## Republicans And Democrats To Hold Caucuses Saturday

### Here Is Line-Up

Voters of Wheeler County, Republicans and Democrats, are expected to attend precinct political conventions next Saturday in record numbers.

And the welcome mat is out. If you are a Democrat, be at your precinct voting place at 10:00 a.m., if you wish to attend the party caucus. If you are a Republican go to the voting place used by Democrats of your precinct, at 2:00 p.m. The Republicans of each precinct will go into a huddle and agree on a meeting place, adjacent to the voting place.

The Democratic caucuses are expected to be cut-and-dried affairs. The June precinct and county sessions were overwhelmingly controlled by the Governor-Shivers-led, no-party-pledge faction, and nothing has happened thus far to indicate a shift to the pro-administration "loyalist" side.

Democrats are expected to quickly and harmoniously dispense with the business of naming delegates to the county convention and adjourn.

It is at the Republican precinct conventions that fireworks are expected to explode, as an attempt is made by the so-called "Majority Rulers" faction to unseat the incumbent Taft-supporter committee.

Four Shamrock people who attended a recent instruction meeting of the "Majority Rulers" held in Amarillo are expected to lead the fight to oust present GOP committeemen, including County Chairman D. O. Beene. Announced purpose of the "Majority Rulers" is to invoke recently enunciated principles of Republican Presidential nominee Dwight Eisenhower, including an invitation to Democrats and independent voters to join with Republicans in ousting the Democratic national administration.

It is understood county leaders of the "Majority Rulers" faction are endeavoring to name precinct delegates to the forthcoming county convention. W. H. (Pedro) Dial and Lyman G. Benson of Shamrock, are identified with the movement.

County Republican Chairman Beene, appealing to party members for harmony in Saturday's precinct caucuses, issued the following statement:

"The Republican National Convention held in Chicago, during the week of July 7th, nominated its candidate for President and Vice President, after one of the most bitter and hard fought contests, that the party has had in its ranks in many years.

"General Eisenhower, sensed the importance of re-enlisting in his cause, the great body of men and women of America who had supported Senator Taft in that fight. The General knew from his long experience on the field of battle, that he could not afford to lose the active support of the loyal friends of Senator Taft, and that it was necessary that all factions and elements of the party be re-enlisted and made to feel that victory for the Republican Party this fall, depended entirely upon a united front of all factions. That is what caused General Eisenhower to go immediately after his nomination to see Senator Taft, and when he spoke to the Senator on that occasion he spoke from his heart; "Senator I will need your help." The Senator then and there assured the General that he would do whatever he was called upon to do to insure the election of the Eisenhower-Nixon team this fall. That act upon the part of the General and the Senator should be the guiding light for the remainder of us, who were partisans in the conflict.

"Unless the rank and file of the Republican voters throughout the Nation feel the same way as did the General and the Senator, the wounds of the battle will not be healed and the ranks will not be closed.

"The Republican voters of Wheeler County, should contact your Precinct Committeeman, attend the Precinct Convention, to be held at 2 o'clock P. M., July 26th, 1952, at the regular voting place in your precinct, lay aside your strife, forget the bitterness of the past campaign, close ranks and elect the Republican ticket this fall."

### HAZLEWOOD GETS BIG BOOST FROM COUNTY FRIENDS

In appreciation of his outstanding public service and of his unwavering loyalty to Wheeler County, local friends of State Senator Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo are calling on voters to give the popular state official a landslide majority in the July 26 Democratic Primary.

A young attorney from Hemphill county is opposing Hazlewood and while public opinion surveys indicate Senator Hazlewood will win reelection handsily, his Wheeler county friends are hopeful of presenting him with an "80 per cent plus" vote in the county which he has befriended so many times during his legislative career.

Hazlewood is a former president pro tem of the State Senate and acted as Lieutenant Governor during the special session of the State Legislature that corrected deplorable conditions of state insane asylums and special schools. He perhaps exceeds more influence in the Texas legislature than any other present member of the State Senate.

