## WHEELER NINE WINS FIRST GAME OF YEAR

The Wheeler baseball team of the Salt-Fork League won its opening contest of the season last Sunday when it took a non-league victory from a team from Perryton by a score of 11 to 2. The contest was played on the Wheeler American Legion Field.

The Wheeler nine scored three runs in the first, four in the third, one in the fourth and three in the fifth while the Perryton lads picked up a single run in each of the fourth and ninth innings.

In the first inning, with one man down, Richard Gaines walked, J. Tallant got a double to score Gaines, Chester Bowles walked, Red Richerson struck out, Bud Vanpool was safe on an error which allowed Tallant to score and Adrian Risner was safe on another error to allow Bowles to score and Dick Pendleton rolled out second to first to end the inning.

Tallant, first up in the third inning, was safe on an error, Bowles advanced him with a single, Richerson drove them home with a double, James Gaines rolled out third to first, Risner was safe on an error, Pendleton struck out, Bus Dorman got single to score Richerson and Risner and Burton popped out to the first baseman to end the inning.

Richard Gaines grounded out short to first to open the fourth inning, Tallant was safe on an error, Bowles singled to advance but was out on Richerson's grounder and Richerson was safe on a fielder's choice, then James Gaines singled to score Tallant and Risner ended the inning by striking out Pettit led off the fifth inning for the local nine by striking out, Addie Wheeler chunker, singled, P. E. Burton singled, Gaines walked to load the bases, Tallant was safe on an error and two or three runs scored, Bowles walked Tallant was out trying to steal third, Richerson struck out to end the inning and the scoring for the Wheeler club.

The Wheeler nine committed three errors while their opponents were guilty of six miscues.

The Wheeler and Briscoe team open play in the Salt-Fork League with a contest at Briscoe Sunday afternoon beginning at 3:00 p.m. Mobeetie and Quail meet at Quail Sunday at the same time in the other game in the league.

## MITCHELL RITES HELD SATURDAY

Funeral services for Frank Ivy Mitchell, who died last Thursday afternoon at 4:30 as a result of a car-train crash near Skellytown early Thursday morning, were held at the First Baptist Church here last Saturday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock with Rev. M. B. Smith, pastor, officiating.

Mitchell, who was 24 years old at the time of his death, was born in Goodlet and had lived with the family west of Wheeler for approximately 12 years, except for the time he spent in the Armed Forces.

He died Thursday afternoon about 15 hours after the car in which he was riding crashed into a train at a railroad crossing near Skellytown. The crash occurred shortly after 1 a.m.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. C. D. Mitchell, Wheeler; six brothers, W. D., Vernon and Joe, all of Wheeler, C. C. of Springer, N. M., Charlie of Amarillo and Jack who is in the armed forces stationed at El Paso; two sisters, Mrs. R. H. Hornsby of Wheeler, and Barbara Mitchell of Wheeler. Mitchell's father, C. D. Mitchell, died in a Pampa hospital April 11.

## 30 CANDIDATES FILES WITH CO. CHAIRMAN

Speculation over who will run for what elective offices in the forthcoming July Democratic primary ended Tuesday with announcement by County Democratic Chairman A. B. Crump of Wheeler of complete filings for precinct, county and district offices.

Two new candidates for county commissioner in precinct 4 (Shamrock) barely got under the wire. Filing closed at midnight Monday. The new commissioner candidates are: W. J. Gillis and R. A. (Jack) Nichols, Sr., both of Shamrock. Harold W. Turner of Twitty had previously filed against Loran L. See of Shamrock, seeking a second term.

Sam McMurry, seeking reelection as Commissioner to a second term in precinct 3, West of Shamrock, was the only county commissioner who failed to draw an opponent.

There are three candidates in commissioners precinct 2, W. E. Mason, Floyd Morris and H. H. Walser, while there are two in precinct 1, W. L. Erwin, seeking a second term, and T. A. Treadwell.

There were no late filings in the county judge's race. Four had already filed, Glenn King, D. A. Hunt, Marvin Shelburne and H. S. Sims.

Seven county officials did not draw an opponent: Sheriff Bus Dorman, County Clerk Harry Wofford, County Attorney Homer Moss, District Clerk Harold D. Callan, Tax Assessor-Collector Thurman Rives, Treasurer Palmer Sivage and Surveyor A. C. Wood.

There are two candidates each for justice of peace and constable in precincts 3-4 (Shamrock); J. H. Templeton and Harry H. Hurt for justice, and E. T. Hollibaugh and John Cox for constable.

