HIGHWAYS MUST BE SAFER

The loss of nearly one hundred lives every day on our streets and highways should emphasize the importance of concentrated effort to make motor traffic safer for those who drive the nearly 52,000,000 cars, trucks and buses, as well as for pedestrains, who are compelled to use our highways.

The development of modern highways and high speed motor vehicles has made death a fellow-traveler. No one knows with certainty when the grim specter rides along or whose life will be cut down by the invisible a period of years, practically always double

Despite programs to educate us in high-safety, track who signs, improvway safety, trates who and signs, improved highways and care, the tell of accidents is appalling. We pay a high price in human life for the recognized benefits which have accrued to society through greater and fast-

The problem has no single solution. Warning signals, stop signs and flashing lights are helpful but, as traffic increases, they slow down the movement of vehicles. Driving lessons and safety problems make a contribution. Regular inspection of motor vehicles, enforcement of traffic regulations and revocation of driving licenses erect a screen of protection. The problem multiplies, however, as motor traffic increases in volume as well as speed.

Amazing progress has been made in constructing highways to accommodate heavy traffic. In many places, the old twolane highway has been replaced by a multilane thoroughfare. There are through highways on which grade crossings have been eliminated. Even the toll highway has been accepted in some states as a means to finance the relocation and improvement of highways for the speeding traffic.

Traffic engineers and safety specialists realize that when the movement of vehicular traffic reaches a certain density, real safety demands separation of traffic and the elimination of crossings by the construction of over-and-under-passes. They realize, as all of us do, that the construction of such thoroughfares on the desired scale will cost a lot of money. Nevertheless, it is beginning to be apparent that the lives of our users of the highways can be saved through such construction. The money must be found somewhere, somehow.

A PROFITABLE HOBBY

The issuance of postage stamps, which began as a convenient method of collecting for delivery by mail, has developed a valuable sideline through the enthusiasm with which some people become collectors.

The United States has issued many special stamps. Every time one is issued, there is a rush by collectors to get cancellations on the first day of issue. Thousands of orders are received by mail from stamp collectors all over the world.

Much the same thing happened the othe day when the United Nations began sending mail from its own postoffice, with its ow U. N. stamps and cancellations. Collector flocked into the building and 300,000 order were received by mail. Some collectors, according to newspaper reports, bought as much as \$75,000 worth of stamps.

It is perfectly obvious that such sales represent almost a windfall. There is no expense except that of printing and selling the stamps over the counter. The stamp collectors, however, do not throw their money away. Experts on the subject assert that these special stamps, if carefully saved for or treble in value.
