VICTIM OF AIR CRASH BURIED

Full military services for Major Gail Young, grandson of Mrs. H. A. 7:00 p.m. Whitener of this city, were held at the Fairview Cemetery in Shamrock at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon, July 11. He was killed in a plane crash near Lakenheath Air Base in

England June 24, 1952. The body, accompanied by Captain Carl R. Jossy of Offutt Air Base, Omaha, Neb., arrived in Shamrock Wednesday, July 9. Major Young, who was reared in Shamrock, died in the flaming crash of a B-29, while on a routine training flight. The ten other members of the crew also perished.

Rev. James O. Todd, Shamrock Baptist pastor, was in charge of the last rites. Full military services were conducted with six majors from the Amarillo Air Force Base serving as pallbearers. The Shamrock National Guard Unit provided the color guard.

Major Young was born March 27, 1916, near Kelton. An Irish grid star, he was graduated from Shamrock High School in 1935, and attended Amarillo Junior College and Texas A. & M. College. He stopped his studies at A. & M. at midterm in 1941, and enlisted in the Army Air Corps in March of 1941. He had been in military service continuously since

to telephone the returns to him collect, and if no phone is available, a carrier will be paid for delivering The returns will be posted on a

large board in front of the court house at Wheeler as has been the custom in the past. Voters expecting to be away from the county on July 26, may go to

the county clerk's office at any time up to July 22 and cast their ballots. Or they may make application for absentee ballots to be mailed them. These ballots, properly certified, must be returned to the county clerk's office by 1 p.m. on election day, July 26.

A. B. Crump, chairman of the county Democratic executive committee, explained persons who are ill or disabled who will be unable to go to the polls on election day, may write the county clerk for a ballot. It is necessary they enclose a doctor's certificate and an affidavit of disability before a ballot

will be sent. Mr. Crump said there have been some changes in the election laws 61/2, and Eric, 3, regarding absentee voting. Absentee ballots were formerly sent by the county clerk on election day to the precinct election judge and reported along with the other returns from

> the voting precinct. The new law provides that absentee ballots shall remain in the county clerk's office and be cast and tallied by a special canvassing board. J. W. Hooker of Wheeler, has been named judge of th absentee ballot box which will be known as "Pre-

About 18 million people in the United States get checks from the federal government, and in addition to this there are about six million who get checks from state governments to which the federal government | be avenged. has contributed

Way back in 1983, there were less than two million people getting government teach people to think. checks. At that time, there were about 600 thousand civilians working for the government, there were only about 150 thousand people in the armed forces, and there were a little more than a million veterans receiving

benefits.

Today there are about four million checks going to me be the armed services, about three million to veterans, about four or five million checks being sent out as Social Security pensions, about five million relief checks to old people and dependent widows and children, about two or three million checks to farmers for following soil conservation practices.

The large number of checks sent out by the federal government has undoubtably played a significant role in each of the elections in the past sixteen years. It should be remembered that the party in power was reelected in each instance.

SWEDEN'S REWARD

The Swedish people got a taste of Rus sian gratitude recently when two Swedish Air Force planes were presumably shot down by the Russians over the Baltic Sea. The Swedes remained neutral in the last war and have attempted to remain neutral in the "cold war" between the democracies and the Communists.

They are now learning that the Com- Church School munists treat all those who are not with Worship Services them as against them, and that there is no middle ground in the worldwide struggle of M.Y.F. 




