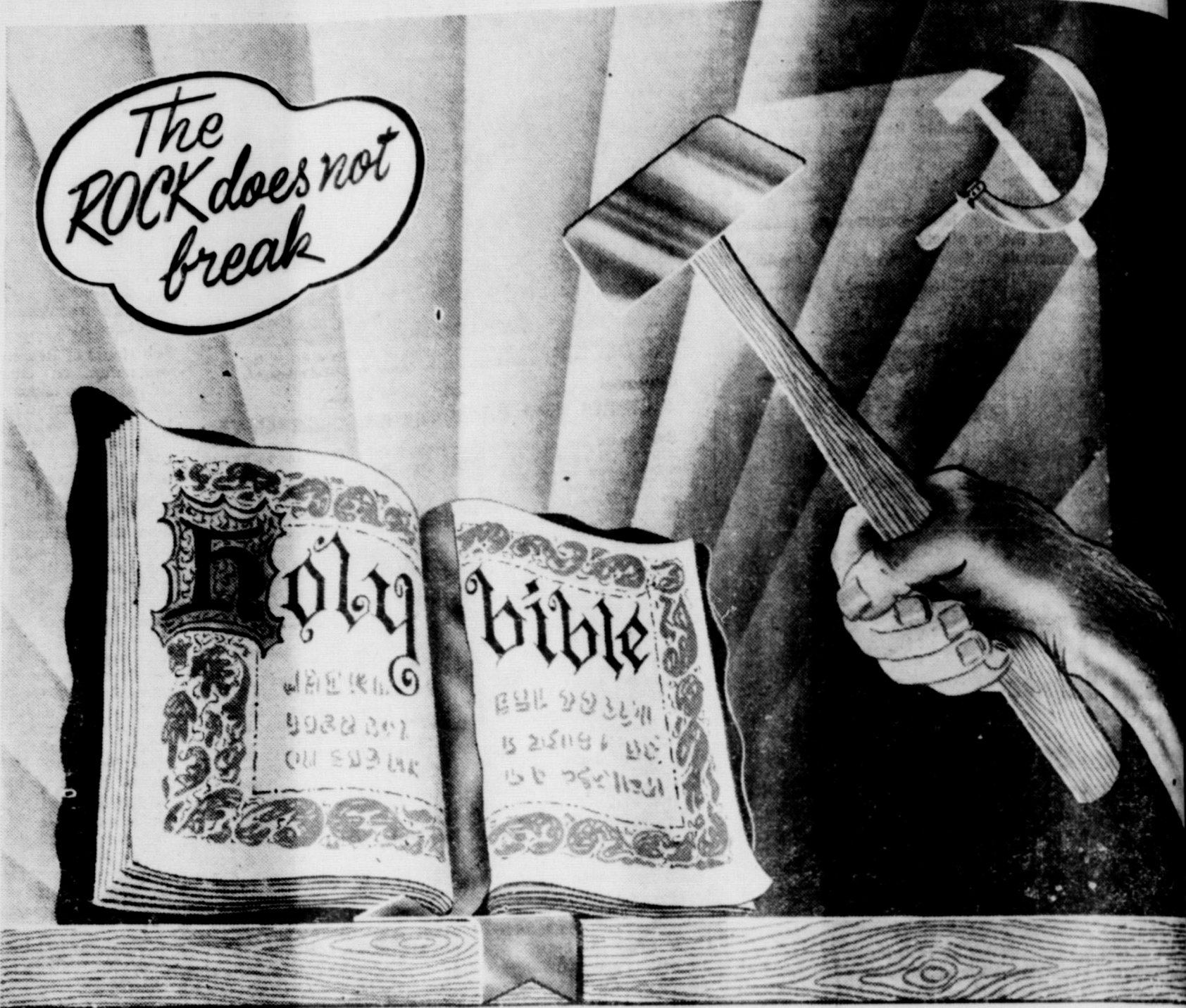

BLUE BONNET SEED SHOULD BE PLANTED SOON

Take a tip from Mother Nature and plant bluebonnet seed before September 15th. They can be planted later but they may not bloom well. Bluebonnet seeds are small but tough, so it's a good idea to soak them for 24 hours before planting...

The state flower thrives in many soils, but does best on light sandy soil. One of the beauty spots of Texas is in Old Indianola or Matagorda Bay near Port Lavaca where the variety adopted as our state flower grows. The soil at Indianola is coarse white sand with an abundance of shell fragments. In rich well fertilized soil, bluebonnet stalks will grow tall with many large leaves but few blooms.

