## Reeds Celebrate 50th Anniversary

A number of relatives and friends gathered at the J. R. Reed home on Highway 83 in the south part of Wheeler Sunday, March 23, to help them celebrate their fiftieth wedding anniversary. Mr. and Mrs. Reed were the recipients of several nice gifts including a chrome dinette set presented to them by their children.

John Ruben Reed and Parilee Choate were united in marriage March 23, 1902 at her old home place four miles south of Berlin, Okla. in Beckham County. They were married by Brother Fulton, a Methodist Circuit Rider. Their first home was a half-dugout with a tar paper roof and a dirt floor located at the north end of the Meridian Lakes in Roger Mills County, Okla. Five of their seven children were born while they were living in a dugout. Later they moved into a small house at the south end of the Meridian Lakes. The other two children were born after they moved to their place on Timber Creek in Beckham County, Okla. They lived there until 1922 when they bought the Ed Pior Ranch located 7 miles east and 4 miles north of Wheeler which they still own, although they retired in 1946 and moved to Wheeler where they bought them a home.

The following article was written by Mr. Reed at the time of his sale in January of 1947 after he had retired and moved to Wheeler in December of 1946. This article better describes some of their trials than anything one could write:

"Forty-four years ago me and my wife and the Lord and Claude Taylor of Elk City, started in business together. I had two \$30 ponies, a set of chain harness and a borrowed wagon. I filed on 148 acres of white sand near the Meridian lakes that no one else would have. It was a hard place to live. I worked hard and lived hard, but I got acquainted with Mr. Taylor and his father, Uncle Alf, as fine an old man as I ever met. I don't know why, but they seemed to want to help me and I needed help. I will never forget one day I went into the bank and was talking to Claude. You know how a man feels when he is down and out and Claude said, 'John, we have the money and any time you need it if you don't use it, it is your own fault. Just check on me anytime you think it is best.' Oh! how I felt! I said, 'If it is the Lord's will, I will make a go of it yet.' And He helped me out of lots of hard places and is still helping me and I still thank Him for it all I will never get Claude Taylor and Uncle Alf paid back for what they did for me and my wife. It was hard times. There is lots of people here that know what I am talking about and how I started. My father always said, 'Where there is a will, there is a way.' And I had the will and I found the way. I don't want you folks to think that I am boasting for I am not. I always said if money made a fool out of me, I hoped I would never get a dollar ahead and I am still in that notion. But I do want to say that the first good horses and good white faced cows have paid the bills and put

## GRASS JUDGING CONTEST TO BE HELD HERE

There will be a grass and crops judging contest in the Wheeler High School Cafeteria in Wheeler, beginning at 1:00 o'clock the afternoon of April 18.

The grass judging contest will consist of 48 grasses which is the same list that will be used at a contest later at Lubbock.

The crops judging will follow regular FFA rules except that grading of samples will be left out due to a shortage of grading handbooks.

The following teams will be invited to bring grass and crops to this contest: Wheeler County 4-H; Wheeler FFA; Mobeettie FFA; Shamrock FFA; Samnorwood FFA; Collingsworth County FFA; Collingsworth County 4-H; Wellington FFA; Gray County 4-H; McLean FFA; Canadian FFA; Pampa FFA; Groom FFA; and Panhandle FFA.

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau will sponsor this contest and the contest will be carried out under the direction of Ray D. Siegmund, Wheeler County Agricultural Agent; I. Q. Sewell, Wheeler Vocational Agriculture teacher and D. J. Johnson, Wheeler SCS Work Unit Conservationist.

There will be banners awarded to the three high teams and ribbons to the high five individuals in each contest.

## JIM CROW IS CANDIDATE FOR SENATE SEAT

CANADIAN, April 2—SPL.—Youthful Canadian attorney James D. (Jim) Crow, a newcomer to politics, formally tossed his hat in the ring this week to challenge veteran legislator Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo for his seat in the Texas State Senate.

Hazlewood, seeking his fourth elective term as State Senator from the 31st district, had announced his candidacy for reelection last week. He was first elected to the Senate in 1940.

Crow, a native of Canadian and son of pioneer Panhandle attorney Will Crow of this city, is a 27-year old veteran of World War II service with the U. S. Navy.

He attended Canadian public schools and was a student for two years at Texas A & M College before shifting to the University of Texas Law School, where he received his law degree in 1950. He has been associated with his father in the practice of law in Canadian since that time.