As co-sponsor of legislative re-districting which will give the Panhandle equal representation with other sections of the state for the first time in 30 years, Senator Hazlewood was solely responsible for keeping Wheeler County in the present 31st senatorial district which comprises most of the Panhandle. He nipped in the bud the plan at Austin to place Wheeler County in the newly created Plainview district, insisting that Wheeler County could be better served in the Amarillo district.

Collingsworth and Childress counties were placed in the Plainview district along with the entire southern tier of counties of the old 31st district but Wheeler County was permitted to remain in the Amarillo district. Wheeler County citizens felt they had more in common with the Panhandle counties than with those of the South Plains, and Hazlewood saw that the county was not touched in the re-districting.

Senator Hazlewood has repeatedly gone to bat for Wheeler County's interests in controversial state legislation and as one local friend put it, "Wheeler County couldn't be better represented if we made our Chamber of Commerce manager a member of the State Senate."

Hazlewood always goes to bat for the little man as illustrated by his introduction of legislation in behalf of Texas service stations (not the big oil companies but the small stations). (Continued on Last Page)

### Bro. Of Mrs. Guthrie Promoted To Colonel

Headquarters of the 7th Air Division has announced the promotion of Lieutenant Colonel Charles L. Wimberly of Plainview to the rank of colonel. Colonel Wimberly is the son of Mrs. Maude Wimberly and brother of Mrs. Lee Guthrie of Wheeler. He is chief of operations and training section at division headquarters in London.

The 7th Air Division command by Major General John P. McConnell, is a major subordinate unit under the Strategic Air Command. The division has the job of maintaining operational control of the Strategic Air Command units undergoing training in the United Kingdom under a rotation plan. SAC bombardment and fighter escort units sent to London for training normally serve a period of ninety days. Personnel assigned to the headquarters, however, serve a period of approximately three years. Colonel Wimberly has served two of his three years stay in England.

### WHEELER WINS, SUNDAY'S GAME TO CLOSE SERIES

The Wheeler nine of the Salt Fork Baseball League came back Sunday from a 5 to 7 defeat the previous Sunday to down the Mobetie club of the same league by a 7 to 3 score and even the play-off series at one game each for Wheeler and Mobetie. The contest was played on Wheeler's American Legion Diamond.

By mutual agreement of the two managers, Bud Vanpool of Wheeler, and Leroy Robison of Mobetie, Sunday's contest which is to be played on the local diamond beginning at 3:00 p.m. will be the last game of the play-off series. The series was originally scheduled to go to a best-three-out-of-five decision but, due to the lack of interest on the part of fans, the managers agreed to end the play-off with Sunday's game.

One of the highlights of Sunday's contest was a first inning home run by David Britt with Bill Price on base to give the locals a two-run lead which they managed to hold throughout the contest. Hendricks, third baseman for Mobetie, hit a home run for Mobetie in the seventh with the bases empty.

Wheeler added a run in the third on a two-base knock by Price and a single by Britt to lead 3 to 0 going into the fifth when Mobetie picked up a pair of runs on an error on Hendricks' ground-er, a two-base hit by Mumford and a single by D. Yeager.

Wheeler scored twice more in the seventh when Chester Bowles got on an error on his grounder and the next two men, Dorman and France, each doubled. They then scored one run each in the seventh and ninth innings. Mobetie added their third tally in the seventh on Hendricks' home run.

Jim Cain pitched for the locals, struck out nine and walked two, while Deason, pitching for Mobetie, struck out two and walked none.

**THE POLIO SEASON**

The outbreak of polio began this year as usual in Southern Texas. If it follows its normal pattern it will spread northward slowly until its annual cycle ends with the frost of autumn.

The year 1949 is the worst polio year on record. In that year the total deaths from polio were only 2,700. As a matter of fact, in the nation of about 150,000,000 people, there are seldom more than 40,000 cases in a year.