Bluebonnets should have plenty of sunshine and good drainage. They can be transplanted in late winter but will do better if planted where they can be left to bloom. In the coldest areas of the state, it will be necessary to start bluebonnets in greenhouses or small flower garden pots.

Bluebonnets are soil building legumes. They seem to be of little value for grazing.

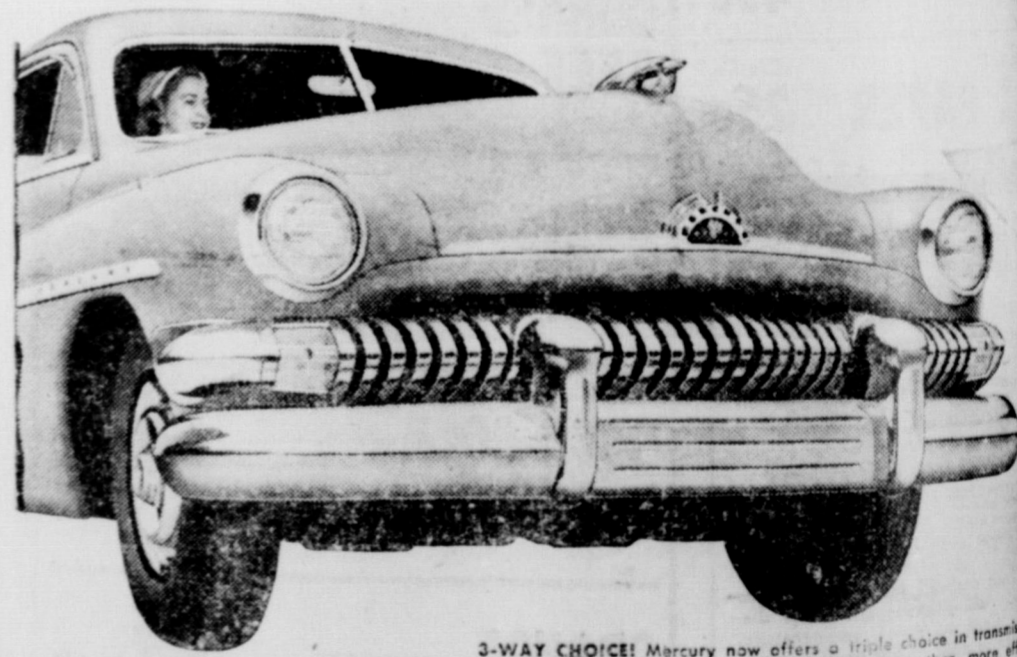

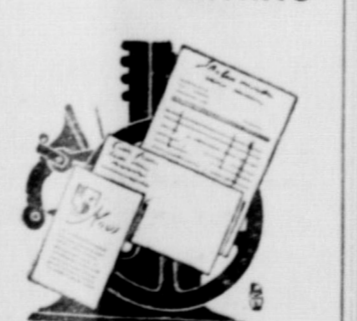

## CATTLEMEN ARE WARNED TO KILL SKUNKS

Texas farmers and ranchers in the Red River Valley region and in Southwest and Central Texas have been warned to begin killing skunks—lots of them—before cold weather brings an increase in rabies cases.

The grim warning is contained in an animal morbidity report compiled by the State Department of Health. The idea is to pin point rabies infested areas as warning to people in adjacent areas.

State Health Officer George W. Cox said Texas had areas "bigger than most states" which are completely free of rabies.

"From now on we're going to fence. It isn't going to be Texas call our shots by county of occurrences any more," the health official declared.

"Livestock owners . . . should have active skunk killing programs, especially in the Red River Valley area, when winter approaches and skunks hole up with livestock in dilapidated barns," the report cautioned.

Current focal points of skunk rabies are, the report indicated, in Harris Matagorda, Fort Bend, and Lavaca counties. Another focus exists in the region of Comal and Hays counties, and in Central Texas in Travis, Bell, Coryell, Lampasas, and McLennon counties.

"The trend is eastward in Central Texas," the report said. Titus and Hopkins, an area hit hard last year, continues to have a serious problem, causing health officials to caution livestockmen in the eastern part of the Red River Valley to be especially vigilant against skunk invasions of barns and outhouses.

The rabies morbidity report is something new in disease control. Modeled after the method used to keep tabs on cases of human communicable diseases, it is part of the general protection the state health agency is providing.