Crow announced this week that he would start immediately on a county-by-county tour of the district.

"I expect to meet every person in the district between now and election time," he said.

The 31st district, reorganized last year under the new legislative re-districting act, now contains 16 counties... 10 less than in previous years. Now in the district are the top three rows of Panhandle counties, plus Randall County... Hazlewood's home county.

## HARMON TO BE KELTON SUPT.

A representative of the Kelton School Board announced this week that it had employed Charles C. Harmon as superintendent for the 1952-53 school term. He will succeed John L. Wilmoth, who recently announced his resignation from the post to be effective July 1, 1952.

Mr. Harmon and his wife, the former Miss Bonnie Adams of this city, have both been teaching in the Kelton school during the current term. Preceding his employment at Kelton, Harmon was principal of grade school at Hart for one year. He holds a B. S. Degree from the University of Texas and is doing Master's work at that institution through the summers now.

Both Mr. Harmon and his wife are graduates of Wheeler High School and Mrs. Harmon taught home economics here for three years. He served in the armed forces of the United States from 1941 through 1945. They have three children.

There will be a Wheeler-Collingsworth Dairy Day in Shamrock at the Community Building on Saturday, April 5. The entries will be in place at 9:30 in the morning and will be released at 4:30 that afternoon.

This will be a classification show with all animals receiving ribbons according to how they classify. All breeds are eligible to enter and they need not be registered.

This show will give you a chance to see how your dairy animals rate with a purple ribbon going to animals that score 90 points or above; a blue ribbon to animals scoring 85-90 points; a red ribbon to animals with a score of 80-85 points; white ribbon to animals scoring between 75-80 points; and a yellow ribbon to animals scoring 70-75 points. The highest scoring male and female of each breed will get a purple rosette.

The following classes will be placed:

- Bulls:**
- (1) 6 months and under 1 year of age.
  - (2) 1 year and under 2 years.
  - (3) 2 years old and older.
  - (4) Breed winners.
- Females:**
- (1) 6 months and under one year.
  - (2) 1 year and under 2 years, none in milk.
  - (3) 2 years and under 3, also yearlings in milk.
  - (4) 3 years and over.
  - (5) Breed winners.
  - (6) Get of sire: 3 daughters of sire, any age. Sire need not be shown.
  - (7) Produce of dam: Two daughters. Dam need not be shown.

This show will be limited to entries from Wheeler and Collingsworth counties and no entry blanks need be sent in. They will be entered as they are brought in.

There will also be a series of judging contests during this day. 4-H clubs from Wheeler and Collingsworth counties will compete in a contest and F.F.A. teams will also hold an F.F.A. dairy contest. There will also be a senior and junior dairy contest where anyone who wants to enter can do so. So, all you men and women can compete for prize money and ribbons as the prizes will be \$10.00 for 1st; \$7.50 for 2nd; and \$5.00 for 3rd place. The same will hold true for the junior individual judging contests. The teams in 4-H and F.F.A. will receive banners and high three individuals will get ribbons.

**Editorial**

**WEATHER FORECASTS**

In predicting the weather there are as many as fifty variables, including temperature, humidity, barometric pressure, direction and velocity of the wind, gravity, mountain barrier, etc., which must be considered.

It is, of course, impossible for weather men to make the utmost use of all of these variables in the time allotted to them to formulate and record forecasts. As a matter of fact, if all the weather variables were properly considered, a crew of mathematicians would be kept busy for many days and by the time they came to a conclusion, it would no longer be a forecast.

For years we have needed a machine that will take no longer than a quarter of an hour to form all of the calculations on which an accurate prediction of the weather can be based each hour. The Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton has at last developed

such a machine. It is an electronic computer. We are now awaiting the day when such a machine will provide us with electronic forecasts in this area.

**HOT-STUFF PREDICTIONS**

One of the nation's better magazines, for those interested in current events, reported in a recent issue that a truce in Korea was a faded prospect.

This fine magazine then predicted that the war would drag on. In the very next issue of the same magazine, in the same feature, the prediction was that a truce, once again, was a reviving prospect.

This item is just one of many encountered when a publication attempts to look ahead, with printed thoughts and predictions. While this is no reflection on this outstanding magazine, necessarily, it does prove that those always seeking a positive statement or result, or trying to forecast one, often go astray. Despite all the columnists and magazines, and their attempts to look into the future for the reader, the reader will be wise to accept only facts on what has already happened and not predictions of what is to happen.

