

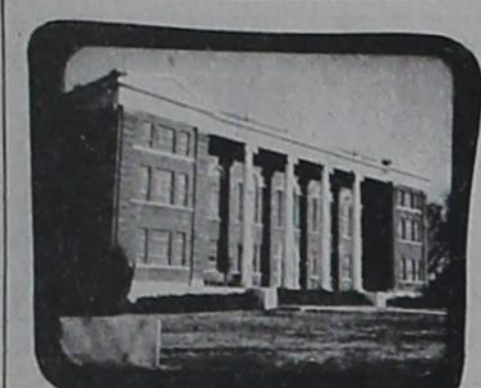
# Wheeler Girls Win Regional Golf Meet!

 [The following article was taken from the Pampa News]. The United States Post Office is getting ready to do a little Post Office Building in Mobeetie's new building will probably be the first one built and Skellytown and White Deer are looking forward to moving into a new Post Office. The three Post Offices should be built by this time next year and should be the same size but have all new boxes and equipment.  
 Bob Tipton, postal operations specialist from Lubbock will supervise the building of the offices. The Postal Service approves new post offices on a priority basis. Mobeetie's post office is almost 60 years old so it was considered the most essential at this time.  
 Bids are already being taken for the building and must be submitted by April 25th. Tipton said the postal services releases buildings that are built to the service specifications. We go out and advertise for sites in the area we think the post office ought to be and they take out an assignable option on the site. Then they advertise for builders.  
 The builder purchases the property for the optional price and builds on the site. The new post office will be built according to size ranging from 500 square feet to 5000 feet.  
 Tipton said the number of boxes and customers are fed into the computer to determine the size needed he said. Then we project that 10 years of growth.
