Decoration Day was first proclaimed in 1868 by the then Grand Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic. The purpose of the observance was stated in that proclamation to be an opportunity to decorate the graves of the soldiers who were killed in the Civil War.

Since 1868 the name of this particular holiday has been changed from Decoration Day to Memorial Day, and the purpose of the observance has been extended to include the decoration of the graves of all soldiers who died in the defense of their country, and the date of the observance has been adopted by almost all of the states of the United States as May 30th.

It behooves us, the living, to pause long enough to remember the dead on specific occasions; keeping in mind that all the dead have aided in some way toward making this the greatest nation on earth. During such observance our gratitude should be audibly expressed and specifically shown, not only to the dead but to the Almighty and Everliving God for His patience, His grace, and His loving kindness toward us.

Now therefore by the authority vested in me under the law, I hereby proclaim Friday, May 30th, 1952, as Memorial Day Holiday and urge the citizens of this municipality to fittingly observe the memory of our dead.

Done at Wheeler, Texas, this 29th day of May, 1952.
