## Mustangs To Open Season Against Estelline Friday

The 1952 football season will open in Wheeler Friday night when the Wheeler Mustangs meet the Estelline Bear Cubs in a District 1B conference encounter. The contest which is to be played on Nicholson Field here is scheduled to begin at 8:00 p.m.

Coach Coleman Huffman states that his charges should definitely be rated as the underdog team for Friday night's contest after he watched the Estelline eleven scamp over the Childress B Team last Thursday night by a score of 38 to 7. Coach Huffman states that Estelline ran up about 25 points in the first quarter last week then played their subs against the Childress team.

Coach Huffman also pointed out the fact that the Estelline team boasts a total of 15 lettermen from their last season's squad and in addition to that their starting line-up will probably outweigh the Wheeler starter several pounds to the man.

In addition to the other factors which stack up in favor of the Green and White clad Bear Cub

team, they will have the experience of having already played a game this season while this will be the first contest of the season for the Mustangs.

Eight of the eleven probable starters for the Mustangs for Friday night's contest will be lettermen. They are Co-captains Glen Farmer left tackle, and Clarence Whittenburg fullback; Maxey Herd right tackle; Buck Jones, center; Harold Loyd Lee, left halfback; Ronnel Richerson, quarterback; Glen Sanders, left guard; and Buddy Toon, left end. The other three probable starters will be Denny Bowerman at right end, Elmer Clements, right halfback, and Jerry Lewis right guard.

Supt. A. E. Brown announced this week that the admission prices which have been set by the District 1B executive committee for games this fall are as follows: grade school students, 25c; high school students, 50c; and adults, \$1.00.

## Wheeler Whisperings

We have two car keys on our desk which have recently been turned over to us. One of them is a Chrysler products ignition key which was found at the softball field about a week ago and the other is a Ford key which was found here in town one day this week by Ira Passons and turned in to the office. Whoever these keys belong to may have same by stopping in and picking them up.

We have had an article from the monthly bulletin from the general offices of the Kiwanis Club called to our attention this week and we believe it is worthy of reproduction herewith:

"Don P. Carpenter, Governor of the Indiana District, wrote an outstanding article for the July issue of his district's bulletin, excerpts of which are being published in other periodicals. The following quotation is taken from this editorial which was written after a visit to Victoria and Vancouver.

"In Canada when the traffic signs say twenty or thirty miles per hour—that is what they mean... If you have an accident and it is your fault and you are unable to pay the damages because you have neglected to protect yourself by insurance, your car is confiscated. If someone operates a car while intoxicated, the penalty is two years. If you cause injury to a child because of fast driving or intoxicated, you receive a sentence. No sentence is ever suspended and your car is also confiscated. Accidents in that part of Canada are negligible. If we could adopt some of these policies in America, it might lessen accidents and save lives."

About a year and a half ago now we started raising Cain with you trying to get you to put up enough money to build a lighted softball field for Wheeler and some of you responded immediately with nice donations; however, we failed to raise enough money to get the project started last summer but we raised a little more this spring then went ahead and bought the lights partially on credit and put them up and started a softball program. I am happy to report that, at this time, we have not only finished paying for the lights, but have added stands along the south side of the diamond, put up a fence around the outfield and made various other improvements at the park and everything is paid for, including the light bills, and the Kiwanis Club still has a little money left in its fund to make further improvements to the field.

More than \$1,500.00 has been spent on the Kiwanis Softball field at the City Park this year and better than half this amount has been raised through night donations taken up at the park and through the sale of cold drinks. The cold drink concessions stand netted the club \$374.42.

Practically all the work on the softball field and stands was donated by various individuals and groups under the able direction of Wheeler's most energetic civic leader, George Gandy, and we want to publicly thank Mr. Gandy and everyone else who has helped to make the project and the softball program a success.

Work already has been begun to improve the softball field for play next spring. Mr. Gandy has seeded the entire field with a mixture of lawn grass seed which have been donated by Narville Arganbright, manager of the Wheeler County Produce Ass'n. The seeding was done with some new drills which have recently been purchased by the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District and these drills were pulled by a tractor which was borrowed from Hibler Implement Co. Billy J. Darnell is hauling cotton burs from the Paymaster gin and covering the field with them. The burs are a good fertilizer.

We would certainly appreciate it if some one would see that the two good bats which were taken from the equipment of the D. E. Class team during the season were returned. The first one which disappeared was a Louisville Slugger with slim grip and it disappeared during the softball tournament. The other bat which is missing is a new light colored bat which is marked "D. E." with a "J" underneath the de has disappeared (Continued on last page)

## Residents Asked To Donate Blood To Men In Service

Residents of the Wheeler area are asked to donate at least 100 pints of blood to wounded Americans in Korea.

