WEATHER FORECASTS

In predicting the weather there are as many as fifty variables, including temperature, humidity, barometric pressure, direction and velocity of the wind, gravity, mountain barrier, etc., which must be considered.

It is, of course, impossible for weather men to make the utmost use of all of these variables in the time allotted to them to formulate and record forecasts. As a matter of fact, if all the weather variables were properly considered, a crew of mathematicians would be kept busy for many days and by the time they came to a conclusion, it would no longer be a forecast.

For years we have needed a machine that will take no longer than a quarter of an hour to form all of the calculations on which curate prediction of the weather can be Study at Princeton has at last developed of the best traditions of the naval service.
