Editorial

BUY AMERICAN?

One of the many laws designed to pro-
tect U. S. businesses is the Buy American
Act of 1933. That law provides that govern-
ment agencies must buy necessary goods
from domestic concerns unless their price is
unreasonably high, compared to foreign com-
petition. The year after the law was passed,
an Administrative ruling set at 25 percent
the interpretation of "unreasonably high."

At first glance the average American
will think, "Well, that's all right. The U. S.
firm ought to get the business. We pay our
labor more. Cheap labor in foreign countries
enables them to beat our prices, and we don't
want to be dragged down to a cheap-labor
standard in this country."

The tariff, which we have always had,
is designed to protect American business. If
foreign concerns can pay the protective
tariff and still undersell our firms, then
either the tariff ought to be raised, or the
firms ought to be looked into closely.

A recent series of purchases, involving
medical microscopes, in 1950 and 1951 show-
ed that the Army saved \$90,000 by turning
to an Italian firm for the microscopes on six
occasions. On three occasions in that same
period the Army awarded contracts to do-
mestic concerns. Thus, of the nine contracts
for medical microscopes awarded by the
Army, an Italian concern—paying a U. S.
tariff of 45 percent—was awarded six of
them. In most of the nine cases, the two U.
S. firms bidding (and there were only two
bidding all along) bid the same thing.

After this, the two U. S. firms and
Galileo of Milan (the Italian concern) began
a price-cutting trend. An additional offer to
buy 1,300 microscopes brought offers from
the three companies. The low price from a
domestic bidder was 24.1 higher than Galileo's
price. Under customary procedure, the
Italian firm would have been out of luck;
the American had bid 25 percent, and was
within the 1933 "reasonable" high. But the
case was reviewed by the Under Secretary
of the Army, who decided to split the con-
tract. Thus the Army saved \$40,000.

An interesting feature in this case is the
fact that the Veterans Administration was
also in the market for medical microscopes
at the time. Bids were asked and the do-
mestic companies were not under the necessity
of meeting foreign competition (since the
specifications had been written to exclude
the foreign product). The domestic com-
panies reportedly were asking prices sub-
stantially in excess of the prices being asked
the Army, for what—in some cases—were
the identical microscopes! At least that is
the charge of Representative Frank Smith,
of Mississippi.

The prices named by the domestic com-
panies bidding on the Veterans Administra-
tion offer were identical. Why can't U. S.
firms compete with an Italian company, pay-
ing a 45 percent tariff, and shipping its pro-
ducts 3,000 miles? And why do they charge
more, when foreign bidding is not allowed?

President Truman has described himself
as only a private in the rear ranks, now that
he is out of the election picture, which, if
true, represents something of a record de-
motion.

If you have been able to stand the sum-
mer heat so far, you can find consolation in
the fact that fall begins next month.

