HOLT GREEN FUNERAL HELD SUN. AFTERNOON

Holt (Jakie) Green, a lifelong resident of Wheeler passed away at his home in the east edge of town last Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock. Green had not been in good health for several years and had been seriously ill for several months.

Holt Green was born at Roby on December 23, 1903 but was brought to Wheeler by his parents when he was only a year old and had been a resident of Wheeler for 46 years. He was named after his mother whose maiden name was Rose Holt.

He married Miss Elva Holley, who survives him, on October 2, 1932.

Green served Wheeler County eight years as district clerk, being elected to two terms, first in 1930, then again in 1934, 1936 and 1938. Previous to that he had served four years as deputy district clerk.

After that Green started following the carpenter's trade which he pursued up until the time of his death.

Funeral services were conducted from the Wheeler Methodist Church Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock with Rev. Darris Egger, pastor, in charge. Rev. M. B. Smith, pastor of the Baptist Church, and Min. Thomas Seay of the Church of Christ assisted with the services.

Interment was in the Wheeler Cemetery with Kirk-Mason Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

NEWS FROM— County Agent's Office

The next few weeks is the time to do the maintenance and repair jobs that just seem to accumulate around the farmstead. Winter is just around the corner and most of the jobs should be done while the weather is favorable.

One of the first should be getting the floor furnace, heaters and fireplace in top operating condition. Before the gas is turned on, better get all the heating equipment checked. Make sure there are no gas leaks and that all burners are in good condition. Moisture condensation can be eliminated if vents for the space heaters are installed.

The addition of properly installed insulation will make the home warmer and reduce the fuel bills. And it will also help keep the heat out next summer.

Rat Eradication Program Planned For Month of Nov.

MUSTANGS LOSE, WILL PLAY AT WHITE DEER

In a battle that was somewhat of a "battle" the Wheeler Mustangs dropped a 7 to 6 decision to the Stinnett Rattlers in a bitterly fought non-conference encounter which was played on the local gridiron last Friday night.

The Rattlers, members of District I-B and not too strong at that, were not expected to give the Mustangs much trouble, but they seemed to have the idea that they were supposed to trounce the Mustangs after having upset them early in the season last year and proceeded to do just that.

The Mustang's hope for victory in their third conference contest of the season, which is to be played Friday night at White Deer with the White Deer Bucks furnishing the opposition, is not too bright since the Bucks have trounced all comers with the exception of the Class AA Dumas Demons by top-heavy scores and have a large well balanced squad.

However, Coach Coleman Huffman and members of the Mustang squad state that they believe they will go ahead and play the game rather than give up without a try... it is possible, you know, the state, that we could defeat them and that is just what they are going to be out to.

An 84-yard run by Johnny McFarren, Rattler halfback, and a perfect placed kick by Billy Williams in the second period gave the Rattlers all the points they needed to put the contest on ice.

The Mustangs came back strong in the fourth period to score a touchdown when David Johnson pushed the ball across on a quarterback sneak from the two-yard line, but the pass play for extra point failed and the Mustangs trailed by a single point when they could not make up and the contest ended that way.

November will be known as rat eradication, and control month in Wheeler County it was announced this week by County Agent Ray Siegmund. During this month, farmers and anyone else, who wants to control rats and mice in their homes and barns, are urged to take part in this campaign.

The new and safest method of rat control will be used by putting out a bait called warfarin which is made up of the chemical called warfrin mixed with ground corn meal, ground oats, and an oil. This bait is very palatable to rats and mice and they will eat it even though there is other food material around. This bait is not poisonous to livestock, chickens, or humans unless it is eaten every day for a period of four to seven days. Rats and mice must also eat this warfrin bait for a period of four to seven days before they will die. This bait causes rats and mice to die by causing them to bleed to death internally.

There will be nine community meetings held over the county and at each one of these meetings it will be demonstrated how to put out the bait and any questions about the bait will be answered then. Anyone who wants to use this bait must attend a demonstration to get it at a reduced price of \$1.25 for five pounds. Since it takes about five pounds to do a good job of control on each farm, each farmer will not be able to buy less than that amount. However, if a home is to be treated, one pound is usually enough to do a good job and a pound can be bought for 25c. This mixed bait can be obtained only during the month of November and any not sold during that month will be sent back to the Rodent Control offices of the Texas Fish and Wildlife Commission.

