EDITOR'S NOTE:—We present below the first of a series of weekly articles by Mrs. Frances B. Stanton, who is the new home demonstration agent for Wheeler County, Mrs. Stanton assumed her duties in Wheeler County on Monday, November 26. She came to Wheeler from her home at Avery. Her husband, G. B. Stanton, is an engineer and is employed by a seismograph crew which has headquarters at Houston. He is presently working in Louisiana.

During the school year 1950-51, Mrs. Stanton taught homemaking in the Tatum, N. M., school system and prior to that she had done home demonstration agent work in Arkansas and taught homemaking at various other points.

Mrs. Stanton took her bachelor of science degree from East Texas State College, and has attended Texas Tech and North Texas State College.

### HOME DEMONSTRATION NEWS

Now that we are nearing the Christmas Holiday Season, maybe you will need recipes, ideas for entertaining, or suggestions for decorating. Let your needs be known and we'll see what can be done.

For that festive occasion ahead, serve Egg Nog!

(Recipe)  
6 eggs, separated  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2/3 cup sugar  
3/4 cups evaporated milk  
3/4 cups water  
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract  
Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add salt and sugar and stir until well dissolved. Add milk, water and vanilla and stir to mix well. Chill. Before serving, beat egg whites only until they stand in soft peaks. Fold into the chilled egg-milk mixture. Pour into punch cups or glasses. Sprinkle with nutmeg if desired. Makes 2 quarts or 16 one-half cup servings. Accompany with a plate of Christmas Cookies.

### County Agent's Office

This is tree planting time in Wheeler County; whether it be fruit trees or wind breaks. Any one who is interested can order seedlings to be used in wind-breaks from the county agent's office and this should be done now or as soon as possible to insure early delivery. The following varieties of seedlings can be ordered for this county: Arizona cypress, Chinese elm, cottonwood, osage orange, red cedar, Russian mulberry, sycamore, thornless honeylocust, and parvifolia elm. These trees are grown by the Texas Forestry Service and cost \$1.00 per 100 trees. The money for the trees must be included with the order.

There are still a few pounds of warfarin rat bait in the county agent's office and you, who haven't killed those rats and mice on your farm can get it here as long as it lasts. Over 75 farmers used this bait during the rat eradication drive in November.

Order your grass seed now if you intend to plant grass next spring because it may be scarce and it may also be higher in price. Be sure to get the percentage germination and percent of purity of all seed that you buy if you intend to get PMA payments on them.

**Editorial**

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 7, 1941

On a peaceful Sunday afternoon, just ten years ago, on the seventh of December, war came to the United States, after twenty-three years of peace. Today, only six years after the close of the most recent World War, the country is again threatened with world war.

It is painful realization for those who fought in the last war and the loved ones of those who were lost in that war, but the question today is the same as it was in 1941—that of freedom or dictatorship. The American people have never yet failed to rally against a threat of dictatorship at home or abroad. Thus, it is that Christmas, 1951, finds the country rearming in great haste,

building the strength of its armed forces back to millions.

Those of us who remember the dark days after December 7, 1941, can only hope that America's preparedness program, now in progress, will head off another world war. Had the United States been prepared in the Pacific in 1941, it is quite probable that the Japanese would not have ordered the treacherous attack on Pearl Harbor.

On the anniversary of the beginning of the last war, this year, we should earnestly pray that the lesson of 1941 has not been forgotten, nor learned in vain, and that we will be successful in our efforts to prevent another war, by making our country strong enough to discourage aggression from any quarter.

**THE 45TH T. B. OFFENSIVE**

One of the greatest humanitarian efforts in this country is the annual sale of Christmas seals, the proceeds from which go into the fight against tuberculosis. The forty-fifth annual Christmas seal sale is now underway and the Red Cross of Wheeler County again asks you to contribute to the fight against this dreaded disease—for which no preventive, nor positive cure, has yet been found.

Just recently, the announcement by the March of Dimes Foundation that a vaccine to prevent infantile paralysis was on the verge of discovery showed clearly what an organized effort against disease can accomplish. Eventually, the effort of the people of this country will produce a successful answer to tuberculosis in all its forms.

In the meantime, your contribution will make you an active worker in this great cause and speed the day when an effective answer to the disease will be found. No other time of the year is more appropriate to contribute to such a cause than during the Christmas season. The Wheeler Times urges its readers to buy Christmas seals.

Both of them attended country schools in Palo Pinto county. "The year I was 13, I went to school in Mineral Wells," said Mr. Bailey. "There was no danger of athletic scandals in our schools, those days," he continued. "We didn't have much time for games. We were too busy learning the three R's. Most schools were in session only about three months."

November 3, 1901, the couple were married at the bride's home in a quiet ceremony. "Judge Pitts of Amarillo was one of the guests," said Mr. Bailey. "He said it was the first wedding he had ever attended."

Five of the Baileys' six children were born while they lived in Palo Pinto. "We lived on the banks of the Brazos River," recalled Mrs. Bailey. "I remember when I had three children, I crossed the river

The Baileys are good neighbors. They are both active in community and church work. They have been members of the Methodist church since soon after their marriage. Mr. Bailey raises a garden and flowers and enjoys his leisure time reading and listening to the radio. Mrs. Bailey, who is an accomplished seamstress, makes fine needlework her hobby. When interviewed, she was working on a costume for a wedding in Louisiana.

Mr. and Mrs. Bailey reared six children. One daughter, Laura Belle, died when she was a senior in Miami High School. The others are: Robert, who is shop foreman for Plains Chevrolet, Amarillo; Grady, owner of Conoco Service Station, Miami; Luke, with Baer Motor Company, Dumas; Mrs. Dee Cordell of Johnson, Kansas, and Miss Virginia Bailey, bookkeeper for Buck's Sporting Goods Co., Amarillo. They also have 12 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. All of them were present for the anniversary except one grandson, Cpl. Harvey Lee Bailey, who is serving with the U. S. ## YOUTH'S ACNE PROBLEMS EASED



As high as 85 per cent of all young people suffer from the pimples and blackheads which medical experts call acne. To teenagers such as those pictured above, the unsightly complexion produced by the disease is often a serious social and vocational handicap.

Acne can now be successfully treated with terramycin, other antibiotics, sulfa drugs and female sex hormones, according to a report by a team of doctors at Columbia University's College of Physicians and Surgeons.

In a two-year test on 384 patients, the physicians found that those remedies cured or improved 94 per cent and were 50 per cent more effective than the older, widely used X-ray treatment.

Although hormone therapy is common for acne cases, the report says "on the whole the chief treatment is by administration of terramycin, aureomycin, chloromycetin or sulfonamides and removal of focal infection." The use of terramycin has been "especially beneficial and well tolerated," the report concludes, citing a seriously disfiguring case of 15 years duration that terramycin "cured beautifully and promptly."