About half of all polio victims recover completely, and an additional one-fourth

suffer only minor after-effects. It is true that only one out of six polio victims are permanently handicapped, and most of the permanently handicapped victims of infantile paralysis can be helped by surgery and other recently developed methods of treatment.

The people of the nation can help medical science win the battle against infantile paralysis by not becoming panicky when the killer strikes . . . by maintaining a sensible attitude toward the ailment. Remember that science is at work continuously trying to conquer this dreaded disease.

Besides remaining calm, there are some precautionary measures that should be taken when polio strikes a community. Get plenty of rest, avoid over-fatigue, eat fresh foods, avoid crowds, prevent children from using the same eating or drinking utensils or wash cloths, watch for sore throat, upset stomach, and tenderness and stiffness of the neck and back, and follow your doctor's advice about nose and throat operations, and teeth extractions during the polio season.

**UNION SHOP SNAFU**

The steel companies have a good point in their opposition to agreeing to a union shop. The union shop would force every steel company employee to join the union immediately upon his employment in the steel mill or plant. The steel companies say this is a denial of human freedom, a principle they will not see violated in their own plants. The steel companies point to the old-time gangs which were organized to prevent employees from joining unions. They say this practice is now barred in their companies, recognized as a denial of individual rights.

The same principle, they say, applies to an employee being forced to join a union. For the employee who does not want to join, it amounts to an order from the company and union, which gives him no freedom of choice. The companies say they do not intend to force all their employees to join the union, just to end the strike. They probably have the support of a majority of Americans in this contention. Other factors in the strike, such as wages and profits may have two more evenly divided sides, but on the union shop issue, the companies are on the right side.

