FIGHT AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS IS PROGRESSING

Fewer people are dying from TB each year, but the number of patients in TB hospitals is growing. According to Dr. W. D. Anderson of San Angelo, chairman of the Texas Medical Association's Committee on Tuberculosis, "rapid progress is being made in saving people from death from TB but progress in saving people from the disease itself is slow."

The recently published Annual Report of the National Tuberculosis Association, Dr. Anderson said today, attributes the drop in deaths to the development of new drugs, important advances in surgery, and recent expansion of X-ray survey programs through-

SEAL SALE NETS \$296.00 IN FIRST WEEK
County Judge G. W. Hefley, treasurer of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association, reported today (Thursday) that he had received a total of \$296.00 in donations in the first week of the Annual Wheeler County TB Association drive for funds with which to carry on the work of stamping out the dread disease.

Seals were mailed out the first part of last week to hundreds of county residents, but some who would like to buy seals were probably overlooked; therefore, if anyone wishes seals they may have them by getting in touch with G. W. Hefley or Mrs. J. C. Howell, executive secretary of the association, at Wheeler.

Residents are urged to mail their contributions to G. W. Hefley as quickly as possible.

which new cases of TB are discovered in the early stage. The report shows that TB deaths in the United States have dropped from 150,000 in 1900 to about 40,000 a year at present. "Since 1904 the death rate has been cut 85 percent," Dr. Anderson said, "yet the disease is known to strike 100,000 victims annually and public health authorities estimate that about 500,000 people in the U.S.A. have TB today."

Dr. Anderson pointed out that Texas currently has the tenth highest TB death rate among the states and that one out of every 100 people screened in X-ray surveys here last year was found to have TB.

"As more cases are discovered in the early stage, and as methods of treatment continue to improve, a continued decrease in deaths is predicted," Dr. Anderson declared. He stated, however, that in spite of progress, "TB still kills more people than all other communicable diseases combined and is still the greatest disease killer in the age group from 15 to 34."

Dr. Anderson warned that the problem of medical and nursing care for the increasing number of patients in TB hospitals in Texas is acute. He noted a growing need for adequate rehabilitation, social and welfare services to TB patients.

"More people need to learn what that should do as individuals to protect themselves from TB and what they should do as voters to provide sufficient facilities to control tuberculosis in this State," he declared. Adding that the voluntary TB associations can help meet these needs by continuing and intensifying their education programs, Dr. Anderson urged all Texans to buy and use Christmas Seals this year. The annual Christmas Seal Sale now being conducted throughout the nation, he pointed out, will support the entire program of the TB associations.

3 STRETCHES COUNTY ROAD DESIGNATED FM

County Judge G. W. Hefley this week received notification from Palmer Massey, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department, that three stretches of road in Wheeler County have been designated as Farm-To-Market Roads subject to the availability of funds in the Farm-To-Market Fund of the State Highway Department.

The roads designated are: From end of FM 1443 at Heald north of Kellerville, a distance of approximately 7.5 miles.

From US 66 at Bethel, south, a distance of approximately 0.8 miles.

From FM 1046 at Allison north to Hemphill County Line, a distance of approximately 0.8 miles.

Upon acceptance of the provisions of this Order by the proper officials of Wheeler County the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for construction at an estimated cost of \$107,600.00 and when right-of-way and funds are available to proceed with construction and to assume the roads for maintenance upon completion of construction," the letter stated.

The construction of the 0.8 miles from FM 1046 at Allison north to the Hemphill County Line will give a complete hard surfaced loop from US Highway 83 at Briscoe to a point on Highway 83 in Hemphill County.

The 0.8 miles from US 66, south, would give the new United Carbon Co. plant a hard surfaced thoroughfare to town.

3rd Annual Legion Minstrel Will Be Presented Dec. 7

COUNTY PEOPLE BUY \$45,638.25 WORTH OF BONDS

Wheeler County's sales total \$45,638.25 during the first U. S. Defense Bond drive, Nathan Adams of Dallas, state chairman, informed R. J. Holt, local county chairman. The drive was held from Sept. 3 through Nov. 13.

Final sales figures showed that Series E bonds accounted for \$31,219.75 and Series F and G for \$14,418.50 of this county's total. Sales of \$27,778,453.25 in Texas during the drive were almost 50 percent more than normal, Mr. Adams said.

"Normally sales for this period would have been about \$18,000,000 or \$19,000,000," he said, "and the fact that sales were so much higher is definite proof that the people of Texas are responding, as they always do, to the country's need in national emergencies."