Justice of Peace A. C. Wood of Wheeler did not draw an opponent.

A. B. Crump, Democratic county chairman, is also without opposition.

In district races there is no opponent for Congressman Walter Rogers, State Representative Grainger McIlhenny, or District Attorney Tom Braly.

State Senator Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo is opposed by James D. Crow of Hemphill County.

Survivors include the husband, R. A. Lile of Wheeler; one son, Glen Lile of Shamrock; three grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. J. Terril of Tallent, Oregon, and Mrs. James R. Day of San Francisco, Calif.; and two brothers, Wayland Smith of Tallent, Oregon, and Fulton Smith of Portland, Oregon.

Reports received here today (Thursday) are that he went through an examination for the designated signs of the dreaded disease and results show that he is not a victim of it but is in a serious stage of rheumatic fever. Roy was confined to the Plainview Hospital for a few days for further observation and attention.

## Democrats Send Delegates To Meet Uninstructed

### D. O. BEENE IS DELEGATE TO GOP CONCLAVE

Wheeler county Republicans in convention at Wheeler Tuesday unanimously endorsed the candidacy of Robert Taft and named Chairman D. O. Beene of Wheeler as county delegate to the state convention in Mineral Wells, May 27.

Although officially Delegate Beene is listed as "uninstructed," he was the unanimous choice of the 9 voting delegates after he had pointed with pride to a Taft button he was wearing and announced he was a supporter of the Ohio Senator.

Later in the proceedings delegates favoring Taft were asked to raise their right hands and all 11 delegates and alternates raised their hands, some of them both hands to emphasize their enthusiasm.

Wheeler county is entitled to one vote at the state convention. The election of County Chairman Beene as permanent convention chairman and later as delegate to the state convention was the principal business of the county gathering after the credentials of precinct delegates had been examined and accepted. Ruthele Bacon of Amarillo was named alternate to the state meeting at the suggestion of Chairman Beene.

Election of the state delegate followed by endorsement of Senator Taft's candidacy for president, occupied less than 10 minutes, after which the convention chairman announced the floor was open for discussion of any aspects of party affairs.

"This is a Republican convention but it is also a Democratic one and I want you to feel free to express yourselves," declared Chairman Beene. And the delegates did. First one and then another gave testimony why he thought Senator Taft should be given the nomination. His courage, his unquestioned honesty, his long experience in government, and his known views on national and international issues, were all cited. No other candidate was mentioned by name until Chairman Beene let the boom down on "Glamour Boy" Eisenhower, and then everybody turned their guns on Ike.

With one exception, all delegates expressed strong dislike for the General, and this delegate seemed to enjoy the verbal barrage of "fair deal, new deal sympathizer," and "internationalist" hurled at the man who is giving "Mr. Republican" a run for his money in state conventions held thus far and leading him in public opinion surveys.

It was the consensus of the Wheeler county G.O.P.'ers that Ike is taking unfair advantage of Taft in "evading" a public stand on controversial issues. They feel if and when he does, his popularity will nose dive. They expressed the belief Democratic influence is sparking Ike's popularity for the sole purpose of getting him nominated.

**Editorial**  
**MORE PROGRESS VS. DISEASE**

Recent discoveries concerning cures for cancer, tuberculosis and other diseases bring promise of a new age in medicine to this generation. A rare African nerve virus has been used to treat deep internal cancers in twenty-six patients, and at least four of the victims who could not be benefited by any other form of treatment, showed progress.

It is true that the patients were only temporarily benefited since they developed an immunity to the germs and could not be reinfected for additional treatment. Nevertheless, the test indicates that viruses can be "trained" to eat cancerous tissue without harming normal tissues. There is as yet no proof that a virus curative will be found, but the test results so far have spurred additional research.

Other significant progress in the fight against cancer has been made within the last three months and, in the last month, it has been discovered that the beginning of infantile paralysis can be located in the bloodstream. This discovery is ranked as a major forward step in the fight on polio. In addition to these discoveries, the prospect has recently been raised that the battle against tuberculosis is on the verge of being won. The new drug being used in this fight has obtained spectacular results so far, although tests are still continuing.

While trying to avoid being over-optimistic, it is quite possible that readers will soon see the day when these three dreaded diseases: cancer, infantile paralysis and tuberculosis, will be almost completely conquered by medical science. Certainly, progress toward this goal has been satisfying, even exciting, in the last six months.

