SLOW COOKER SAFETY LINES FROM LINDA

How safe is food prepared in a slow cooker? If it's done properly, slow cooking is safe. According to Foods and Nutrition specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, potential problems in using a cooker is the time it takes the pot to heat to bacteria-killing temperatures, which is generally about two hours.

For tasty -- and safe -- slow-cooked dishes, remember these precautions: *Keep perishable foods refrigerated until you're ready to use them. Refrigeration prevents rapidly reproducing bacteria from getting a head start in the two hour danger period.

*Don't use frozen meat or poultry. It takes longer for frozen foods to reach bacteria-killing temperatures. Using frozen meat or poultry can also result in undercooking since the cooking times given in most recipes are based on thawed ingredients.

*Don't overload the cooker. Portions of meat or vegetables rising above the cooking area won't fully cook. Also, when too much food is





Breast Screening Offered at Coronado

Coronado Hospital will again participate in the Texas Breast screening project, sponsored by the American Cancer Society, according to Norman Knox, administrator of the hospital. Because of the tremendous response in 1987 of over 100,000 Texas women, the ACS decided to promote the project again.

The 1988 Texas Breast Screening Project will once provide low-cost screening mammograms to symptom-free women for a limited period. Coronado Hospital is offering the screens for \$50 from April 1 through April 30. Anyone wishing to have the low-dose mammogram should call the hospital at 665-3721 to make an appointment. The \$50 fee includes all charges, the hospital said. Reports from the mammogram will be mailed to the woman's physician who will share the results with her.

The project's long-term goal is to increase awareness of the need for routine mammography for the early detection of breast cancer.

In conjunction with the project the hospital will sponsor a free seminar on breast cancer March 24 at 7 p.m. until 8:30 at the hospital. Dr. Moss Hampton will discuss breast self examination (BSE) and Dr. Fred Juan will explain the surgical procedures used to cure breast cancer. A film explaining BSE will be shown and the participants at the seminar will be taken on a tour of the mammography

Insurance companies in the state have been mandated by Texas law to begin coverage of screening mammograms, as of this year. Women who have insurance should check with their insurance carrier to see when during the year this coverage will take effect for them. Those who have the screening procedure done at Coronado Hospital will be asked to pay cash, but will be provided with the appropriate forms with which to bill their insurance.

The American Cancer Soceity encourages women over the age of 35 who are symptom free---that is, without a single, abnormal breast lump....to routinely have a screening mammographic examination. One in every ten American women will develop breast cancer at some time during her life. Since physicians do not yet know how to prevent breast cancer, the best protection is early detection. Chances of cure are excellent when tumors are detected early, while they are still small and confined to the breast.

A baseline mammogram should be performed between the ages of 35 and 40. Then, women age 40 and older should have a mammogram every one to two years, depending on the advice of their physician. And after age 50, women should have a mammogram every year, according to ACS guide-

All women should practice breast self-examination every month and should have a breast examination by a physician every year. Mammography, which has an accuracy rate of about 90 percent, together with breast selfexamination and a physician's exam offer the best defense against breast

"The mammogram is the Pap smear of the 80's" says Dallas declined significantly.





Baldwin, or "Daddy Bob" as so many knew him, collapsed at his home last Tuesday night, Feb. 16. For the four days he lay in an Albuquerque hospital, from one end of town to the other, from the bank to the post office to last Friday's Senior Citizens Center enchilada supper, people wondered aloud:

'Did you hear?"

"Is he all right?" "Say a prayer for him."

There were even those who didn't recognize the name "Baldwin", but instantly knew the nickname "Daddy Bob."

'Oh, no, not him. Why I just saw

And so talk went. Almost everyone "just saw him," for that is the impression people had of Bob Baldwin. He was everywhere, visiting the homebound, stopping by to chat with the folks in hospital rooms, collecting aluminum cans and stockpiling his dining room table with balloons and treats for the kids.

Everyone knew him.

"He was Mr. Socorro," said one. 'He was just about the neatest guy in Socorro," offered another.

And so talk went, from one end of town to the other.

IF ONE HAD to classify Baldwin, it might be as a humanitarian, although he had his business side as well. He was especially proud of his roots in the Territory of New Mexico; for over a century members of his family had lived within its boundaries, after having first settled in the Datil area. Baldwin himself, one of four children, was born in Reserve.

He enrolled at the then-New Mexico School of Mines, and later transferred to the University of New Mexico; he graduated in 1933. Two years later, Realtor, making a sale just a week before he died.