The sales total for the state include \$22,459,665.25 in Series E bonds and \$5,318,788 in Series F and G. There were no state or county quotas, the goal being the "largest possible" volume of sales. Mr. Adams expressed appreciation to the thousands of citizens who served as volunteers in the drive, but urged that they continue their efforts.

"The need for buying Defense Bonds still exists," he said. "With our country engaged in a gigantic preparedness program, these bonds form an important economic link in our defense."

DECEMBER 7 TO BE OPERATION DEMOCRACY DAY

Governor Allan Shivers today designated the tenth anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor as "Operation Democracy" Day in Texas.

"Operation Democracy" is sponsored annually by the State American Legion to promote greater citizen participation in local, state and national government affairs. Leading the program for the third straight year is John Ben Shepherd, chairman of the American Legion Americanism committee.

"The December 7 program will be highlighted by poll tax sales as a part of the Legion's year-in, year-out campaign to increase the turn-out in all elections," State Legion Commander Charlie Gibson announced in Amarillo. "On that day Legionnaires and members of the Legion Auxiliary will be deputized as poll tax collectors in more than 600 communities."

Special "Voting Insures Democracy" luncheons will be staged at noon across the state by the Legion in cooperation with other civic organizations, Gibson said. A poll tax receipt will be required for admission to the luncheons.

In setting aside December 7 as "Operation Democracy" Day, Governor Shivers referred to the growing lack of interest shown at the polls by the nation's eligible voters. He described the Legion campaign as a program seeking to "make the voice of the people ever more powerful in determining the fate of a nation rich in heritage but poor in acceptance of the ideal that each citizen shall take an active part in local, state and national affairs."

"Democracy at its best will be the ultimate victor over corruption and greed at home and over the forces of communism abroad," the official memorandum declared. He then urged all Texans to participate in the all-day series of programs to dramatize that "fires of freedom still burn bright in confidence of final victory over the forces of evil confronting us today."

A morning "go to church" program will open the December 7 observance, followed by special Auxiliary meetings and the "Voting Insures Freedom" luncheons. Schools have been invited to hold oratorical or essay contests on the

Editorial

THE INCOME OF DOCTORS

The incomes of physicians in private practice for the year 1949 were examined jointly by the Department of Commerce and the American Medical Association.

It appears, from the report, that the average independent physician received \$11,858. The specialist averaged more than \$15,000, while the neurological surgeons led with more than \$28,000. It is surprising to note that doctors with the highest incomes live in the Far West. Ordinarily, it would be expected that the richest doctors would be found in the rich populous states of New England.

Physicians with the lowest incomes are those who practice in communities with

populations of 1,000 or less. Their average net income is about \$6,000.

One of the nation's pressing needs in the field of medicine is more doctors in rural areas. In view of the fact that doctors in rural areas receive only about half as much as doctors who practice in the cities, it is easy to understand why young doctors, who still owe thousands of dollars for their medical education, tend to go to the big cities.

Another factor which must be considered, when we compare the city doctor with the country doctor, is the fact that city doctors often have hours, just like the rest of us, whereas country doctors are on call twenty-four hours a day.

As far as income and working conditions are concerned, the average community doctor is making real sacrifices. Fortunately, the people in most small communities realize and appreciate these sacrifices.

STEAKS TO BE PLENTIFUL

After many months of dire predictions of the availability of beef and threats from both the meat industry and the Office of Price Stabilization, the prospect today is for lower prices and an abundant supply of beef in the coming months. The reason for this favorable outlook are several. Neither the O. P. S. nor the meat industry can take full credit.

Actually, this is the fourth year in which cattle herds have increased, the latest estimate on cattle population being ninety million. Add to this the fact that there is an abundant supply of pork and you have the makings of a decline in meat prices. The supply of pork has already forced pork prices down.

The larger cattle herds are, the larger the slaughter is likely to be, if the ratio between feed and cattle prices is favorable. This year that ratio is favorable, and corn is in large supply. Thus no single factor is responsible for the bright beef forecast but a number of circumstances, all favorable, provide the basis for such a prediction.

Herds are large, feed supplies large, the feed and beef prices ratio favorable, and other factors also favorable. Beef being in ample supply, there seems to be nothing to prevent adequate supplies of those choice steaks from reaching the market at better prices. To the American housewife, this is a long-awaited development.

SERVE GLAZED COTTAGE HAM



Glamorize economical cottage ham butt for company dinner by basting with a tangy and glistening glaze. Served with the foods so traditionally good with ham—browned pineapple slices, scalloped potatoes, green peas, crisp cole slaw, dill pickles, rye bread and cold beer—it makes a festive meal for any occasion.

