If the government's only remedy is the injunction, management is encouraged not to bargain in good faith, realizing that a deadlock will oring labor into line thru the use of the inmetion. If seizure is the only remedy that e government has in a national emergency. ne workers hold out and force the govern ent seizure.

Most students in the field of labor-management relations are opposed to compulsory arbitration. They feel that differences must be worked out at the bargaining table.