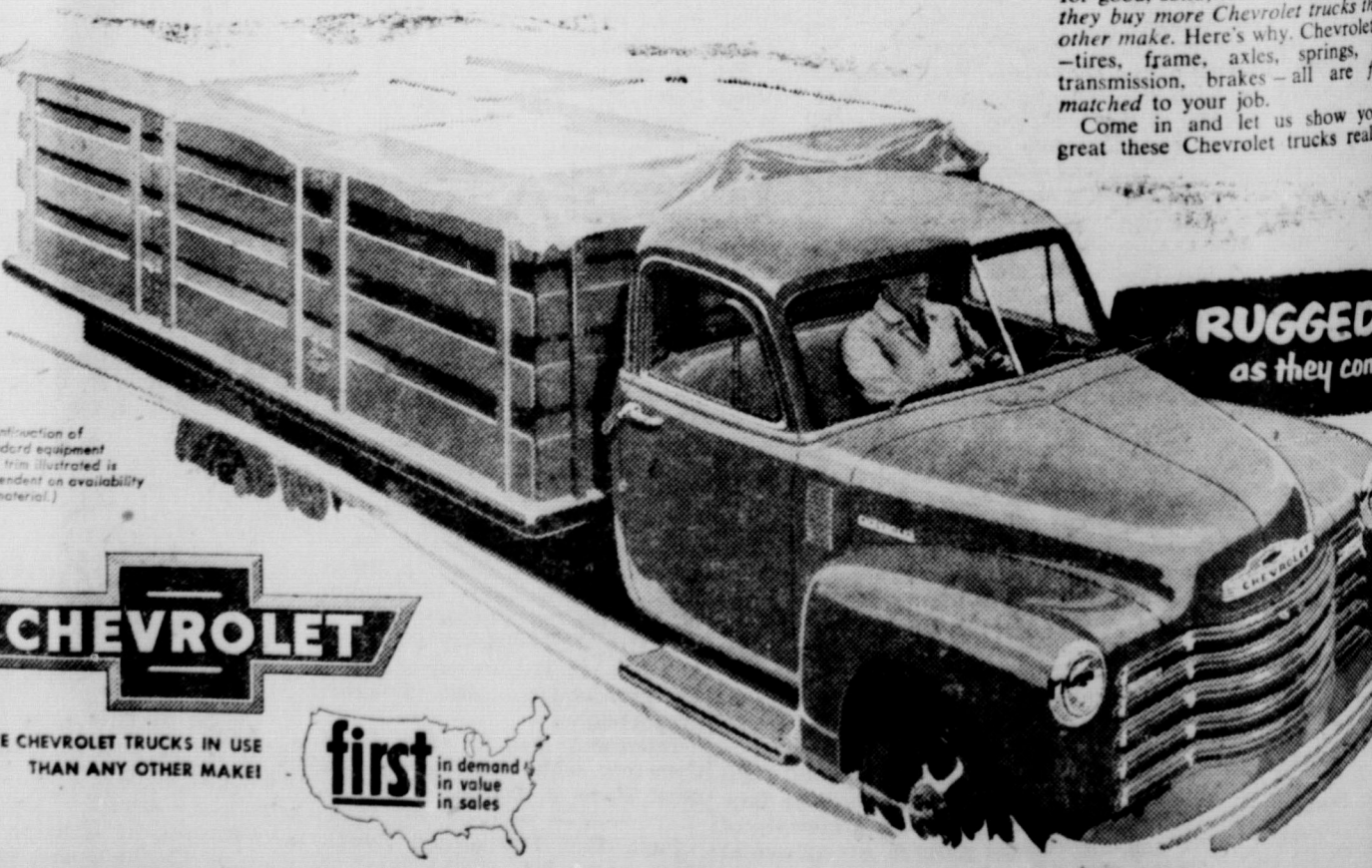

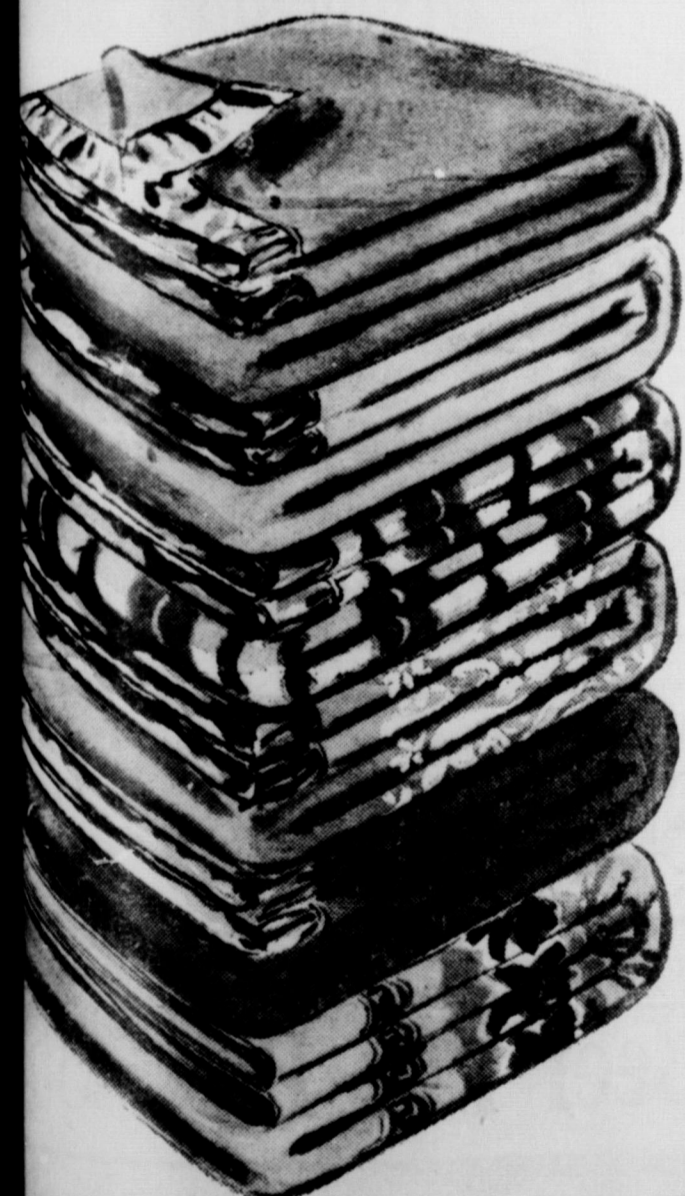

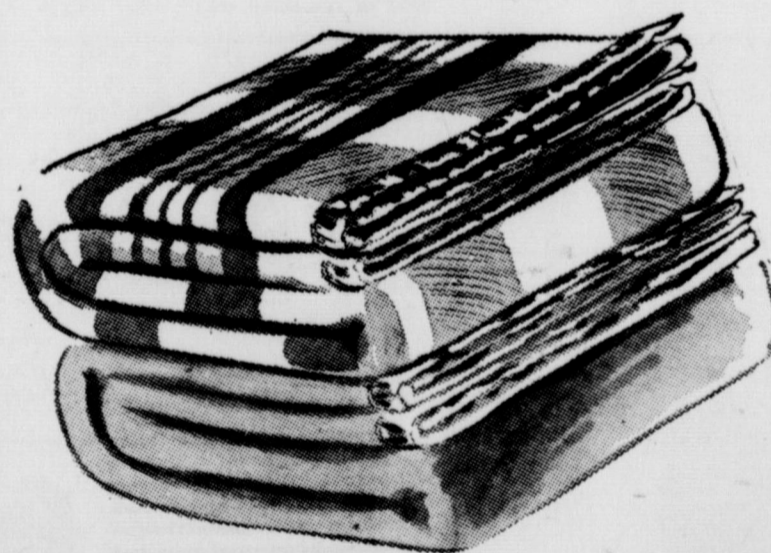

Tom Laman, Jr. Is Stationed In Alabama

Camp Rucker, Ala.—Private Thomas E. Laman, Jr., Lubbock, has arrived at this Southern Alabama Army camp to undergo his initial infantry training.

Inducted August 21, 1952 and processed at Ft. Sill, Okla., he will receive basic training from the 47th "Viking" Infantry Division here. The new soldier will undertake a rigorous schedule incorporating a wide-range of military subjects from military courtesy and field sanitation to machine gun and hand-to-hand familiarization.

After finishing eight to 16 weeks of primary training, the recent inductees will be eligible for reassignment for further infantry or specialized training.

The 47th Division, the first permanent Army assignment for the new soldier, is a Minnesota-North Dakota National Guard unit. Activated for service on January 16, 1951, the Division now is completing its second year at Rucker. Since activation, the 47th has trained men from all 48 states and three territories.

EVERY SCHOOL NEEDS HEALTH PROGRAM

Every School should have a definite school health program. Situations such as, the kind of drinking water, arrangements for the school lunch, the lighting, seating, ventilation and cleanliness of the schoolroom, and the personal practices of the teachers and children are the basis of the school health program, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Every school has tremendous opportunities to promote the health of its pupils and of its community. From early childhood to early manhood and womanhood, most children are enrolled in schools and under the supervision of school staffs for a substantial part of the

day for approximately half the days of the year. The conditions under which they live in school, the help which they are given in solving their health problems, the ideals of individuals and community health which they are taught and the information and understanding that they acquire of themselves are factors which operate to develop attitudes and behavior conducive to healthy, happy and successful living.

Schools alone, however, cannot enable children to attain all the desirable goals of individual and community health. Considering the magnitude and multitude of the diverse and continuing efforts that must be made to satisfy the health needs of children, many people and groups, in addition to schools and health departments, should be interested in promoting health.

Parents have a prime responsibility. Physicians, dentists, nurses, social and welfare workers, organizations, such as medical, dental, nursing societies, and voluntary

