JOHNSON IS TOP 'A' PLAYER

EDITOR'S NOTE:—The following is an article from the Wednesday morning, November 21, issue of the Amarillo Daily News by Monk Owens, News sports writer, concerning the feats of David (Teedie) Johnson who was chosen as class "A" player of the week for his performance in the Wheeler-Canadian tussle which was played on the local gridiron last Friday night. Jerry Newberry, co-captain of the Mustangs, also nominated for player of the week for his performance in the same contest.

Down Wheeler way, most of that community's 1,000 citizens swear that little David Johnson is one of the gosh-darrest football players they ever saw. Give him credit. The guy's a phenom.

David Johnson—all 135 pounds of him—is quarterback of the Wheeler Mustangs, a team that's lost more than it has won this year. People in Wheeler still think it's a great football team. And it is.

Coach Colie Huffman's tiny twenty have won four games and dropped six, and they've had to fight every inch of the way to win those. They did it with sheer guts and a sensational quarterback in David Johnson.

For his outstanding play against big, bruising Canadian last week, Johnson gets the overwhelming nomination for 1951's last Class A player of the week.

Canadian knocked down the Mustangs, 34-21. Friday night, but little David put on a one-man show that had even the hefty Wildcats grabbing thin air.

David ran wild around the Canadian ends, scoring once on a 47-yard touchdown zip, and passing to James Clark for two more touchdowns. One covered 15 yards and the other 50. Johnson also ran for two extra points.

The five-foot, six-inch senior quarterback does everything. He runs (and how he runs) . . . he passes . . . and he punts. He's been doing it all year. Against Lakeview he completed eight of eight passes. Against McLean, he punted for a 43-yard average.

But against Canadian, Johnson's punting was never better. He darted around the ends, off the tackles and through the line, sidestepping, faking and blasting, until the big Wildcats were almost daffy trying to catch the guy.

With a 145-pound line in front of him, Johnson does things most backs can't do with a 190-pound wall to cut down the defense. Huffman thinks David may have a good chance to play college ball, in spite of his size. The Wildcats will agree. After all, they never had to play against Bill Cross.

HIGHWAY DEPT. TO SEAL COAT COUNTY ROADS

The Texas Highway Department has announced that a program of highway work calls for the application of a seal coat on several highways in the vicinity of Wheeler including State Highway No. 152 across Wheeler County, Farm to Market Road No. 1046 from Briscoe to Allison, Farm to Market Road No. 48 from old Mobettie North four miles, and Farm to Market Road No. 592 from Twitty northeast thru Kelton to State Highway No. 152.

According to Clyde Drake, highway engineer in charge of the proposed improvement, the work will begin early next summer. Gravel cover material is now being stockpiled so that it will be available when needed.

Mr. Drake pointed out that the State Highway Commission in authorizing the work indicated that much more extensive work should be done on parts of some of these highways particularly on State Highway No. 152, but lack of adequate finance prohibits it. Chairman E. H. Thornton, Jr. of the Highway Commission stated, "The Department does not have finances available to do the real job that is necessary on these highways."

The Commission stated that, accordingly, this work is part of a state-wide program to preserve the roads, save the remaining investment, and improve safety and travel conditions.

NEW SAFETY RESPONSIBILITY LAW EXPLAINED

Texas motorists who become involved in traffic accidents in other states and motorists from other states who become involved in accidents in Texas are most likely to find that the long arm of the new Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law has followed them right to the scene of their misfortune. Public Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr., pointed out today.

As explained by Director Garrison, here is how it will operate when the law becomes effective in Texas on January 1:

Assume that a Texas motorist is driving his automobile in another state having a similar security type safety responsibility law and is involved in an accident that results in death or injury to a person or property damage to any one person in excess of \$100. He will be required, under the laws of that state, to furnish proof of his ability to meet damage claims either through insurance or by depositing sufficient security to cover the apparent damage he caused.

Should the Texas motorist fail to do this, the authorities of the other state will suspend his privileges to own or operate a motor vehicle in that state and will send a certified copy of his suspension order to the Texas Department of Public Safety. If the circumstances in the other state would have resulted in suspension in Texas, his motoring privileges will also be suspended in Texas. They will remain suspended until he has satisfied the law of the other state to the same extent that he would be required to satisfy the Texas law.

In the same manner, the new Texas law applies to non-resident motorists who are involved in accidents in this state, resulting in death or injury to a person, or property damage to any one person in excess of \$100. Non-residents who fail to meet the requirements of the Texas law will have their privileges suspended in this state and also in their home state if the circumstances would have called for similar action there.

"When you understand that 10 percent of the traffic accidents in most states are caused by out-of-state drivers," Director Garrison said, "you will appreciate the importance of this provision in our law. It means that a visiting motorist will no longer be able to skip out of responsibility for his damages by crossing the state line. If he does, he will find the administrator of his own state's safety responsibility law waiting for him with a suspension order. I think this alone will do much to promote greater safety on our highways."

