Editorial

THE GOVERNMENT SIDES WITH LABOR

In an election year all important decisions are flavored with politics. President Truman's decision to seize the steel mills, rather than use the Taft-Hartley Law provisions for dealing with a national emergency by the use of an injunction, is a typical example. Politics also brought on the resulting furor, by the opposition, that the President's seizure is not constitutional.

The average American citizen recognizes the importance of government being strong enough to deal effectively with either management or labor when a national emergency is involved. The government's weapon in dealing with labor is the injunction, with management it is seizure.

It is important in an emergency that our government be able to get an injunction or to seize a plant... whichever is called for by the special circumstances involved. If the government's only remedy is the injunction, management is encouraged not to bargain in good faith, realizing that a deadlock will bring labor into line thru the use of the injunction. If seizure is the only remedy that the government has in a national emergency, the workers hold out and force the government seizure.

Most students in the field of labor-management relations are opposed to compulsory arbitration. They feel that differences must be worked out at the bargaining table. Yet, if the government is limited to only one remedy in a national emergency, seizure or injunction, nothing will be accomplished at the bargaining table and government intervention will become the rule and not the exception.

The Taft-Hartley Law gives the President the right to use the injunction in dealing with a national emergency such as the threatened steel strike. It would be sounder legislation if it also gave the President the right to seize plants in a national emergency.

About two years after the passage of this controversial legislation, Sen. Taft, one of the authors, admitted that the legislation should be changed to give the President the right of seizure. Many of those who opposed the Taft-Hartley were unwilling to make changes in the law that would improve it, because they felt that this would hurt their chances to repeal the law in its entirety.

We are unable to go along with many of the political observers who feel that Truman's seizure of the steel industry will set up the greatest constitutional issue since Roosevelt's plan to pack the Supreme Court. The special significance to us is that the government has placed itself on labor's side at a time when many people are criticizing the government for its socialistic tendencies.

We are concerned over the president being set. We are fearful that the future may find political debts to labor unions or to management being paid off by the strong power vested in the government to protect the American public.

The average writer is in the same position that the average man in the street finds himself. He can only hope that the nation will not suffer too greatly by the political overtones which will affect the functioning of public officials this year.