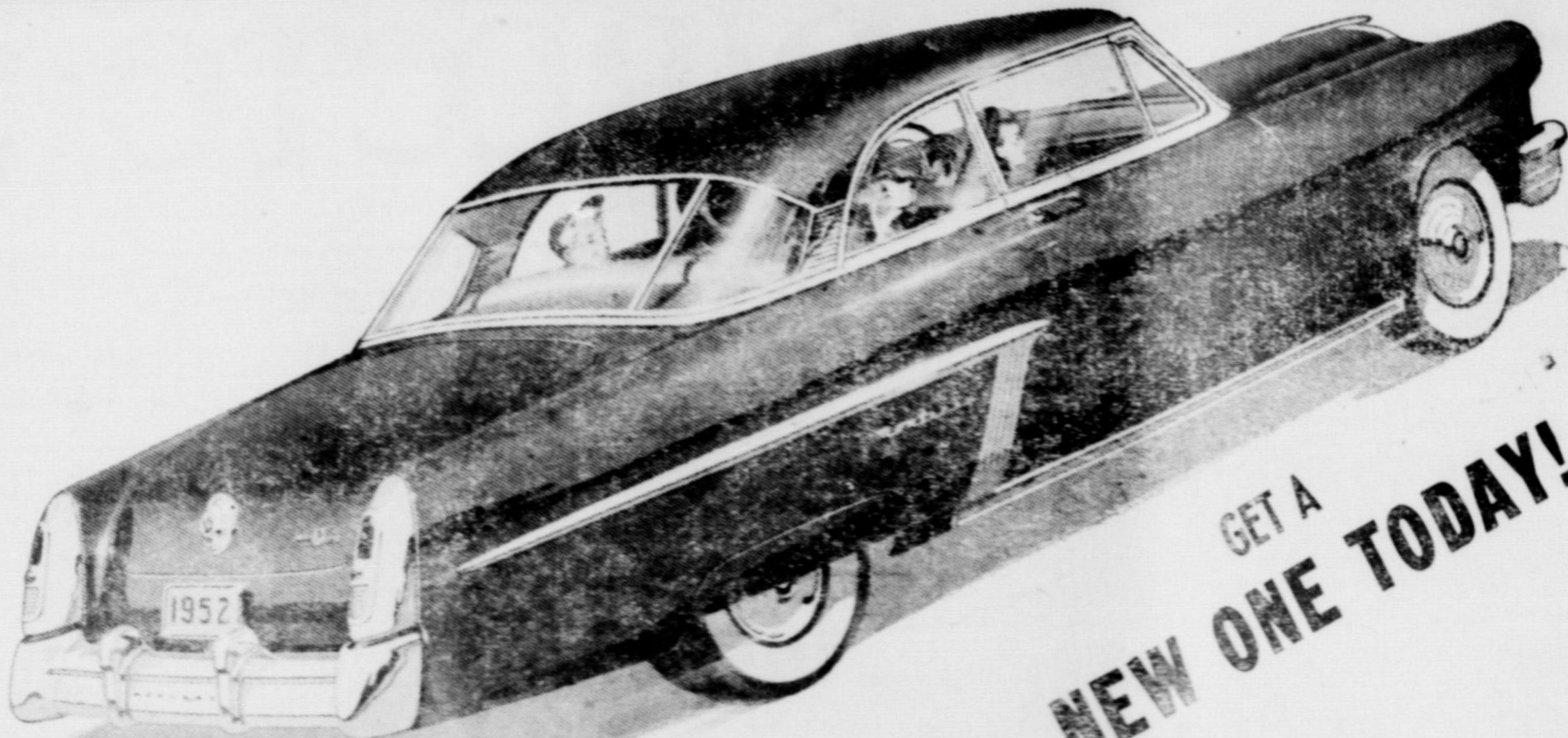

Texas Democrats Organize To Back Gen. Eisenhower

AUSTIN, TEXAS.—"Texas Democrats for Eisenhower" is the name of a new citizens' organization which opened headquarters here this week. Plans are being made to conduct a grassroots campaign among members of the Democratic Party in behalf of Dwight D. Eisenhower, a native-born Texan, for President.

Claud H. Gilmer of Rocksprings, former speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, was named chairman. In accepting the office, Gilmer commented:

"I have been a lifelong Democrat, and still consider myself a Democrat. It is a case of deciding: When do you get enough? What are the best interests of Texas, and what are your best interests? We've got to help take the national leadership of the Democratic Party to the woodshed. This is not a creeping socialism we are fighting against, it's a galloping socialism."

Gilmer and other speakers stressed the mandate issued by the State Democratic Convention at Amarillo on Sept. 9, which resolved: "It is the recommendation of this Convention that every Democrat in Texas vote and work for the election of Dwight D. Eisenhower for President and Richard Nixon for Vice President."

The meeting was called by Tom Sealy of Midland, who was elected co-chairman of the organization with Miss Nan Proctor, Victoria school teacher. Miss Proctor was a member of the Gilmer-Aiken Committee that reformed the Texas school laws in 1949. Gilmer was co-sponsor of the reform bill.

Democratic Party Leaders selected for a statewide steering committee, to assist the officers, were: Sam Aldridge, Farwell; E.

