Editorial

AUTO SHORTAGE?

The prolonged steel strike is sure to cause short supplies of new automobiles in some areas, and likewise certain to improve the used car dealer's market. The strike hasn't as yet caused much panic buying, such as dealers enjoyed in 1950, after the Korean war broke out.

The strike will cause another change in the industry scene. New models, which were being ready by most of the major companies, will probably make their debut later than had been anticipated. It is now esti-

imated that many new models will not appear on the market until 1953, whereas they were originally scheduled to reach retailers late this year.

There have been reports that dealers in some areas stockpiled new cars early this year, in anticipation of a mid-summer buying spree. Others might have stocked new cars because sales were slower than they had anticipated. These stocks, what there were of them, are now exhausted. One can only hope that renewed output of steel will take its effect in the industry early enough to prevent another new car shortage.

LARGEST PRIVATE ENTERPRISE

The largest of all private enterprises is now the life insurance industry. The industry recently reached the \$70,000,000,000 mark and this figure is even more impressive when one realizes that it stands behind \$265,000,000,000 worth of life insurance ownership in the country today.

The rise of the life insurance industry has been rapid. Statistics show that ownership of life insurance today is more than twice that of 10 years ago—thus the gain in the past 10 years has been of more than \$130,000,000,000—an astounding gain by any standard.

Interestingly, the trend in recent years, among the American people, has been to policies guaranteeing income and security during one's own lifetime—that is to policies paying compensation for injury in a hazardous occupation, or for impaired health, etc.

The life insurance industry—now the nation's largest private enterprise—is continuing to grow. Where the totals will wind up no one knows, since the country is gaining population annually.

U. S. AVERAGE: \$1,678 A YEAR

The Commerce Department has reported that the average income in the United States reached a \$1,678 annual level in May. That is, if the rate of personal income continues all year at the May level, the average income will be \$1,678 a year.

The Commerce Department also reported that the May rate of personal income was only \$100,000 short of the all-time record for one month. With defense spending on the increase, and wage increases now taking effect, an all-time record average earning is likely to occur in the current year.

Another factor which increased earnings in the United States was a pay raise granted armed services personnel and this—combined with another distribution of G. I. life insurance dividends—accounted for some of the April to May increase.

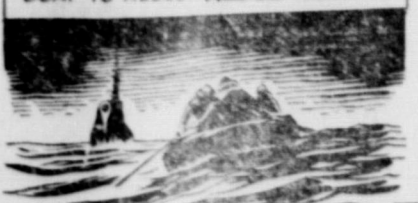
The annual rate of wages and salaries, which account for two-thirds of total personal income, rose \$8,000,000,000 from May, 1951 to May 1952. If total earnings continue at the May level or above, the 1951 personal income record of \$254,000,000,000 will be surpassed this year.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 29 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamations for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

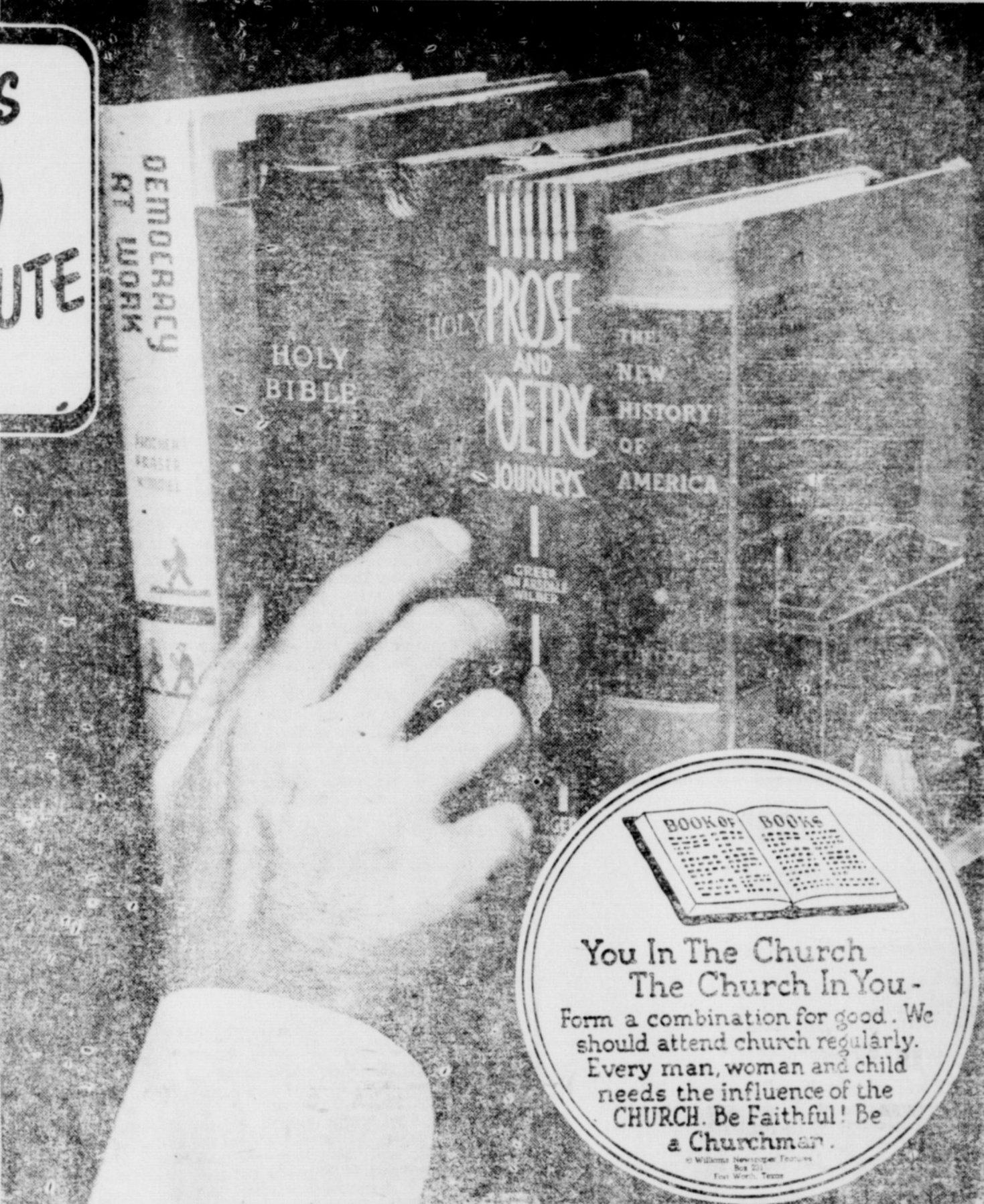
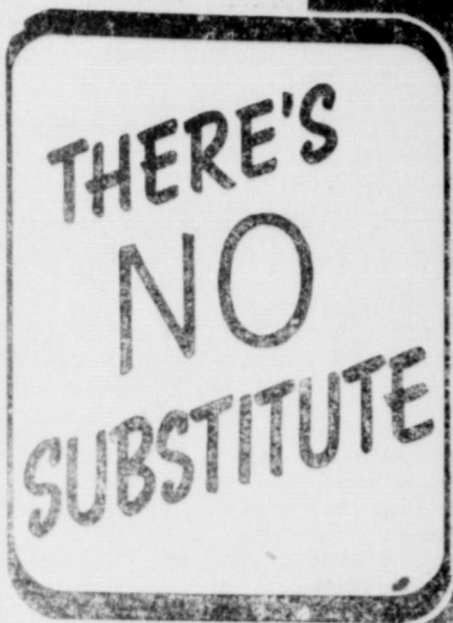