Demonstrations will be held at a farm at 9:00 a.m. in the following communities on: Friday, Nov. 2, at Kelton; Tuesday, Nov. 6, at Wheeler; Wednesday, Nov. 7, at Shamrock; Thursday, Nov. 8, at Lela; Wednesday, Nov. 14, at Twitty; Thursday, Nov. 15, at Briscoe; Friday, Nov. 16, at Allison; Tuesday, Nov. 20, at Pagan and Wednesday, Nov. 21, at Mobettie.

Be sure to check the paper for more information as to the farm that will be used in each of these communities. If anyone who lives in the near center of the following communities, Pagan, Briscoe, Twitty, and Lela, would like to have the demonstration at his farm, please let County Agent Siegmund know this.

Wheeler County Health Department, Wheeler County Veteran Agricultural classes, the Texas Fish and Wildlife Commission, and Wheeler County Agent's office are all cooperating to get as many rats and mice killed as possible in Wheeler County in order to save valuable feed and see as well as improve the health of the people of Wheeler County.

VANPOOL WILL LEAD DRIVE FOR SCOUT FUNDS

A. O. Vanpool has accepted the Chairmanship of the 1951 Wheeler Boy Scout Finance Drive, to be held on Tuesday, October 23, James Sullivan, District Chairman for the Southern District, Adobe Walls Council, announced this week.

Aiding Mr. Vanpool will be H. W. Coffman, as Advance Gifts Chairman, and Jack Garrison and T. J. Daughtry as Team Captains. These men, with Mr. Vanpool will head a campaign organization of 22 men. "This year's campaign will be of the same one-day, "dawn-to-dusk" type that was used last year," Mr. Vanpool said. "There is no "dollars and cents" goal for Wheeler or for Wheeler County, as the Adobe Walls Council operates on a policy of One Council, One Program, One Budget, and One Treasurer. What this means is that we are part of a 15-county area served by the Council—throughout this area we are all working in one Program, the Program of the Boy Scouts of America—that there is only one budgetary goal, the overall 15-county area budget—that all the funds are deposited in, and distributed from, one Pampa bank, purely in the interest of efficiency in bookkeeping.

The Council Operating Budget, which the funds raised in Wheeler will help provide, is used to provide facilities which would not otherwise be available to the Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and Explorers of the area. Among these are the facilities at Camp Ki-O-Wah, the Council Boy Scout Camp. This camp is used for the annual summer camp, and many other events during the year; it is open for weekend camping use by any Unit at any time. Also provided by the budget is the training of volunteer leaders, such as the Scout Leaders' course to be offered at Lake McClellan, October 27-28, and November 10-11.

Kickoff for the Wheeler Boy Scout Campaign will be held at a breakfast on the morning of October 23—with the place and name of the guest speaker yet to be determined. In closing, Mr. Vanpool said, "The citizens of Wheeler were generous in their contributions to this very worthy cause last year, and I am sure that they will do even better this year."

COTTON PULLERS NEEDED BADLY

Urgent appeals are going to all points in Texas for cotton pullers daily according to L. P. Fort manager of the Texas Employment Commission office at Pampa.

The south plains crop is late, not over 25 percent gathered, and the crop here is slightly earlier than usual. Crews are not getting through to here, they are being stopped or hired down the country.

A slight relief is noted, in the area, but the situation is still critical.

Some hope is held that crews will be released in about a week in the Beaumont-Lufkin area.

The Texas Employment Commission office at Pampa has mission of Beaumont has promised to try to hold some crews off beginning Friday of this week. If this can be done, some farmers intend to go to Beaumont and bring their crews straight through, they would not be stopped enroute by the shortage areas to the south.

Fort states that the need for pullers in Wheeler County is urgent and advises that farmers keep in touch with their ginners as he is in touch with them every day and if any crews become available the ginners will know about them.

Editorial

PROPER RESTRICTIONS WOULD END SCANDALS

There is much talk at the present time about the "greed for gate receipts" that is exhibited by collegiate athletic enterprises, which means football, and various suggestions that, in the opinion of the authors, would solve the problem and eliminate the scandals which have come to light in recent

months. There are those who suggest that intercollegiate football be abandoned or that gate receipts be abolished. They would eliminate radio and television, insofar as intercollegiate athletics are concerned. Some would abandon such competition and rely exclusively upon intramural sports.

While we would not advise any young man to participate in collegiate football because of the chance of serious injury and consequently disability, there is little to be gained by abolishing the sport, either from an intercollegiate or an intramural standpoint. The quest for promising football "prospects" and a winning team has led to some strange developments in recent years. The football eleven of few institutions of learning represents a cross-section of the football skill of those who would normally attend such colleges or universities. Very often they represent something like professionalism on a so-called amateur basis.