C. Aycock, Fort Worth; W. Beaumier, Lufkin; H. E. Clark, Jr., Midland; Lester Clark, Brownridge; Mrs. K. Devall King, Charles W. Duke, San Antonio; Charles E. Long, Jr., Dallas; Milton Nixon, Corpus Christi; Emmett Shelton, Austin; and W. V. Wheat, Houston.

Beaumier and Duke are members of the State Democratic Executive Committee. Other members who attended the organizational meeting here were: F. Brown, Mineral Wells; Tom Glass, Austin; Peyton McRae, Jr., Quitman, and Lynn Smith, Gonzales.

Most of those who attended the first meeting here were leaders of the State Convention in order to the names of the National Democratic nominees placed on Texas ballot, while at the same time urging Texas Democrats to vote for Eisenhower.

The group selected Weldon H. and John VanCronkhite, Austin public relations men, to assist Gilmer in directing the campaign.

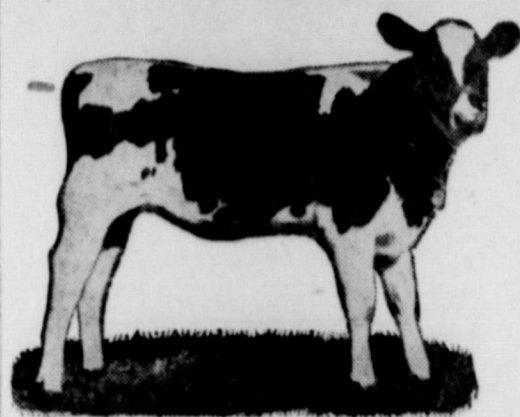

FARM BUREAU TO SAVE FUNDS
 Farm Bureau Federation, in cooperation with other County Judges and County Association and Carriers, "saved" \$400,000 for rural road purposes in Texas for the year 1952 and 1953, through a new active program of

work carried on while the 1951 State legislature was in session, according to Raymond Moore of Twitty, president of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau.

Legislation was introduced, Moore said, that would have taken from the counties every penny of the road bond assumption money, which is expended by the Commissioners Courts in the counties, and would have discontinued the appropriation provided under the Colson-Briscoe Act, which is used by the State Highway Department to build farm-to-market roads. The movement led by the Farm Bureau specially saved \$7,300,000 in road bond assumption money for the State of Texas each year, and \$15,000,000 Colson-Briscoe funds.

Let's see what this means to Wheeler county, the farm leader said. "We will get 24,221.47 road bond assumption money in 1952 and again in 1953. We will get 4.9 miles of farm-to-market roads each of these years, built with Colson-Briscoe funds. Conservatively speaking, it costs about \$10,000 a mile to build these farm-to-market roads and this will mean about \$49,411.80 a year that this county will receive from this source.

"If these groups had not fought the battle that saved this road money, it would have been necessary to raise taxes in Wheeler county to build the roads, if we had any roads built," Moore declared.

Certain groups have an eye on this road money and another fight will be waged in the next legislature if this money is retained for rural roads, Moore predicted.

Lee Norton, announcer from radio station KPRC, Houston, heard regularly as master of ceremonies on the weekly prison broadcast over that station, will act as MC for the various inmate musical groups who will appear on the day's program. The Prison System military band will furnish musical accompaniment for the riding events.

Advance ticket sales are brisk, it is reported by L. W. Wright, in charge of ticket sales, and people wishing to make reservations by mail are urged to act promptly. Seats are \$2.40 each, tax included, check or money order must accompany the order and patrons should indicate which of the rodeo's four performances, October 5th, 12th, 19th, and 26th, they wish to attend. COUNTY SCHOOLS ARE SURVEYED

W. F. Powers, Lubbock, Assistant District State Water Engineer, was here September 9-11, to make a maintenance survey of the Wheeler County school plants.

All schools in the county, with the exception of Shamrock's were checked. The Shamrock system will be surveyed during the first week in December, when Mr. Powers returns to check the Collingsworth County schools.

This is the first time such a service has been available, according to Wheeler County Sanitarian W. R. Ritter, who arranged for the program. It is made possible by the State Health Department through the cooperation and partial financial support of the Crippled Children's Association.

The survey consists of: correct seating arrangements, correct lighting, painting of walls and ceilings, light water check of all rooms, and safety features.

The engineer will send recommendations to school boards, superintendents and to Ritter in the near future.

Mr. Powers commented highly on two features he found in the Wheeler County Schools: 1. all schools have cafeterias; 2. all schools have inside rest rooms.

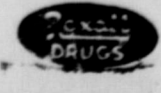
