



## Editorial

#### FARMING BY PLANE

Farming on the country's larger farms is being increasingly conducted from airplanes, according to science sources. Aircraft are being used to seed large pasture areas, rice fields and other cropland. Planes are also used to spray early growth to protect it from destructive insects and diseases.

Aerial farming is now a big business in



One of the stimulants in the aerial farming industry has been the decrease in available labor. In rough and wet areas, where ground operations are difficult, aerial seeding has been particularly successful. During the winter of 1948, large areas of forests, which had been burned over the preceding fall, wre reseeded from the air. White pine seed was mixed with sawdust and the opperation was carried out while snow was still on the ground.

According to the Forest Service, germination was satisfactory and these white ines are now four years old. Other proregions. In the Northeastern States, during Ladies the summer of 1949, millions of acres of forests were sprayed in an effort to elimi- Mid-Week Servicesnate the destructive gypsy moth. The effectiveness of this method is the best hope for practical control of several such pests, according to entomologists of the U.S. Departage, which gives American farmers a new outlook on old farming problems.

#### AN IMMIGRANT'S STORY

Leon Jolson, who came to this country from Poland in 1947, penniless, was recently sworn in as an American citizen, in New York City. In being sworn in, he presented a check for \$10,000 to a representative of Columbia University for the establishment of two two-year fellowships at the Teachers College at the University.

Jolson, who is thirty-eight years old, came to this country with his wife in February, 1947, and still carries a tattooed number on his left arm-a mark which tells of three years in a Nazi concentration camp. He learnset up a sales agency for the sale of an Italian machine.

His concern expects to gross \$10,000,000 on the sale of the machines this year, so that Jolsen is well able to donate the \$10,000 to Columbia University.

The moral in this story seems to be obvious. Penniless, unable to speak English and thirty-three years of age, this Polish immigrant, nevertheless, learned English, began a business and built it to \$10,000,000 organization in about four years. The United States is still the land of opportunity, despite the utterances of some citizens.