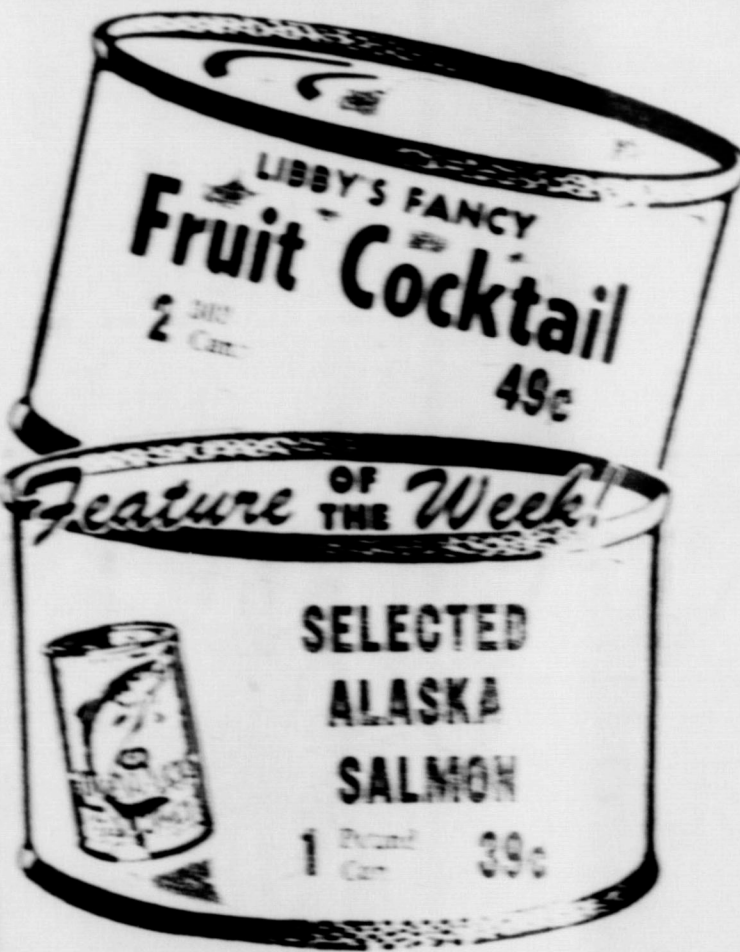

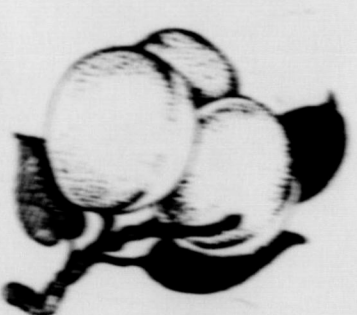

From The HOME DEMONSTRATION OFFICE

### RAINS BENEFIT DEMONSTRATOR YARDS

Of the ten Home Demonstration Clubs in the County, nine yard demonstrations are being carried. Now that some rain has come to our area, at least one of the two difficulties is partially overcome. Dry weather and grasshoppers seemed to hit the yards at the same time. The most frequent excuse for yards failing to meet a high standard is, "Something happened to our well, there is no water." Yards in Wheeler and Shamrock where water bills are not to be kept to a minimum are doing nicely.

Mrs. Lyndon Sims, Wheeler Yard Demonstrator, is in the first year of her demonstration and with good success. The Sims family built a new rock home about 4 miles north of Wheeler last year. This spring they planned and put in walks and curbs. They then leveled the yard and planted grass seeds. Since this was a farmstead, they felt that in order for grass to do well, they must fence it to keep the dogs out. They are going to be content with perennials this year, and next years they will probably do some foundation plant-

ing of shrubs. Through the drought, the Sims have watered regularly, but are repaid with a nice turf of green grass.

Mrs. Tinsley, of the 3-Leaf Club of Shamrock, shows a good beginning of Annuals, Perennials and shrubs. She also has a small vegetable garden on one side of her yard. When both flowers and vegetables were about to reach their productive stage, her well went dry and they all wilted and the vegetables died. Only about three of her expensive roses she planted this year show sign of life. While looking at her drought-stricken yard, we made mention of our regular tour of demonstrations in the fall. She said, "I haven't anything left to show, but have a good time anyway." That is what I call a good loser. She plans to replant her rose garden in the fall.

The Agent plans to see the other yards in the next two weeks, and in the meantime, let's hope for moisture to help our yards grow, but if you must water, give grass and other plants a good soaking, but do not water again until signs of wilt are noticed. This will encourage roots to go deep and will be more drought resistant.

### SHIVERS AGIN AUTO INSPECTION LAW; "SHALL CHANGE IT OR REPEAL IT" He Says

By Ben Kaplan, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law. "The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it. (Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)

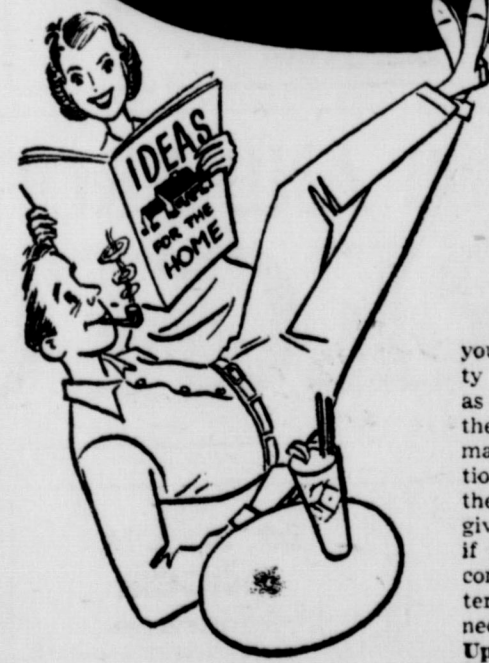

**POLIO CONTROL POINTERS GIVEN BY W. R. RITTER**

With polio on the increase in Texas, Wheeler County Sanitarian W. R. Ritter this week issued a plea for the public to cooperate in lowering the number of flies at a minimum.

