**FATHER'S DAY 1952**

Forty-two years ago Mrs. John Bruce Dodd was the driving force in starting Americans to celebrate Father's Day. Since 1910 the third Sunday in June has been observed as Father's Day, although it is not usually declared a legal holiday. This year Father's Day comes on the 16th of June.

Each year on Father's Day, emphasis is placed on a closer father-child relation as a means of building a better world. In the average family in Wheeler or any other community in America, the father is away from the home during the major portion of the day. Children do not have an opportunity to become as well acquainted with their father as they do with their mother.

All of us realize how important it is to the proper development of a child to have the sympathetic guidance of "Dad." Too often fathers, weighted down with the responsibility of making a living, fail to devote enough of those precious moments to the youngsters.

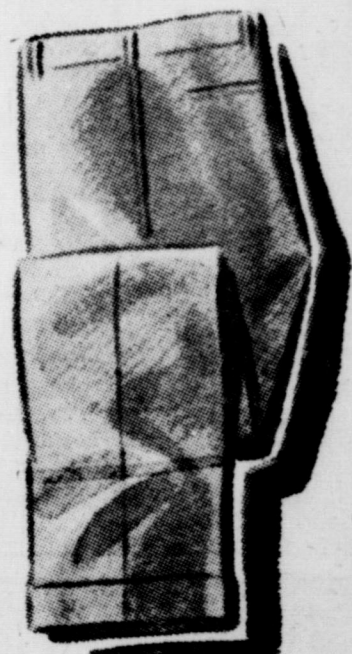

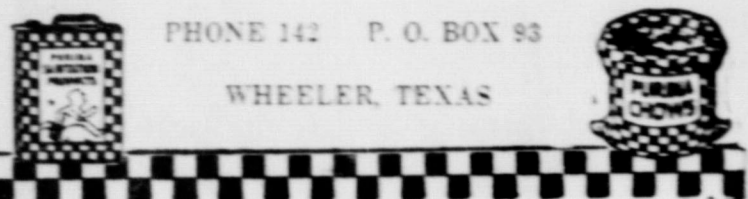

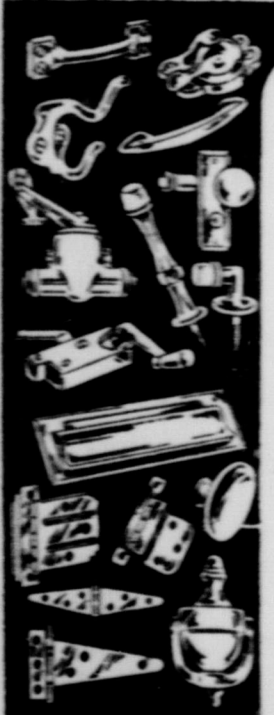

And when the time comes for the next installation of officers I'm sure they will all be as happy as I am now. Thanks for listening.

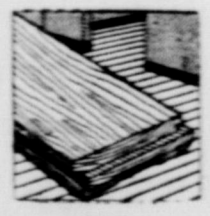

## UNDULANT FEVER IS RAGING NOW

This is the season when an increase of undulant fever may be expected, according to Dr. Geo. W. Coe, State Health Officer.

An undulant fever patient suffers from chilly sensations, or shivering, chills, sweats, and fever. The patient loses weight and becomes weak. If the fever is of mild type, the patient may find it hard to remain in bed.

but if he tries to keep on with his work he finds he has not sufficient energy.

Symptoms often continue for a number of weeks before recovery occurs. Fortunately undulant fever has a low death rate. Body temperature may reach a higher mark each day than the day before for some time, and then gradually return to normal over a period of several days. Fever may be absent for some days and come back again in the same way as before, registering higher each day and then gradually going lower. The patient's temperature chart will resemble smooth waves or undulations. The appearance of the temperature curve in typical cases has given this disease the name undulant fever.

Undulant fever is one of the infectious diseases known to be transmitted from animals to human beings. In hogs and cows, the germ produces a great economic loss because it causes contagious abortion. When this same germ invades the human body, the resulting disease is undulant fever. Prevention is dependent upon (1) eradication of the disease in farm animals, (2) careful pasteurization of dairy products, and (3) avoidance, in so far as possible, of direct contact with infected animals.

Results of the 4,746 range demonstrations conducted last year by Texas ranch operators show the importance of balancing range forage production and livestock numbers. County agents supervised the demonstrations.

That was when they decided they really didn't need the wall between them in the first place—so they simply stopped repairing it.

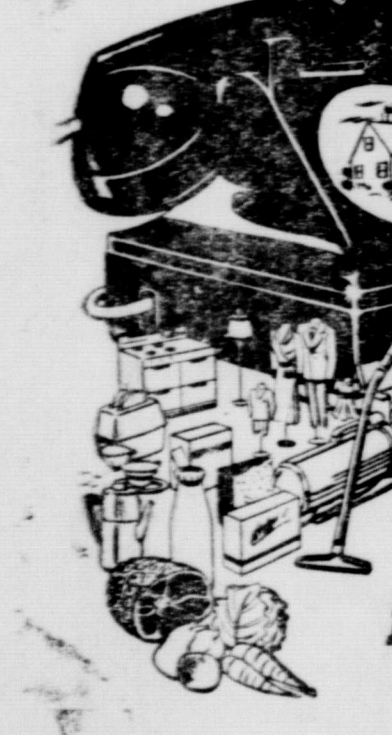
Now I hear where a fellow, who bought the old Johnson place, wants to tear all those stones. It seems he figures a stone wall is just what's needed on his property.