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be at the American Legion Building in Shamrock from 12 noon until 6 p.m. on Thursday, October 2, to collect the blood.

The above notice should be all that is necessary but unfortunately that has not been the experience of the blood gathering agency and the United States Defense Department. It takes repeated public appeals, a host of volunteer workers, and organization to raise the blood quota in an average American community.

And so, chairmen have been named and committees chosen to launch an all-out blood donor campaign in the Wheeler-Shamrock area. R. L. Roberts, chairman of the Shamrock Red Cross Chapter, and Glenn Richerson, blood program chairman, are heading up the drive in Shamrock and Mrs. Bernice Hall is chairman of the campaign in Wheeler.

Heading the important donor recruitment committee as co-chairmen are Mrs. Harrison Hall of Wheeler, and Mrs. W. H. Dial of Shamrock, who already have a committee busy signag up prospective blood donor.

Another committee which plays an important role is the volunteer's service committee, headed by Mrs. E. O. Stroup of Shamrock.

Dr. L. R. Devaney heads up the medical coverage group which will work in close cooperation with Red Cross nurses and volunteers during the Bloodmobile visit in Shamrock.

Harris Zeigler is chairman of the public relations and advertising committee.

### Editorial

#### NEW DISCOVERY IN MEDICINE

Sixteen years ago Kent Kincaid was born in Walnut Creek, California. Before he was one week old, he had been given a blood transfusion. Since then, he has had intermittently which often endangered his life. He has been under constant medical treatment at the University of California's Medical Center.

For 12 years, the doctor thought that Kent was a hemophilic. A hemophilic is one whose blood will not clot to close up a wound after a cut. But the medical research on globulin which is generally effective in treating a hemophilic did not work. So it was finally decided that Kent had an unknown kind of bleeding sickness.

It has now been discovered that Kent's blood lacked a factor, hitherto unknown, found in the blood of normal persons. This factor, plasma thromboplastin component, is called PTC for short.

PTC has been partially purified, and Dr. Paul Aggeler, head of the University of California team of scientists studying the Kent case, hopes to have it in pure form and in sufficient quantity to treat Kent, who at the present time has to receive plasma every week.

#### CURING A SKIN DISEASE BY HYPNOSIS

Recently in the British Medical Journal was the report of a case of fishskin disease which was cured by hypnosis. Ichthyosiform erythroderma, commonly known as fishskin disease, comes in about twenty varieties. In all forms, one of the characteristics of the disease is that the skin is dry, rough, and scaly.

The British Medical Journal reports that Drs. S. P. Hall-Smith and Alan Norton found that, in a special check of a group of people with unhealthy skin, psychic factors were involved in 76 percent of the cases. Many physicians agree with the French saying that the skin is the mirror of the mind, and that certainly some skin diseases are the result of mental or emotional conflicts.

In this particular case of fishskin disease which was cured by hypnosis, the arms cleared up after eight days treatment, and the legs were greatly improved after a month. It was also noted that progress was made rapidly at first then it was toward the end of the treatment. Efforts to cure the disease by other methods had been ineffective.

The Editor of the British Medical Journal is unable to explain why hypnosis was successful in treating this case of fishskin disease after all other methods failed, but he does feel that this case points to a "great need for further basic scientific work on the relation between the mind and the skin."

#### SCHOOL BUILDING OF THE FUTURE

At a recent conference of school superintendents held at the University of Georgia, it was brought out very forcibly that it is no longer true that school buildings are nothing more than a place to get pupils out of the rain.

According to the Georgia conference, the trend in school architecture is a one-story flat-roofed building. The emphasis is on economy of construction and maintenance, and on a stimulating educational environment rather than on ornaments and frills.

The modern school is built on large sites and feature multiple-use class rooms, new methods of lighting, better acoustics, effective use of colors, controlled and improved ventilation and outdoor facilities.