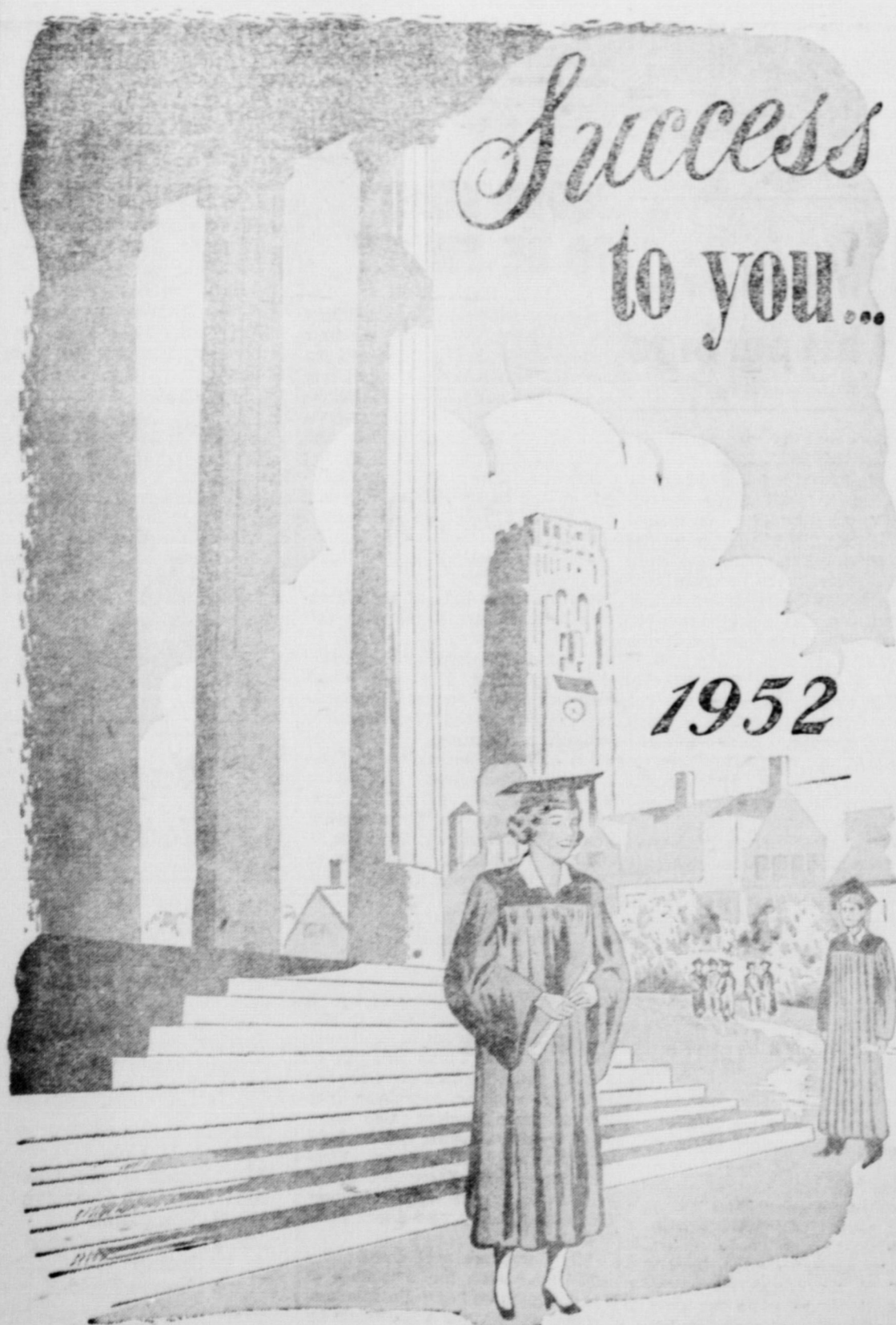

30,000 TEXANS TO DIE OF HEART DISEASE IN 1952

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox has forecast the death this year of some 30,000 Texans due to heart and blood vessel diseases. Twenty thousand will be men, and at least half the total figure—both men and women—will be less than 70 years old.

The problem of worn-out hearts, thickened blood vessels, and kidney disorders is an old one, he asserted, but said the longer length of average life isn't the whole reason for the great numbers of heart disease deaths.

To prove that point he quoted these figures: Of the 30,000 Tex-

ans that cardiovascular (heart and blood vessel) diseases will kill in 1952, about 15,000 will be less than 70 years old, 700 will be in their 30's, 2,000 will be in their 40's, 4,500 in their 50's, and at least 7,000 in the 60's.

Since 1941, the male death rate has exceeded the female rate by something like 70 percent, the health officer said. For those 75 and over the risk of death from heart disease is a fourth again as great for men as it is for women. These ever increasing deaths to heart, kidney, and blood vessel disorders have been observed for the last 30 or 40 years.

"If a statewide heart program is to develop," he declared, "it will be necessary that there be provided a professional coordinating committee that will council on program procedures and give necessary directions on essential medical services."

He credited the American Heart Association with "successfully influencing" fund appropriations, and for formulating a heart program for the nation.

It's probably true that all things come to him who waits; but we're inclined to believe that that they are likely to come too late to do any good.