We think many of the abuses of intercollegiate football would be ended if proper restrictions were placed around those who played on the elevens representing any institution. Certainly, any college or university has an area from which it draws a normal number of students. This is the actual operating radius of the institution and its football team should be restricted to those who reside in it. Naturally, there are great institutions with radii that extend for unlimited distances but most of the colleges in the nation have a radius that can be clearly determined.

Our idea is that College X, which draws most of its students from State X, should not be permitted to play any students except those who come from its well-defined supporting area. We do not see much difficulty involved in the determination of adequate radii for the various colleges and, when the time comes to schedule games, the colleges could compete on the basis of their comparable radii.

Imagine a college in Texas for example, with a football team made up very largely of players who come from other states, some five hundred or more miles from the institution of learning. Nobody suspects that these players represent students from the radius in which the influence of the college operates. What they represent is good football "prospects," who receive an athletic scholarship and possibly other financial considerations, for leaving their homes and journeying to a far place in order to play football under profitable conditions.

You can plainly see that if your grain drill is loaded with an assortment of seed grain, pieces of straw, grain hulls and weed seeds, your standing crop will show up with many bare or thin spots, where you have sown trash instead of good seeds. Thorough machine cleaning takes out almost all of this foreign matter. It is not easy to see spores of

bunt on the seed. In fact, to the unaided eye, the seed may appear free of stinking smut and with certain weather conditions the resulting field may be 50 percent bunted. So wheat growers should not take this chance when they can be absolutely sure of not having bunt for only 1¢ to 5¢ per acre. This insurance may be had by treating the seed with a good disinfectant just as it leaves the cleaner or 24 hours or more before planting. Your County Agent can direct you to a cleaning and treating machine, or tell you how to do it yourself.

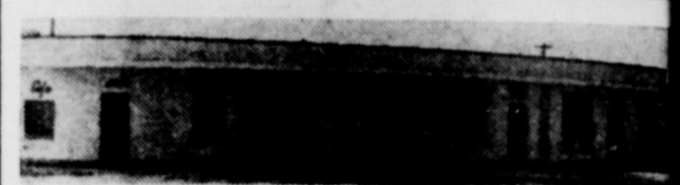

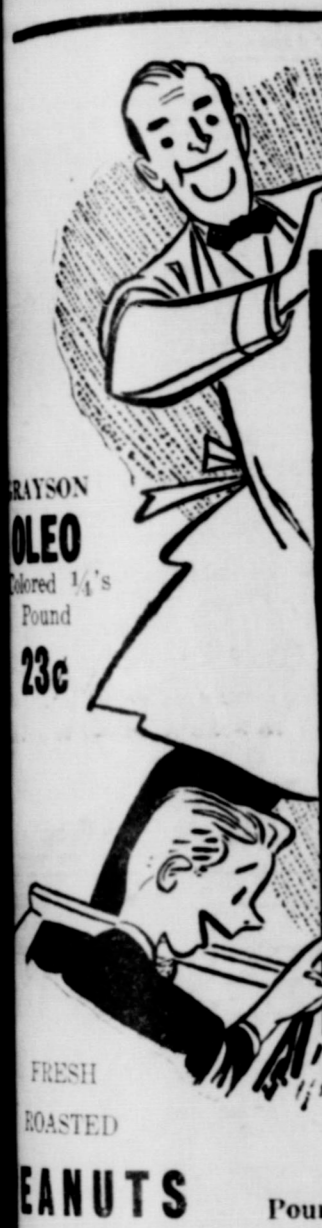

- Mix $\frac{1}{2}$ cup melted butter and $\frac{1}{4}$ cups graham cracker crumbs.
- Save $\frac{1}{4}$ cup mixture. Press the rest firmly in bottom and on sides of 9-in. pie pan. Chill.
- Mix $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ tablespoons cornstarch, and $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt.
- Stir in slowly until smooth. Add 1 cup peach syrup and 1 cup Pet Milk.
- Add 1 tablespoon butter.
- Stir over boiling water until thick and smooth. Cook 10 minutes; stir often.
- Remove from heat; stir into 2 slightly beaten eggs.