**YOU SHOULD EAT LESS**

Studies reported to the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology recently show that your dietary intake should be reduced seven and one-half percent each decade after reaching the age of twenty-five. The studies also showed that the condition of being overweight is the most widespread and devastating nutritional disorder in the United States today.

The recommendations of the National Research Council are for a 2,900-calorie intake each day for active young people. This should be reduced by seven and one-half percent each decade until reaching the age of seventy. At that age, a man should eat only seventy percent of what he ate when he was twenty-five.

Even if an adult follows this prescription, it will not guarantee that he will not gain weight. As he becomes more inactive, he may not burn the food energy he takes into his body, even though it is less than he ate as a younger person. However, if he will follow the recommendations above, he will gain weight much more slowly and enjoy a better prospect for longer life than his fellowman, who increases his consumption of food each decade, rather than decreasing it.

## NEWS FROM— County Agent's Office

Wheeler County 4-H Crops judging team won first place in the district elimination at Canyon on May 3rd. This is the first year that a crops judging team has been trained in Wheeler County and the boys did an excellent job. The boys placed samples of threshed grain sorghums, grain sorghum heads, prairie hay, peanuts, cow peas, wheat, oats, ear corn, and cotton. Winning first place means a trip to the state crops judging contest which will be held at Texas A & M College in the early part of June. Members of the Wheeler County Crops team are Troy Dean Jones, Bruce Hall, Vance Donaldson, and Bob Curlee and they all come from Allison.

Garden insects are on the march again and many requests are coming in for methods of control of the various insects. A 5% DDT dust will control almost every garden insect with the exception of aphids. For aphids use 1% rotenone or 3% nicotine or 1% lindane. To treat squash, cucumbers, cantaloupes or watermelons; use 20% Sabadilla dust or 1% pyrethrins, but do not use DDT or other chemicals as they will cause burning.