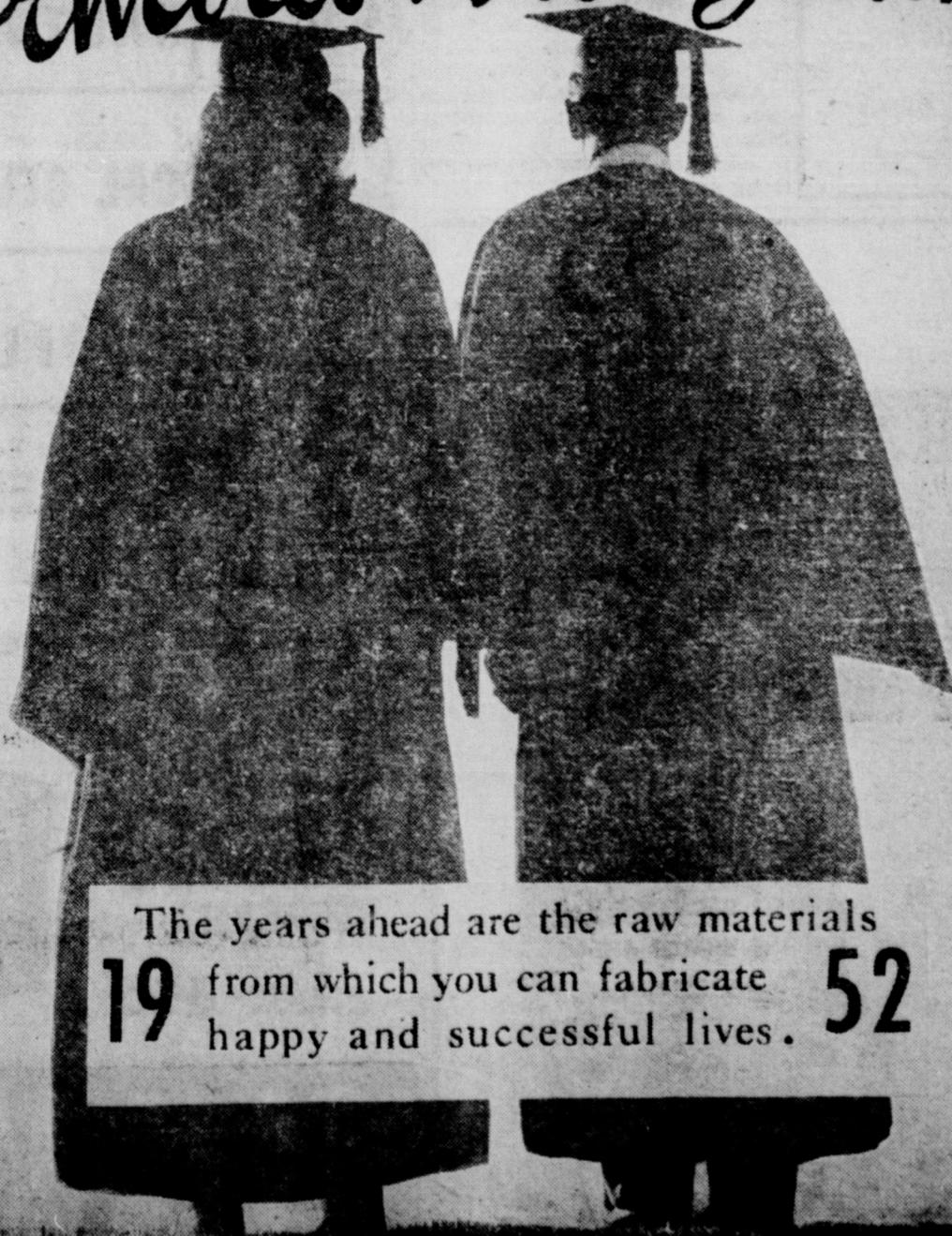

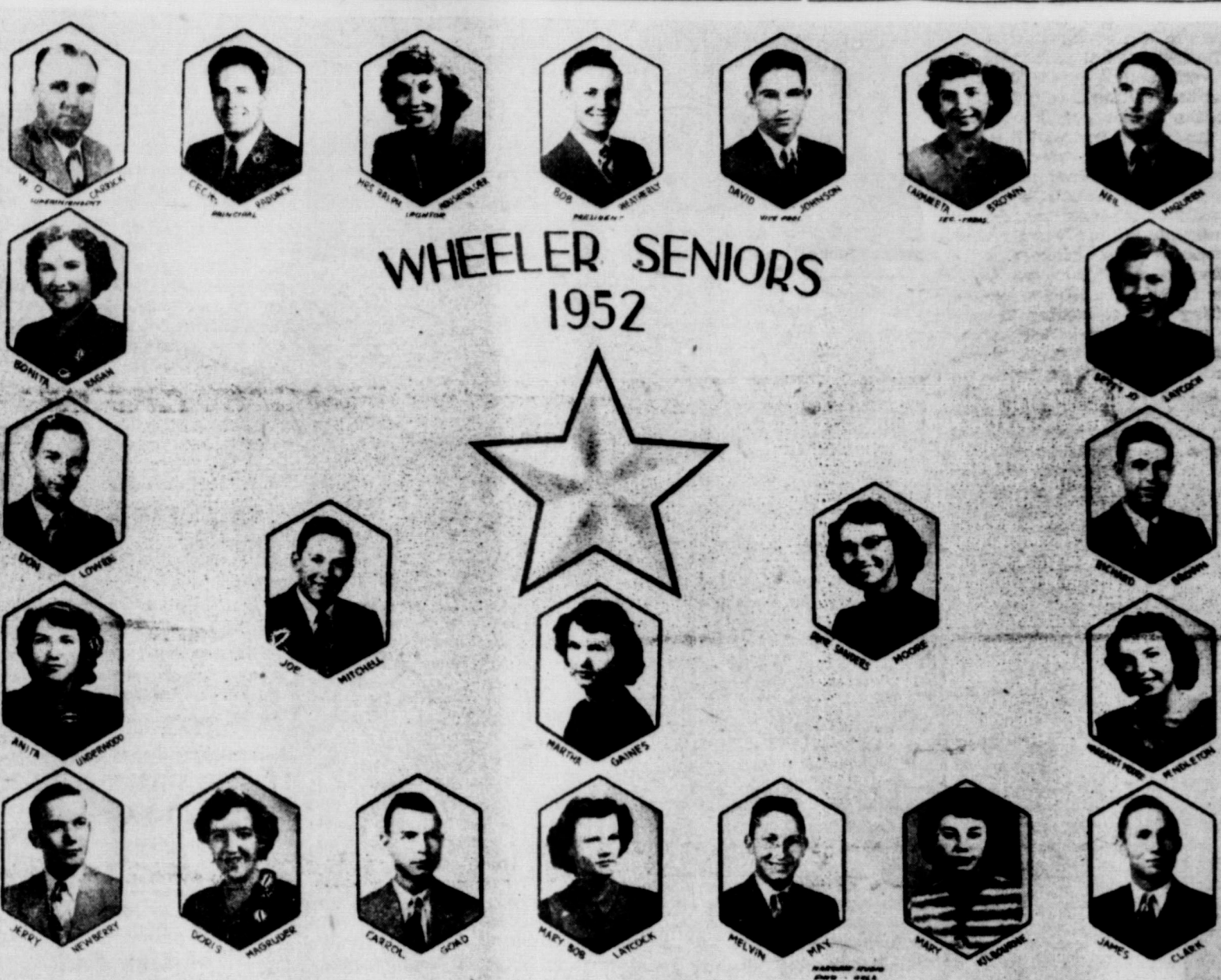

3,070 QUALIFIED VOTERS IN CO.

There are a total of 3,070 qualified voters in Wheeler county plus persons over 65 years of age who are not required to pay a poll tax, according to information compiled in the office of Thurman Rives, county tax assessor-collector.

Of the 3,070 approximately 50 exemptions went to persons reaching voting age for the first time who are not required to pay a tax.

There is no way to estimate the number of persons over 60 years old qualified to vote since it is not required that they be issued exemptions in a county of less than 10,000 population.