Watermelon rinds furnish a big attraction for flies this time of year. The sanitarian said the rinds should be wrapped and placed inside covered garbage cans to be incinerated. Never leave them out in the open.

The same rule apply to fruit and vegetable peddlars, the sanitarian said.

This practice should be observed both at home and at public places, Ritter declared.

Big pens, horse and cow lots and chicken pens should be cleaned regularly and sprayed with lime. These are excellent breeding places for flies when allowed to remain in a filthy condition.

Woods should be cut because they furnish harbor for flies and mosquitoes.

During the polio epidemic season the following measures are recommended:

1. Insist upon safe waste disposal as that human excreta is not exposed to disease transmitting vectors.

2. Insist on eliminating of fly breeding sources and do not depend upon community wide airplane spraying or fogging machines as a substitute for basic sanitation.

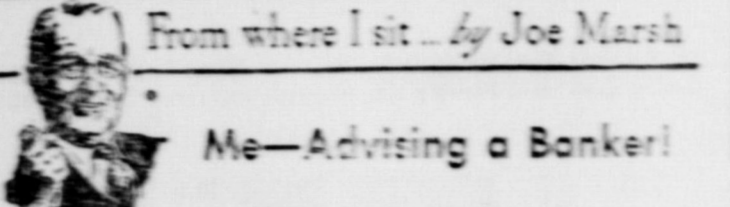

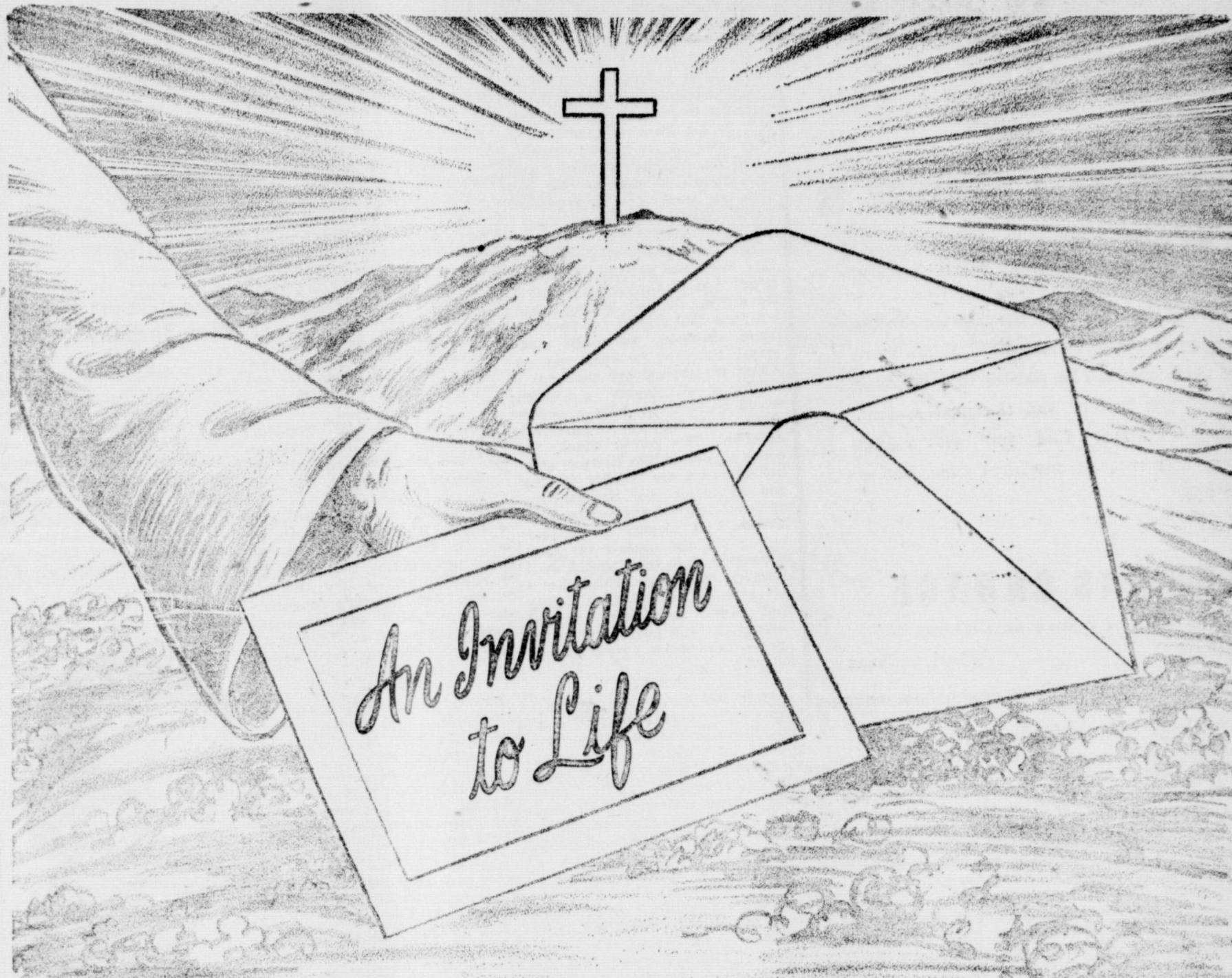

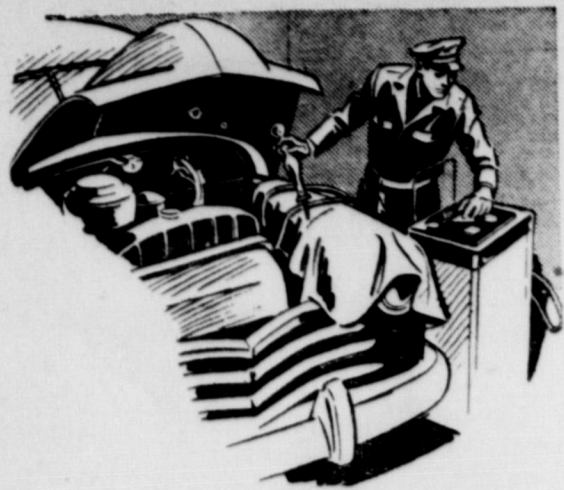

## MOST ADULTS HAVE HAD POLIO

It is believed that the majority of adults have at one time been infected by the virus of poliomyelitis, usually without manifestations, says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. In view of the above it is expected that most of the recognized cases will be among children.