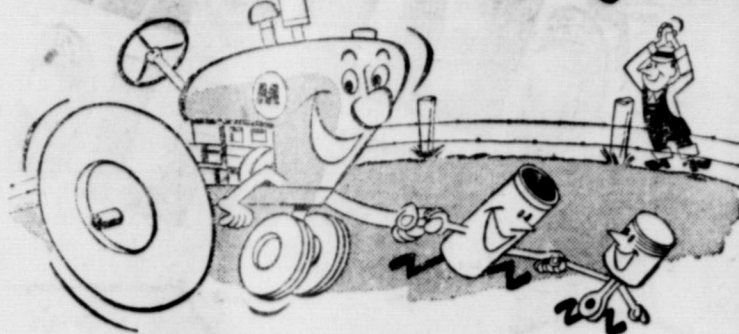

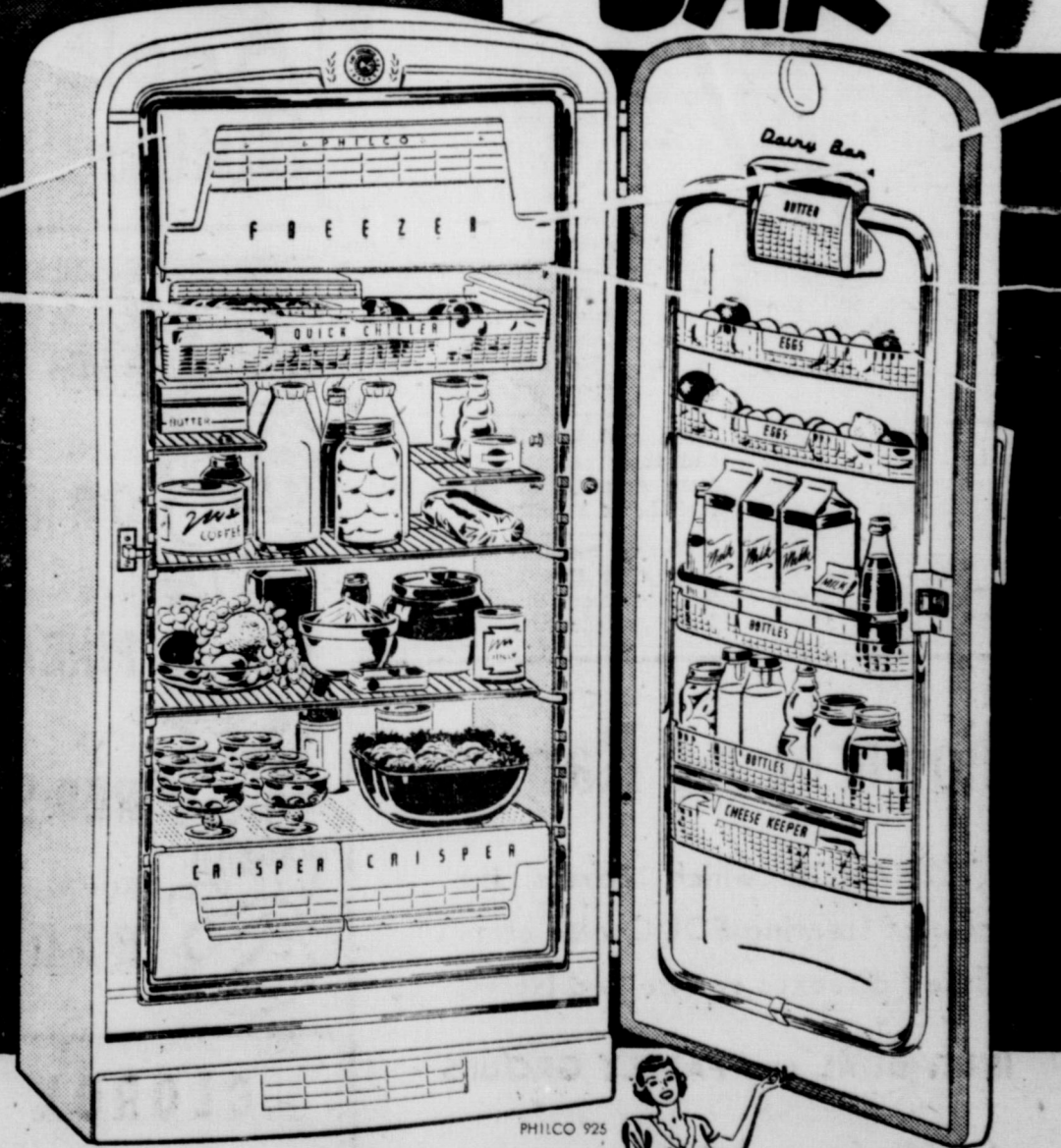

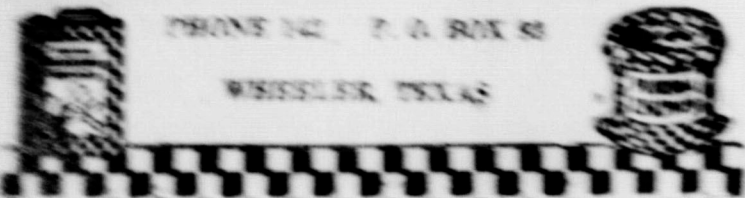

**AGRICULTURAL APPROPRIATIONS:** The House this week has passed the agricultural appropriation bill. Although there was much debate on many of the sections of this bill, the debate was never heated as it has been on the other appropriation bills. It is my opinion that the Congress as a whole realizes what agriculture means to any civilization. The committee recommendations were not cut by the House because the Appropriation Subcommittee on Agriculture did an excellent job in preparing this bill for presentation to the Congress. The budget requests were reduced by the com-

mittee, but the House did not reduce the committee recommendations. One of the primary reasons for this action, other than the fact that the Congress realizes the importance of agriculture, is the fact that since 1940 agricultural appropriations have been reduced 32 percent while at the same time the appropriations for other departments have steadily increased. I gave you these figures in a recent newsletter, but will repeat them because of their importance. Since 1940 the appropriations have increased as follows: Department of Commerce, 900 percent; Department of Interior, 183 percent; Justice Department, 264 percent; Labor Department, 100 percent; Post Office Department, 266 percent; State Department, 138 percent; Treasury Department, 74 percent.

We of course ran into arguments from the city members, but were able to offset these arguments by showing these members just how important agriculture is to the city folks. Many people do not realize that in the past 175 years the fertile soil of this nation has decreased from 500 million acres to a little more than 300 million acres, and that according to the best estimates available the top soil of fifty 40-acre farms flows down the Mississippi River each day in the year, and out to sea. Many people do not realize that by 1975, according to the present rate of increase in population, this country will have 190 million people, whereas today we have 150 million. This increase in population under present-day standards will require an additional 115 million acres of land in order to maintain the present standard of living. That time is only 23 years in the future. Also since 1940 we have been producing 20 percent more annually than theretofore. This does not mean that such increased production was the result of 20 percent more work. It means that 20 percent more has been taken from the fertility of the soil of this nation. These are just a few of the important facts that the people of the entire nation should know, because history shows us that the rise and fall of civilizations have been determined primarily by the fertility of the soil and the protection that was given the soil. We must not for-