Since 34 other states have enacted safety responsibility laws similar to the one that soon will become effective in Texas, the area where motorists are not subject to these modern statutes has been considerably narrowed. While the safety responsibility law in a few of these states does not include this reciprocal provision, they are rapidly adding it. In addition, traffic accident experts predict that most of the 13 states that have failed to enact these statutes will do so within the next two years.

MUSTANGS LOSE FINAL GAME TO WILDCATS

The Wheeler Mustangs played themselves a good ball game in their final outing of the season in which they met the District 1-A championship Canadian Wildcat eleven. The contest was played in sub-freezing weather on Wheeler's Nicholson Field last Friday before one of the largest crowds to witness a football game in Wheeler this season.

Especially outstanding was the offensive play of David Johnson and Bill Crossland, before he got a lick on the head which put him out of action for the rest of the contest. Some outstanding downfield blocking assignments were carried out by Co-Capt. Jerry Newberry and Jamie Clark. Defensive line play by the Mustangs were generally good even though the Mustangs were not able to hold the heavier Wildcats at all times.

Harold Loyd Lee, who played his first high school football this year, was and has been a great part of the season a standout on defense from a linebacker and defensive end position.

Glen Farmer, Glen Sanders, Richard Brown, Doyle Brown, Leon Moore, Buddy Toon, Bob Weatherly, Ray Cole Johnson, Buck Jones and Rondel Richerson all shouldered their portion of the load against the Wildcats.

The Wildcats scored three times during the first half to lead 20 to 0. Schoelds carried over from the 5 and Tom Sheaf carried the other two over on runs of 30 and 20 yards each. Sheaf, and Jimmie Waterfield each scored extra points.

In the third period George Vinson scored from the 2 for the Wildcats and Jimmie Waterfield converted. Following this score, the Mustangs took the ball and marched to midfield from where David Johnson set sail on a 50-yard scamper which brought them their first 6 points. Johnson converted.

Early in the fourth period David Johnson scooted over the Wildcats goal line from the 1 after it had been set up by a pass from Johnson to Jamie Clark. Johnson again scored the extra point.

A few minutes later Jimmie Waterfield passed 20 yards to Richard Mathers for 20 yards and the final Wildcat score. Don Sheaf converted.

The Mustangs final score came on a 50-yard pass and run play from David Johnson to Jamie Clark. Bob Weatherly scored the extra point.

Final score in the contest was 34 to 21 in favor of the Wildcats.

The Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association opened its annual campaign for funds with the mailing of Christmas Seals the first of this week Mrs. J. C. Howell, executive secretary of the organization, announced. The local campaign will coincide with the national campaign which runs from November 15 through December 24. This is the 45th annual national campaign and the seventh local campaign.

Mrs. Howell stated that letters have been mailed to hundreds of Wheeler County residents with requests that checks be returned in envelopes addressed to the association. Eighty percent of the money raised by the sale of seals in Wheeler County stays in the county for use in the fight against TB locally.

Each letter has 200 seals that generally sell for \$1.00 per sheet, but contributions are requested to be as liberal as possible.

Stressing the fact that "no home is safe while there is a single case of tuberculosis in the community," Mayor R. H. Forrester this week issued a formal proclamation urging active support of the 1951 Seal Sale by every resident of Wheeler County.

"Tuberculosis is a communicable disease and therefore a public health problem which should be the concern of every community resident, as well as Wheeler officials," the Mayor said in issuing his proclamation. "The work of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association toward preventing and controlling tuberculosis in this area has helped city officials to improve the health standards of the community."

"The Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association works tirelessly the year round to free this community from tuberculosis. Yet it makes but one appeal a year for funds to finance its twelve-month program, aimed at the protection of all of us against this dread disease. I urge every Wheeler County resident to buy and use as many Christmas Seals as he can and thereby make an investment of health for the coming year."

WHEREAS, the sale of Christmas Seals constitutes the sole support of the association and all its projects,

Editorial

ALLIES RESERVE POWER UNDER GERMAN TREATY

The treaty establishing the political sovereignty of the Federal Republic of Germany, which means a West German government at Bonn, has been agreed upon in principle, although certain supplementary contracts, imposing some restrictions on German sovereignty, are still under negotiation.

Under the treaty, the United States, Great Britain and France will reserve four specific powers. This has been accepted by the German Government upon the assurance that it will be consulted before these powers are invoked. This part of the treaty will not be popular with the German people because an important segment, represented by Dr. Kurt Schumacher, Socialist leader, has maintained that the treaty will only give Germany pseudo-sovereignty.

The Allies reserve the right to (1) proclaim a state of emergency when democracy

in Germany is threatened and to take whatever steps are necessary to meet the emergency; (2) to negotiate with the Soviet Union on the recognition of Germany; (3) to assist German frontiers through international negotiations; and (4) deal with Soviet Union on the status of Berlin.

One of the contracts to be appended to the Treaty would involve machinery to prevent German production of major weapons, including submarines, aircraft, heavy artillery, tanks and atomic weapons. Another attempt to implement the de-cartelization program, which will break up the monopolistic coal sales organization that the Germans would like to maintain. No attempt has been made to settle the question of financing the German defense contribution or of future occupation costs.

BAR TO COMPLETE EDUCATION

The trustees of Ohio State University have established a rule that no outside speaker may talk on the campus unless he has been "cleared" by the President's office.