Only a small proportion of infected persons are clinically recognizable. When symptoms are manifested, they usually comprise an acute illness with fever, headache, and almost a characteristic stiffness of the neck and spine. Some degree of paralysis may or may not occur during the first few days of illness.

During the poliomyelitis season the following measures are recommended:

1. Insist upon safe waste disposal so that human excreta is not exposed to disease transmitting vectors.

2. Insist on elimination of breeding sources and depend upon the community airplane spraying or fogging machines as a substitute for sanitation.
3. Food supplies, including milk, must be protected against contamination.
4. Always demand safe food for drinking or swimming.
5. Insist that garbage be in covered containers and disposed of by incineration or fill.
6. Eliminate all insanitary conditions on your own premises.
7. Practice good personal hygiene, with particular attention to personal cleanliness.
8. Avoid excessive physical strain during poliomyelitis season.
9. Isolation in bed of all children with fever pending diagnosis by physician.

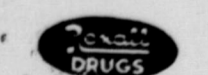

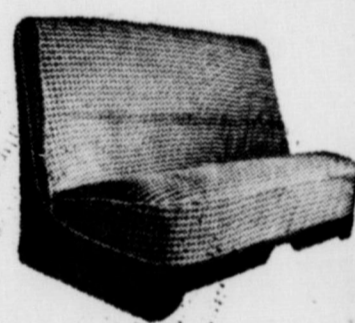