Shaped like pork tenderloin, and sometimes called by that term, cottage ham is rolled smoked shoulder of pork. Weighing from one to three pounds, the meat is solid without bone or waste and cuts easily for serving into evenly shaped slices. Serve the meal smartly by having the host carve at the table while the hostess serves the vegetables and salad. Add a gala atmosphere by pouring the beer into tall, tapering pilsener glasses and passing the relishes in gay, attractive dishes.

Glazed Cottage Ham
 3 tablespoons brown sugar
 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
 2 tablespoons ketchup
 1/2 teaspoon grated onion
 1/2 teaspoon kitchen bouquet
 1/2 cup beer
 Par-boiled cottage ham butt

Combine brown sugar and mustard. Stir in ketchup, onion and kitchen bouquet. Add beer slowly, stirring smooth. Put cottage ham butt in baking pan; pour glaze over ham. Bake 45 minutes in moderate oven (350° F.), basting every 10 minutes with drippings in pan.

NEWS FROM—

County Agent's Office

The rat control program in Wheeler County has gone on for about a month now and we want to report that over fifty farmers have put out this bait on their farms. Over 400 pounds of mixed warfarin bait was used on these farms. Reports are beginning to come in and dead rats and mice have been reported by every one who has reported to this office. We have less than a hundred pounds of this mixed warfarin bait on hand, so if you haven't put out any yet or need some more, be sure and come by the county agent's office pretty soon.

Well, these rains have sure held up the gathering of cotton these past few days. Everyone seems to be making a little better crop than they expected back when it was so dry in the summer. I noticed one thing while driving over the county; that the farmers who put on insecticides to control the flea hopper, and other cotton insects are finding that their cotton stalks are better loaded with bolls all the way down the stalk. Cotton insects were not as bad as they were last year but spraying and dusting at the right time still paid off in a larger yield of better grade of cotton.

Some work that is being done on cotton burs may be of interest to you who would like to get these burs back on the land where they belong to help hold and improve the soil. The Wheeler County Farm Bureau sent in a resolution to the state Farm Bureau Convention at Houston to try to get the quarantine lifted here in Wheeler County so that the cotton burs can be put back on the land instead of burned. The Wheeler County Mobilization Committee and the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District 141 have also lended their support to getting the pink boll worm quarantine lifted here in Wheeler County.

The PMA County Convention was held in the county agent's office on Monday afternoon, Nov. 26 to elect the 1952 county PMA committee. George Close of Sham-

rock was re-elected chairman; Jess Patterson of Mobeetie was re-elected as vice-chairman; John Beard of Kelton was re-elected as regular member; Gordon Whitener of Wheeler was elected as first alternate; and Clarence Zybach of Briscoe was elected as second alternate. Ray Sigmund, county agent and Albert Marshall, secretary of the PMA are ex-officio members of the committee. Mr. Close, Mr. Patterson, and Mr. Beard, as past members of the Wheeler PMA committee and Wheeler County Mobilization Committee have done an excellent job in directing the policy of the two committees that they serve on. They are truly working on helping the farmers of Wheeler County to carry on a better and sounder agriculture program and we of the county agents office wish them even more success in the year to come.

The county agent's office also wants to announce and welcome to Wheeler County Mrs. Francis Stanton, who is our new home demonstration agent. We know that everyone in Wheeler County, and especially the home demonstration clubs and girl's 4-H clubs are glad that she is with us and we all hope that she will enjoy working with the fine people of this county.

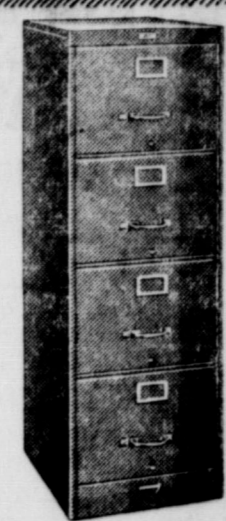

6 tablespoons cocoa
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 tablespoons corn syrup
9 tablespoons Fat Milk
3 tablespoons water

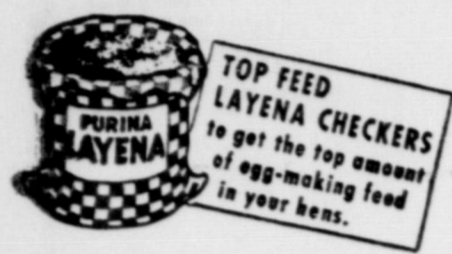