The trustees were probably worried about the possibility of confusion in the public mind concerning the views of some speakers and the actual views of the University administration. Undoubtedly, a procession of news articles, telling about radical remarks on a college campus, could create an unfavorable impression about the institution of learning.

There is another side to the question, however, involving the freedom of thought which should be encouraged in an institution of learning. Certainly, no effort should be made to make all opinions adhere to one point of view or to ban completely the expression of opinion that is unpopular, unorthodox or revolutionary.

When institutions of learning attempt to censor the thinking of students and when they attempt to mold the thoughts of all students into one pattern, they are contributing to intellectual stagnation and creating a barrier to complete education.

THE SUN CLOSER IN DECEMBER

There are many people who find it difficult to believe that the sun is closer to the earth in Winter than it is in Summer.

Well, if you care to take the time to look it up, the almanacs show that on January 3rd, the sun was 92,318, miles from the earth, while last July 2 it was 94,422,000 miles away.

Pamphlet Issued To Help Combat Rabies

To help combat rabies in Texas the Texas State Dept. of Health has prepared a 20 page pamphlet entitled Facts About Rabies. According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, this information will be sent to citizens upon request.

In the type of rabies called "furious" the animal is irritable and will snap at nonexistent objects or attack anything in its path. In the excitement stage the animal is extremely vicious and violent. Paralysis follows this stage, usually affecting the hind legs first. Death follows the paralysis in four to seven days after the outbreak of the first symptoms.

In "dumb" rabies the symptoms are drowsiness and paralysis of the lower jaw. To all outward appearances the animal has a bone or some other object lodged in his throat. Such animals do not roam but will strike at movement. They are completely insensitive to pain and will usually fall into a coma and die about three to ten days after the first symptoms appear.

Dr. Cox states that in Texas the dog, fox, cat and skunk are the animals most apt to cause rabies. Last year the State Department of Health examined 4491 heads of 25 different animals for the purpose of rabies diagnosis. Only 1,220 or 27% were found to have had the disease. Of those found rabid there were 868 dogs, 167 fox, 59 cats and 43 were skunks. The highest percentage of positive rabies found on examinations are

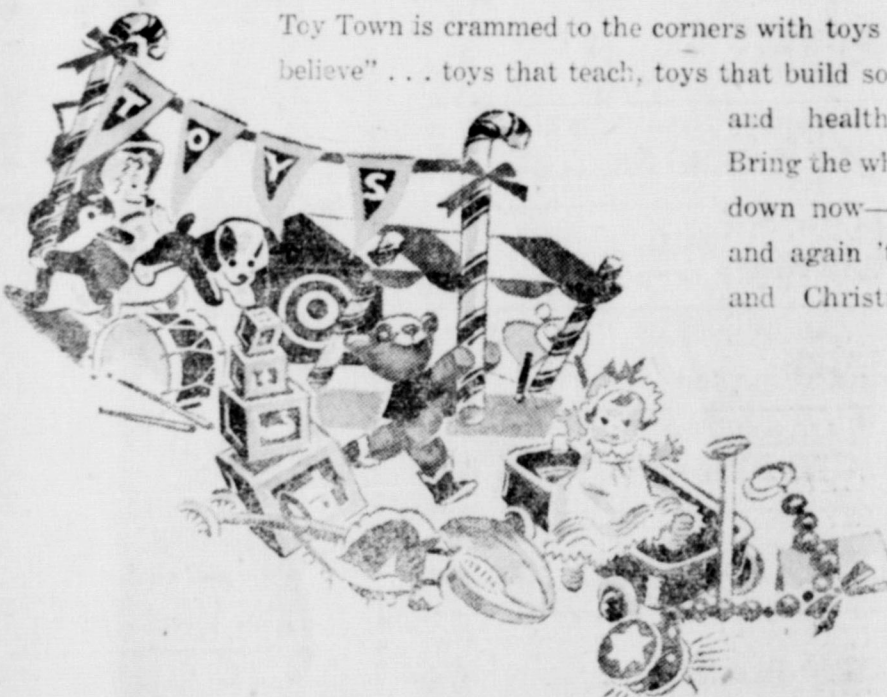



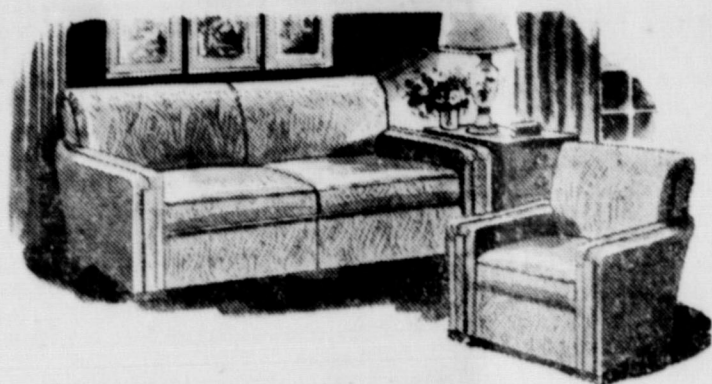