For July the report shows: 77 dogs, 6 foxes, 6 cats, 4 skunks, 4 calves, 3 pigs, 2 civit cats, and 1 cow were diagnosed as rabid at the state Bureau of Laboratories.

Bexar and Harris counties were hardest hit during July. Each reported one case of dog rabies each day of the month.

Preparations have been going on for some time, and the boys have piped spring water into the 20-acre park for the benefit of those

who bring their lunches, or buy sandwiches and pop on the grounds. The highway officials have promised completion of the highway from Channing which means paved roads all the way to the Ranch via Channing.

Good entertainment, easy accessibility, comfort, plenty of cold drinks and sandwiches are in store for patrons who attend the Boys' Ranch Rodeo over the Labor Day weekend.

### GREETINGS:

The percentage of farm homes in Texas receiving central station electric service has increased from 2.3 per cent to 90 per cent during the past 16 years, largely through the stimulation of the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) program.

More than 282,000 rural families of Texas now enjoy the benefits of electric lights and power through cooperatives which they themselves own and operate.

Each of the 77 rural electric cooperatives in Texas is a free and independent, tax-paying business enterprise, chartered under the laws of the state of Texas, and owned and controlled by the farmers and ranchers who receive service along its lines.

The availability of electricity has brought about a wholesome revolution in farm methods, production and living standards; has lightened the drudgery of farm tasks and increased farm output and profits; has been instrumental in keeping young people on the land, and has promoted the general welfare not only of rural people, but of urban residents as well whose prosperity and well-being depends upon a sound and prosperous agriculture.

THEREFORE I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby proclaim the week of August 19th to 25th, inclusive, as

in Texas, and call upon all citizens of the state to observe during this week the splendid progress that has been made in electrifying rural areas during the past 16 years, and to resolve anew that the program shall continue to expand until every farm family in the state shall enjoy the blessings of electric lights and power.

## TRI-STATE FAIR ANNOUNCES OPENING DATE

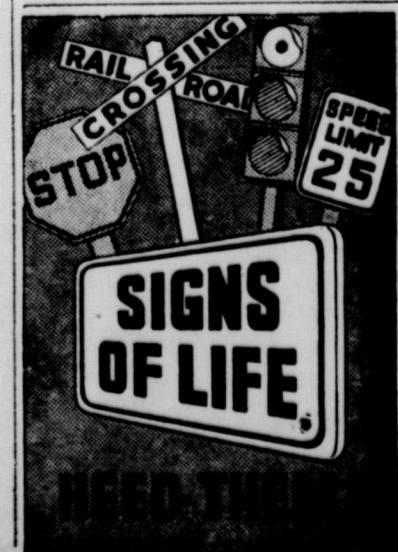

 Light-skinned hogs some times develop skin troubles from a little sunlight. Shade can be provided by supporting a wooden framework covered with woven wire on barrels and topped with straw or brush. Pigs like to eat a little, drink a little and eat some more, so it is important to supply water and feed in or near the shade. Making top quality hay this summer can be worth \$70.00 an

acre more in feed value. You lose feed value equal to 1,100 pounds of cotton seed and 700 pounds of corn and cob meal when your hay has only 30 percent leaves instead of 37 percent. It has been proven that 4 out of 5 fields of hay have been allowed to get too dry in the field. Tips on making top-quality hay say to check long range weather forecasts and cut only when you can cure and store quickly. Dry to safe moisture content to avoid mold and barn fires. If you are field curing safe moisture is 15 percent for chopped hay, 25 percent for baled hay. If hay heats up to over 200 de-

grees, a fire is almost sure to result. The danger period is from weeks to 2 months after harvest. Check on hay temperature by driving probes into the mass. Then insert a pipe and lower a thermometer tied with a long string. Test at many spots. If hay is overheated don't try to move it. Apply dry ice on top of the hay, or pour liquid carbon dioxide into the mass. The liquid material can be introduced into the hot spots through pipes. It can be obtained in cylinders such as those used at soda fountains. Don't add any water to heated hay. When the temperature is lowered, have the

local fire department stand by, where hay is to be torn out. Good roughage saves as much as \$24.00 a cow, or 26 cents a 100 pounds of milk produced. You can get by with 250 pounds less grain and 450 pounds less protein supplement for each cow. Good quality roughage consists of a high proportion of legumes cut in early-bloom stage. Feeding value is about the same, whether it is fed as hay or grass silage.