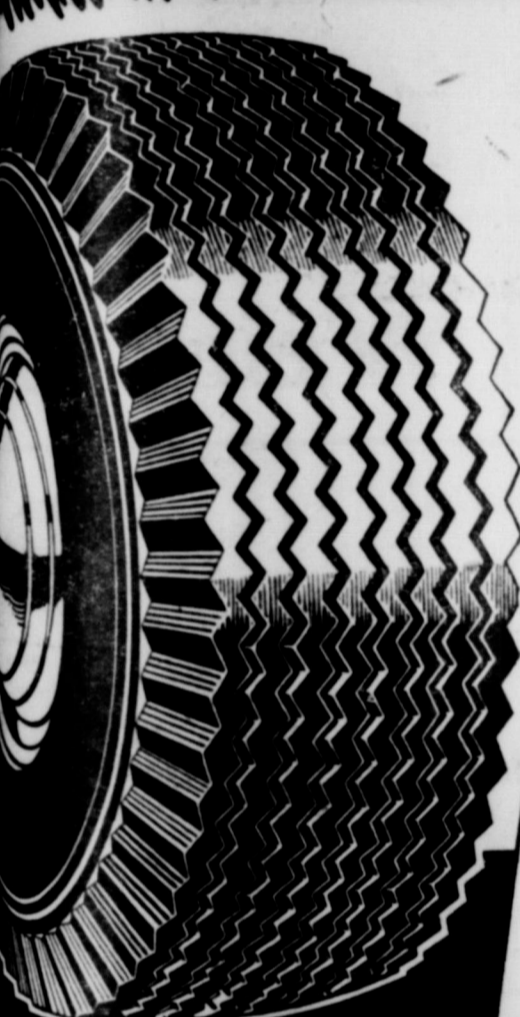

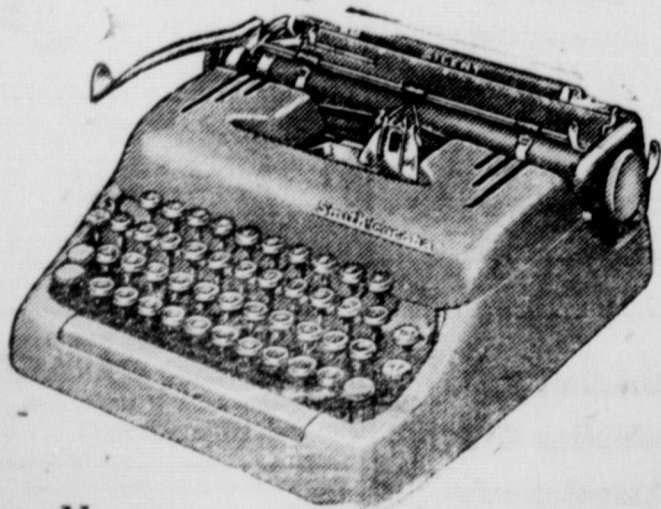

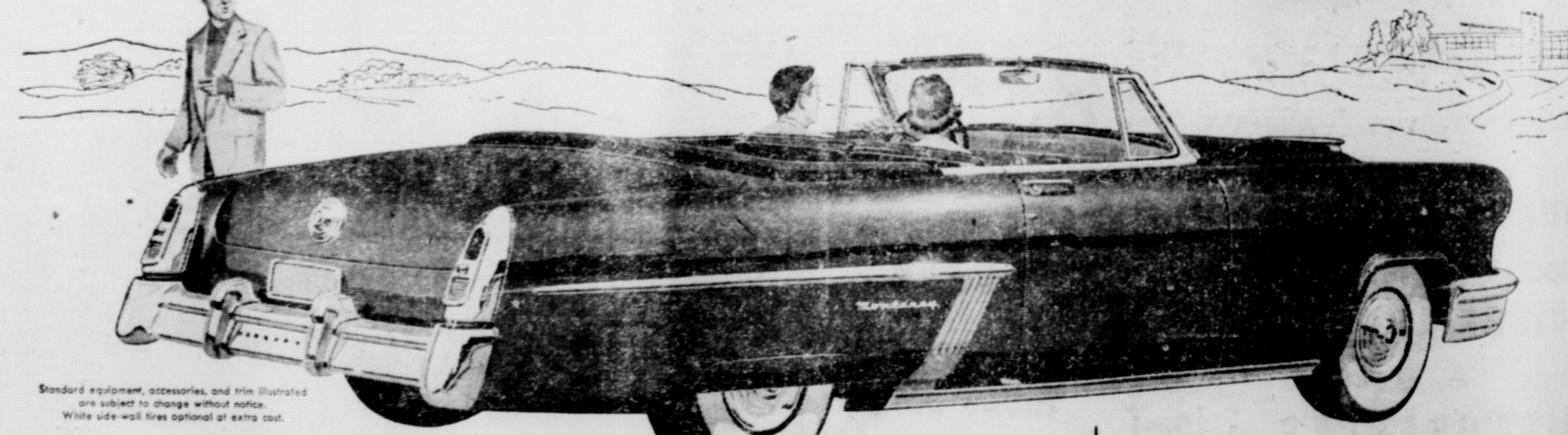