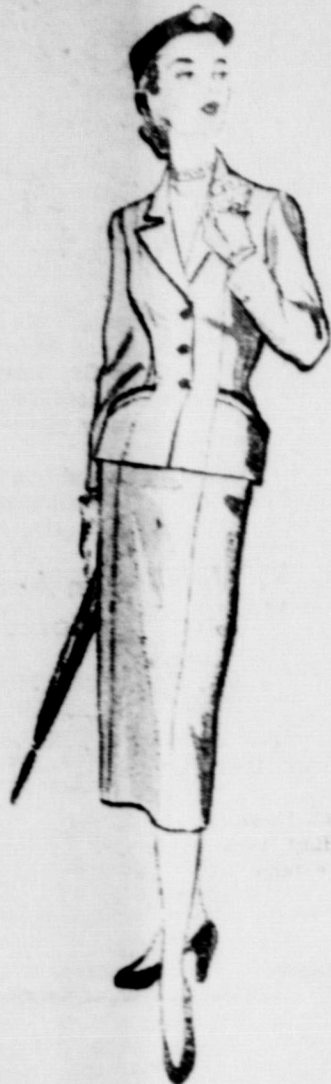

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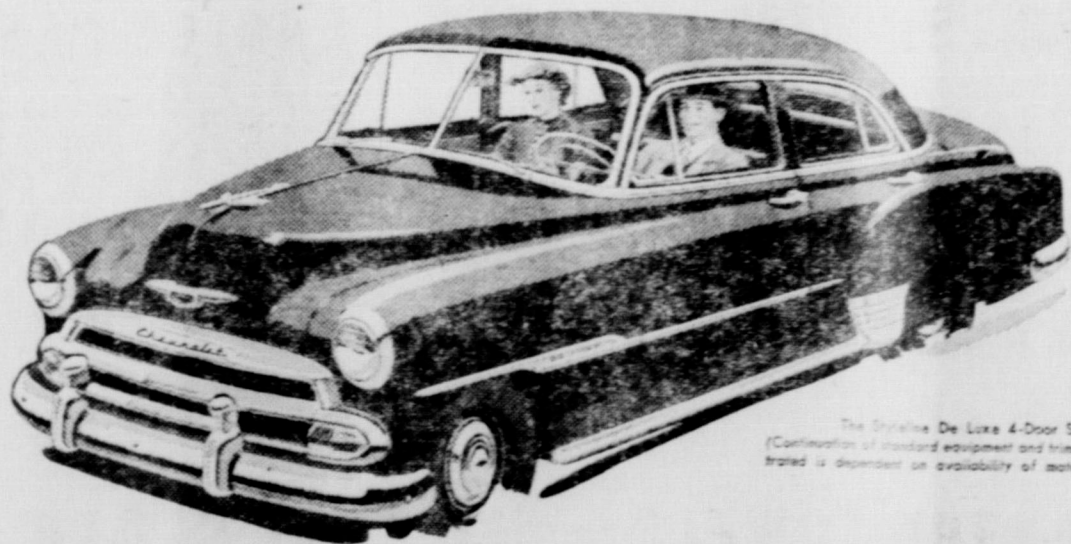

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NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES

WHEREAS, the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers of any such county, such re-allocations and

changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF WHEELER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 13th day of November, 1951, which is not less than (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers of said County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

- Not exceeding Fifty Cents (50c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;
- Not exceeding Thirty-Five Cents (35c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;
- Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and
- Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

"AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

dirt and trash haven't clogged them. If they become clogged and force the water to spill over, woodwork and roofing may be seriously damaged and inside finishes and wall covering may also be ruined.

If the septic tank hasn't been cleaned lately, better check it. Cleaning sludge from a septic tank is a disagreeable job at any time but if done during freezing weather, it's double tough.

All farm buildings should get a thorough checking and a good place to start is with the roofs. Missing shingles should be replaced, loose shingles pushed back into place and reroiled and split shingles underlaid with tin or sheet metal shingles.

If trees overhang the building, limbs that drag on the roof should be removed. Nails in metal may become loose or even come out during the hot summer weather and these should be driven up and replaced if missing. Small leaks in a roof may be repaired by applying asphalt roofing cement, but if the roof needs replacing, now is the time to get the new roof on.

Better check on the drainage around all farm buildings to make sure that water will not drain under them. Water under foundations can cause plenty of trouble. When it freezes, the foundation or piers may be pushed out of line or even cracked.

Loose or damaged boards in side walls should be replaced, nailed or repaired. In case the paint is peeling or chipping, now is the time to remove all of the old paint and put on new.

Proper maintenance and periodic checks will help keep down building costs and save needless repairs later. Good housekeeping on the outside is just as important as doing a good job on the inside and since the week of October 7-13 was National Fire Prevention Week, we suggest making a survey for fire hazards at the same time checks are made for getting the farmstead ready for winter.

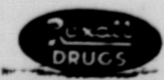