It is an old custom in the United States that the experts fight out the wars before the soldiers actually come into contact. This, in itself, is a difficult enough task, not to mention the job of forecasting the outcome of truce negotiations before the negotiators have completed their discussions. While there is nothing wrong with the latter process, a lot of time can be wasted in coming to two or three conclusions, and reversals, before the outcome of the event is actually clear.

**CANCER LOSES**

Lieutenant-Commander Edwin M. Rosenberg, skipper of the Destroyer Escort U. S. S. J. Douglas Blackwood, was retired from the Navy in 1947, suffering with cancer and given only two weeks to live by his doctors.

The Naval officer, however, disagreed that his naval career had ended and that cancer had the upperhand in his personal fight with that disease and has now won a victory on each count. On March 7th Commander Rosenberg put into Annapolis Roads as the skipper of the U. S. S. J. Douglas Blackwood, the same vessel he had commanded in 1947. The Blackwood, like Commander Rosenberg, had been retired by the Navy and brought out of mothballs only recently.

After a long struggle, Congress restored Commander Rosenberg to full active duty in 1950, after he had fully recovered from cancer, and the Blackwood was recommissioned on February 5th of this year. Thus, after two uphill fights, the skipper returns to his ship, and gives fellow officers a lesson in determination and perseverance worthy of the best traditions of the naval service.

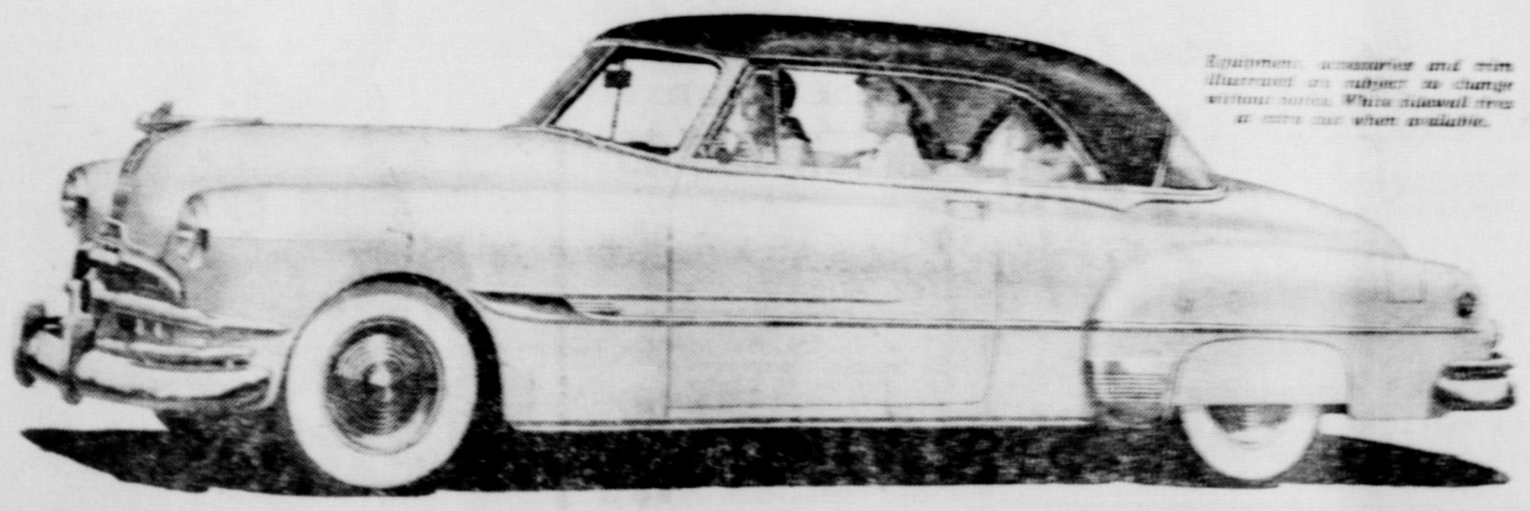

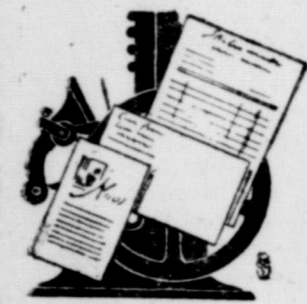

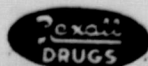
