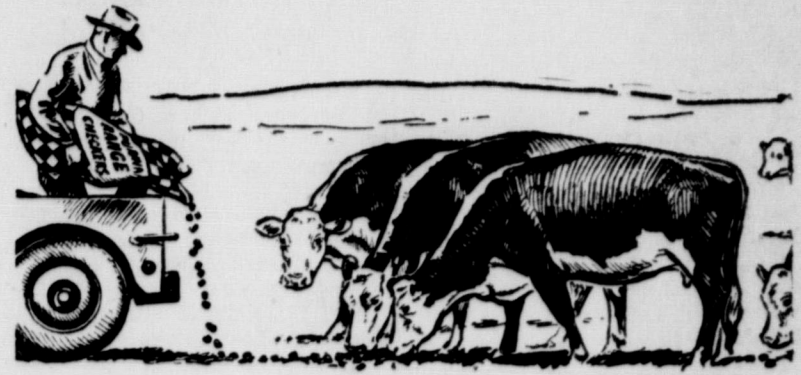
SENIOR NEWS

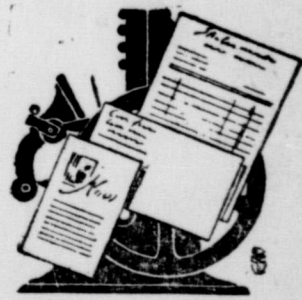

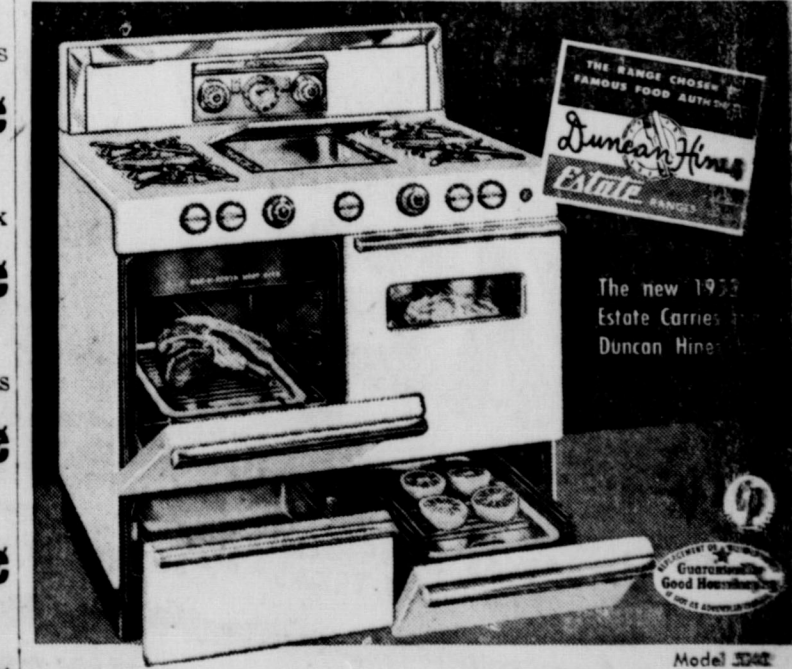

State of Texas, 66,000 of which are school bus routes.

A road program is one of the big jobs on which Farm Bureau will be working until a plan is adopted that will build adequate roads for school buses and for farmers to get their products to market, Moore said.

Farm Bureau sponsored the Sewell Bill in the last session of the legislature, which proposed a tax of one cent per thousand cubic feet on natural gas, the major portion of which is shipped out of the state. A token tax was levied on natural gas, but sponsors of the bill failed to get any portion of the funds earmarked for building roads. The greatest opposition the Farm Bureau has yet encountered on its road fight is looming in the next session, Moore declared.
