RESPIRATORY DISEASES NEED TO BE WATCHED

Carelessness in the treatment of respiratory disease is not only foolish but very hazardous, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Ray Risner of Marshall, Dec. 17. Health Officer, who warned Tex-Mrs. Barney Gatlin of Mobeetie, ans today to be on guard against such illnesses as lead to pneumo-

Dr. Cox pointed out that pneumonia can and does strike with little or no warning, and in many instances its forerunner is a simple cold, an attack of influenza, or some other respiratory infection.

"A cold or any other infection of the breathing passage which makes one constitutionally weak, especially if it is accompanied by fever, demands the immediate attention of the family physician. To self treat and fight on ones feet a condition of this kind is to endanger life unnecessarily. It is advisable to take all possible steps to avoid respiratory illnesses since they so frequently lead to that dangerous complication-pneumo-

ON CHANGING LICENSE PLATES

New Jersey motorists will soon get permanent automobile license plates, with annual date insert tags, thus eliminating the annual changing of automobile licenses.

There will be no change in figures and the plates are expected to last at least five years. They are replaceable without cost after three years. The new system is expected to save the State \$100,000 a year in stee! and mechanical operations.

The new license system saves motorists time and effort, saves the State considerable money and saves the nation scarce metal.

It is surprising this system has not been adopted in more states. Unless someone can produce disadvantages to outweigh the obvious advantages, it is probable that the new licensing system will eventually replace the annual issuance of automobile license





These tempting small cakes, swirled with fluffy frosting and garnished with walnut halves, are convenient to serve large groups at a tea or coffee hour.

When it's cold outside you can make the kitchen cozy by baking breads and cakes or pies for the family supper. Cupcakes offer a nice change for dessert, and they can be made from your favorite cake batter or the quick-mix two-egg cake recipe given here.

Since economical enriched flour is the main ingredient, cupcakes are an ideal choice for family dessert, or as refreshments for a club

or church group. Cost of the unfrosted cakes is only 1½ cents apiece.

If you prefer to buy cupcakes, bakers usually have them, and often with a variety of frostings—lemon, vanilla, butterscotch, strawberry and chocolate. Like the home product, these cupcakes made with enriched flour contribute protein, B-vitamins and food iron to make a nutritious dessert.

Cupcakes wrapped in wax paper make good treats to complete a sandwich and fruit lunchbox meal.

SHRUBS CAN **BEAT DROUTH**

Although most of Texas has remained dry for the past two years some shrubs including evergreens continue to be grown in all areas. Sadie Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, explains that some native shrubs like chamiza and creosote bush can be expected to live with as little as ten to 12 inches of rainfall during the year. Many more can be grown in areas of 15 to 18 inches rainfall.

For Southwest Texas, the agrite, sometimes called algerita, is suitable. It is a hardy evergreen parberry. Bird-of-paradise, known by its yellow and red flowers with long stamens, thrives in this area, also. Purple dalea, Apache plume, Texas persimmon or black persimmon, rock bush or thornless catclaw, Chinese and Burford varieties of holly, and many kinds of privets grow successfully in the southwest. Wild lippia, nandina, evergreen sumac, desert yaupon and many kinds of yuccas are others requiring little water. Adapted to the Lower Ric

Grande Valley are the wild olive or cordia, poinsettia, lantana, ceniza, dwarf and large pomgranate, native tecoma or golden shower, bush morning glory and vitex, sometimes called pepper tree or lavendar tree. Guayacan or soap bush is a valuable native evergreen.

For the Panhandle and Plains area, Miss Hatfield lists amorpha or dwarf indigo, anisacanth or cigarette bush, bridal wreath or 15 to 18 inches of rain per year. used as a perennial flower—that is, it is killed to the ground during severe cold but comes back and blooms the next summer.


